that recovering would prove so painful. I hated to miss Confirmation Sunday. I was very grateful that my first Sunday back allowed me to be here to pray for our graduates.


There is nothing more important in what we do as a Christian congregation than raising children. We come alongside parents in helping them raise children who are prepared to move out into the world as people of faith and blessings to others. When we describe the map of our ministry - our determination to focus on worship, learning, and healing - our care for children is right there at the heart of it.

Even though they have now graduated from high school or college, I do hope that our graduates realize that their educations will never end. They will never quit learning. As people of faith, I hope they come to realize that God is always at work in their learning. That every life experience can be their teacher.


I know I've learned some things over these past three months. I learned that God alone is our Healer. Medical professionals and institutions have their place but they are not the source of our healing (and they would be the first to tell you that). At best they put us in the position to allow God's healing to come. They make educated guesses, based on their knowledge and experience, but God alone brings healing.

I learned, from first-hand experience, something

about the opioid addiction crisis that I might have known intellectually but now know experientially. I was given a pain medication that worked very well. I just didn't realize how well until I tried to stop using it.

I was warned about the dangers of becoming dependent on it. I refilled the prescription twice, both times after trying to go without for a couple of days. Finally, I decided I could do without it and I was determined to quit taking it.

I had only taken it for a month but that was all it took for me to experience what I can only describe as bad withdrawal symptoms. In the middle of my first sleepless night I googled the drug to learn from the experiences of others. Sure enough, restlessness, insomnia, renewed pain, runny nose, anxiety, and depression were universal side effects of getting off this drug.

And the whole time, the entire time, I knew that all I needed to do to feel better was to take a couple more pills. They were right there in the cupboard. But, for me, they very quickly had become the problem rather than the solution. That is how use can very quickly move to dependency to abuse to addiction. God taught me an important lesson. Addiction is simply an effort to feel better, rooted in pain, that can take on a life of its own before it takes the life of the addict. It is as simple as that.

And I learned about the power of community. We heal in community. I am so grateful for the people who came to see me in the hospital and at home (even if I can't remember your visits). Spending that time together allowed me to forget about my pain and feel reconnected. As many times as I have visited others in hospitals or homes, ironically, it never occurred to me that those visits might actually have been helpful. I should have known better. God is always there in the room where two or three gather. Perhaps especially when someone is hurting. So thank you all for your visits, your gifts of food, your cards, and your prayers.

And now we get to enjoy June. Vacation time. The National Youth Gathering. Faith Camp. Lutherhill. May God continue our education and encourage us to encourage young people.



President's Page

If you ask any of our congregation's kids or youth what their favorite thing is about Faith Lutheran Church, you are likely to get the enthusiastic answer, "FAITH CAMP!" I know for my two kids (now young adults), that would be their answer. And that has been the case from the time they were five. Faith Camp is a ministry that engages members of all ages at Faith. At its core, it is a day camp for elementary age kids, from age five through 6th grade. The three week camp is structured around a theme, and each week there is a Bible story or group of stories that are the focus. The campers learn the story with their small group (like-aged kids) and then rotate through different stations, where the story is reinforced through fun activities like crafts, science, music, drama, games and snacks. There is an opening and closing worship every day, and fun activities on certain days - like splash day, dress-up day and pizza day. The campers love

their time at Faith Camp – when my own kids were young, they literally cried one year when I picked them up a few hours early on the last day of Faith Camp to leave for Disney World. As we left the Faith Center, these words actually came out of their sobbing mouths, "No Mom, please, we don't want to leave Faith Camp to go to Disney World! Don't make us go!" Ok, enough said about the camper experience. If this message ended here, it would be pretty powerful. But there's so much more. All of the above fun and activities are run and managed by our youth – high school and college-aged kids, who are assisted by our 7th-8th graders. It is a phenomenal undertaking that the youth tackle with much passion and devotion – everything from interviewing for their positions, to leading worship during camp, to teaching the Bible stories, to running the stations, to dealing with camper discipline. They develop an incredible bond with each other as they run the camp, which is the secret to their passion and commitment. They become, in short, a community of disciples leading others to Christ. And the campers get excited about the Bible stories and Jesus because they are learning from the older kids – where another strong bond develops. There is nothing more heartwarming than watching your 17 year old study the Bible at night in anticipation of teaching it to his group of seven year olds the next day. Wow!

But remember I said that Faith Camp engages all ages at Faith. So yes, adults have their roles as well. There is an extremely committed group of adults who form a team that supports Faith Camp all year round – in all its planning stages. This team is devoted to improving Faith Camp each year, and has made great strides in the four years of its existence. If anyone feels an urge to get more involved with Faith Camp, please ask me about being on this team! And then there are the mentors. Each of our high school and college-aged youth at Faith Camp have an adult mentor who supports them throughout the three weeks of Faith Camp. The mentors pray for their mentees and touch base a few times a week (usually by text) to check on how things are going. They offer encouragement when the mentees get tired or stressed, and offer praise when things go well. They sometimes bring treats for their mentee or stop by Faith Camp with lunch – but that is very optional. The key is to make a connection and support the youth during a time of significant demands being made on these young people, and yet also a time when they are really growing in their faith.

