Matthew 14:13-21

14:13 Now when Jesus heard this, he withdrew from there in a boat to a deserted place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. 14:15 When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat."

They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish."

And he said, "Bring them here to me."

Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Invitation to the Lord's Table

Jesus said, "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled."

This is the joyful feast of God's people. Scripture reminds us that people will come from north and south and from east and west to sit at table in the kingdom of God. According to Luke, when our risen Lord was at table with his disciples, he took the bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Their eyes were opened, and they recognized him. We gather today around this table, and around tables in living rooms and family rooms, in kitchens and dining rooms. We bring small pieces of bread, but trust that God will provide enough. We offer small sips of juice, but in faith know that this is the feast of all of God's people.