I have already approached many of you about being a mentor this summer, and some of you have answered the call. But I am still recruiting a few more mentors. If this sounds appealing or if you feel any passion about working with our youth, please let me know. I would love to tell you more about Faith Camp and being a mentor. It just might be the most meaningful thing you do this year.

All Sufficient Grace

Jimmy Linchong was a celebrity movie star in the 1950s and 1960s. He was extremely popular in Japan, Taiwan, Hong Kong, and South East Asia during the heyday of his career. He was compared to Elvis Presley. Some fans said he looked like the King and called him “The King of the East.”

On May 13, 83-year old Jimmy Linchong came to Faith Chinese Fellowship and shared his spiritual journey. He was brought up in the Buddhist tradition in Taiwan. In his 70s, his agent and assistant Kevin brought him to church. Though he had attended church for over six years, he did not want to be baptized, despite repeated appeals from the pastor and church friends. In 2011, he was diagnosed with stage III prostate cancer. His pastor and church friends came to his home to pray for him and asked him to receive baptism without further delay. In anger and frustration, he drove them away. That same night, however, he had a mysterious dream, in which he rode on the back of a gigantic bird with white wings in the cloudy sky. He also received the message from an angel that he should not postpone baptism any longer. He called his pastor next morning, telling him he was ready to be baptized. “Finally, I surrendered my life to God,” he said. His baptism took place on Easter Sunday, 2012. A year later, his doctor told him that he was cancer free. These days he travels to many places to sing praise to God and share his testimony.

After listening to LinChong’s testimony, a friend texted me, “I heard another story of encountering God in the moment of pain and adversity.” Then she asked, “Do people meet God in good times?” I said, “Of course. We should remember and thank God when things are going well.” I shared with her the story of Dorothy Day, co-founder of the Catholic Worker Movement, who committed her life to Jesus Christ after experiencing the great joy of giving birth to her daughter. It was a new mother’s joy that brought her to a new and deeper understanding of God’s loving heart for all of God’s children. To explain why so many people find God in the midst of suffering, I shared with her the words of C. S. Lewis, “Pain insists upon being attended to. God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pain: it is His megaphone to rouse a deaf world.”

When we suffer and are in pain, we may doubt God’s goodness and power. Some people allow suffering and pain to drive a wedge between them and God. For others, crisis becomes the catalyst of spiritual rebirth. Suffering and pain force them to reexamine their life and repent. They come to the realization of their own vulnerability and weakness. With their own dreams being shattered to a million pieces, they surrender to God and pray earnestly, “God, help me. You are my help and my salvation.” As a result of intense spiritual searching and longing, they experience God’s deliverance. They now understand that God is never far away, that God is all loving and good all the time. They may or may not receive what they ask from God, but they are able to reconcile their own suffering with God’s mighty power and sovereignty. They find hope, peace, and victory in communion with God. They may even hear in their heart what Christ said to Apostle Paul, who suffered because of “a thorn” in his flesh, “My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness.” (1 Corinthians 12:9)

It is my prayer that we all trust in God’s all-sufficient grace in good times and bad times.




6 Old Hymnals Find New Home

If you ever glanced around the conference room you probably noticed a large amount of old, blue *With One Voice* hymnals on the bookshelf. WOV was a small hymnal supplement published in 1995 by Augsburg Fortress. It functioned as an intermediary step between the publications of *Lutheran Book of Worship* (LBW) in 1978 and *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* (ELW) in 2006. Many of the songs in WOV ended up getting included in ELW a decade later. Which is why WOV became somewhat obsolete, having its contents republished in the newer, larger hymnal.



Since we are always looking for ways to maximize storage at Faith, I began to seek out an opportunity to put our old WOVs to work. I reached out on Facebook and came into contact with Army Chaplain Christopher Laughlin. He serves at Fort Leonard Wood in Missouri and said that the WOV hymnals would be a wonderful addition to the liturgical worship service that he leads at the base.

Rev. Laughlin writes: *"I was an Army Reserve chaplain and a parish pastor; I served a small, rural parish in Michigan. I currently serve as a basic training battalion chaplain at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri; I'm one of three chaplains who lead worship at the 'Liturgical Protestant Service.'*

Attendance at this service fluctuates between 50 and 200, and it's the youngest, most diverse congregation I can imagine; it is truly representative of 'every nation, tribe, people and language' (Revelation 7:9). While there are a few soldiers and families who are permanently assigned to Fort Leonard Wood in attendance, most are trainees who will attend our service for less than 22 weeks (many for only 9) while they complete Basic Combat Training (BCT) and/or Advanced Individual Training (AIT). They hail from every state and nearly every continent.



Some attend because this service is the most comfortable for them, coming from a liturgical or sacramental background (this was why I attended a similar service while in BCT and AIT). Others attend because they prefer hymns over praise music. Still others attend because of the relationship that they form with their chaplain, or because they are exploring different Christian traditions of worship. The singing fluctuates wildly in quality, as trainees are often hoarse from 'being motivated' (yelling) all week.

Then there are those trainees who attend because congregations and individuals from all over the North/West Lower Michigan Synod send me cookies for the fellowship time which follows worship each week. This has been a real gift to the trainees – those cookies are a taste of home and comfort in what is, for many of them, the most difficult and trying time in their lives."

I am thrilled that our old hymnals have found a new home and will be put to good use in the days ahead.

This month, we kick off our Storybook Summer with themes like Father's Day, summer, under the sea, and folk tales. We will host dads for donuts, and we will experience presentations from the Mobile Dairy and the Houston Museum of Natural Science's Docents to Go program. The children love when these special guests visit our school and remember these experiences long after they've ended. We will also have Splash Day twice during the month. During Splash Days, the children get dressed in their beach attire and play in baby pools and with the water hoses all afternoon. They love filling buckets and splashing each other. We also close each Splash Day with a popsicle party which is often the highlight of the week. It's amazing how much children appreciate these small treats.

We will also continue to watch our garden grow. You may be aware that we host Spring Planting Day each April. Each child brings a plant to plant in the class garden bed. Those plants are usually dead by the time summer officially begins. This year, we've added herbs, vegetables, and fruits to our gardens. We've also trained the teachers on how to help the flower gardens thrive for much longer. Ms. Denise's background in horticulture helps with this. If you have a moment, stop by the gardens and see if you notice any ripe tomatoes, squash, or juicy strawberries. You can look, but please don't pick them.

Prayer Corner - God's Steadfast Love

Read Exodus 34:6-7 and Psalm 13

"The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; his mercies never come to an end." (Lamentations 3:2)

God tells us over and over again how much we are loved. In fact, the Hebrew word *hesed*, translated as "steadfast love," is used 248 times in the Old Testament. 127 of those times are in Psalms.

God's steadfast love – *hesed* – is difficult to translate, in part because it is difficult for us to comprehend a love so great. God's love so eclipses our frail human hearts that it seems best to describe it by comparing it to ours: Our love is

like the morning dew – it quickly evaporates. God's love is unyielding, tenacious, persistent. Our love is like a blooming flower – it fades and dies. God's love is everlasting and new every morning. Our love is like the ocean waves - God's love is immovable, rock-solid, and trustworthy.

The prophet Jeremiah said the only reason Israel was not consumed was because of the Lord's *hesed* – God's steadfast love toward God's covenant people.

God is love. God's love for us is entirely underserved. God loves us despite our rebellion and sin. God's love is full of mercy. In great love, God gave us the Son. Our beautiful Savior, Jesus Christ, is the perfect expression of God's incomparable and steadfast love.

Pray: We give thanks to you, Father, that your steadfast love for us endures forever. Amen.



The Peace of God

As I write this month’s article, we have just celebrated the confirmation of six young people in our congregation. It may be a little nostalgic, but I find myself reflecting on my own confirmation and how my faith has grown over the years whenever this time of year rolls around.

My confirmation was a three year program, each year being split into two semesters. At the end of each semester we had to write a faith statement. Looking back on those statements today, it is apparent how my faith changed over those three years. My first faith statement was basically a carbon copy of the Apostles’ Creed. The creed was something that we said as a congregation every Sunday morning and my parents had taught me that the creed was an outline of our faith, so it made sense for me to use it almost as a template for a faith statement. By the end of my confirmation years, I was able to take all of the thoughts that I had about my faith and was able to put them into my own words. All of a sudden, instead of using something that my parents had promised to place into my hands in baptism, I was able to now identify, grasp, and interpret it myself.

I also remember being asked by the senior pastor what my confirmation verse would be. Truthfully I hadn’t really given that question much thought. Then, I was reading one day, and I came across Philippians 4:7. That verse in a way stopped me in my tracks, and I immediately wrote an email to the pastor saying that it would be my confirmation verse. It has now grown to be words that I live by. Knowing that although my life may feel chaotic and out of control, there is a single place that I can find peace. The hopeful truth that the peace of God is so infectious that it surpasses everything that we can understand, is such a humbling notion.

It is amazing to me how this thought first entered my head ten years ago at my confirmation, but it is still just as true today. There is one thing that is guaranteed in our life, that we are saved by grace through faith. That truth is the peace that God gives to us day in and day out!
