### **Scattered Thoughts**

I was two years old (on my way to three) when the members of Faith Lutheran Church excitedly walked through the entrance doors for the first time for the first worship service in their brand new, spacious, beautiful sanctuary.

I can imagine their excitement. Whenever we gather in the Fellowship Hall (and I compare that space to our sanctuary), I'm struck by how that might have felt.

It has been 55 years now since that day in 1963. The majestic stained glass wall lost a little luster after the fire and the vertical beams were painted brown rather than their original white. The stained glass window in the front of the sanctuary was sacrificed after the congregation realized that their new pipe organ suffered from the reverberations of the brick wall. They installed the front panel for sound absorption and soon people forgot about the window hiding back there.

We still have members who were there that day although no one has ever told me their story. I'd love to hear it. They remember the transition. I do know that Helen Watson was the first baby to be baptized in the new sanctuary - and that her parents were mindful of that and made sure that she would be the one.

A worship service is a busy time for me. Either I'm doing something or thinking about what I'm supposed to do next. But the one time when I am able to be quiet and reflective is during the offering. I listen to the choir or the special music at The Gathering. I watch the acolytes and ushers for whom I am always grateful and proud - the faithfulness of the adults, the kids who seem to be growing faster and faster, the families who gather the offering at The Gathering.

Recently, especially since our congregational meeting this past February, I pay particular

attention to the stained glass wall. I know it has problems. I know there are big holes and long cracks and little holes and rotten wood and missing caulking. But I also know that people, like our stained glass wall, accumulate lots of road grime on their journey through life too. None of us are like we used to be. It is the price we pay for sticking around this long. Our window is showing its age.

People tell me that the congregation has been kicking around ideas about caring for the wall for over 20 years. They didn't deal with it during the last capital campaign because it was going to cost too much. They were wise. The things they did spend money on - from remodeling the school to updating the sanctuary to dealing with lots of maintenance issues - are paying wonderful dividends today. We're a stronger, livelier, more mission focused congregation today because of those sacrifices and risks. Our school is as good as it has ever been. And yet the window isn't going to fix itself.

I wasn't there so I can only imagine the building committee meetings that led to the construction of our new sanctuary back in 1963. Travis Broesche was the architect - his was the vision behind the wall. Henry (his nephew) and Carolyn are still faithful members of Faith. My guess is it was quite expensive - but not as expensive as something like ornate panels depicting Bible stories. My sense is that they split the difference and constructed a wall very much in line with the excitement of growing suburban life in the early 1960s. We have long been blessed by their vision.

As you prepare for the congregational vote on August 12 about what we're going to do with the windows, I'm not going to lobby for any of the choices. I could make a strong argument for each of them. But I do want to remind you that windows in church buildings have always been about something much deeper than letting natural light in. They have always sought to augment the worship experience by setting a mood, by reflecting the glory of God.

As you consider your vote, and as you prepare for the next step which is paying for whatever we choose, do so with your eyes on the future.

What is in the long term best interests of our ministry, including stewardship of our resources? What will give us the best "bang for the buck?" What will minimize energy costs and maximize the aesthetic power of colored glass in our sanctuary.

I remain grateful for the vision and legacy of those folks who voted to build the sanctuary where we gather each week. Now it is our turn. What is the legacy that we wish to leave for those who will worship at Faith Lutheran Church 55 years from now?

As we move into August, the church council has a lot on its plate. Here is a preview of some of the coming attractions that you can expect in the weeks and months to come.

The council has called a special congregational meeting to consider and vote on options for moving forward with the stained glass window in the sanctuary. As you probably know, the window has suffered much damage through the years, and it's time to address what to do. George Amundson, the First Vice President of the congregation, has been working hard to present some options and related costs to us. Thank you, George, for all your efforts and for bringing us to this point. I look forward to seeing what the congregation decides. Once a decision is made on the stained glass window, we plan to move forward with our capital campaign as well.

The council has also been busy planning for our August congregational gathering. We had our first on-campus Leadership Gathering last January, which was a Friday evening and Saturday. While we had a good turnout and were very pleased to see so many attend, we also heard some feedback that some people did not attend because they thought it was just for church "leadership." Again, we were reminded of the power of words and their significance. These congregational gatherings are for *everyone*, and we want *everyone* to feel welcome; so we have named our August gathering "Dinner, Drinks, and Dreams." Now who can't get behind that? Look for an announcement and further information in the weeks ahead, but we currently plan on this gathering being held on Friday evening August 31, to include dinner. We want to report out on how the congregation is working toward its current annual goals, and also tap the discernment power of the congregation to dream into the future of Faith Lutheran Church. Please set this time aside on your calendar and plan to join us for this important gathering. Your voice matters!

As we look toward the fall, I am also reminded that this is the time when we will plan the church budget for the next year, and review staff compensation. We have a tremendous staff and they do a superb job of running all that our church does in a very lean and mean manner. As the church council, we monitor the church finances and are always thankful for those in our congregation who give regularly and who increase their gifts with each new stewardship campaign. And yet we know that some do not give, and some give extremely modest amounts. I imagine that some of these members have financial hardships of their own and are doing all that they can to get by. But I also imagine that some of these members who give nothing have capacity to give at some level, and yet for some reason have not understood the importance of financial giving. I pray for these people. I pray that their eyes may be opened and that they may see the importance of giving – not only to support the church, but also because it reflects their trust in and relationship with Jesus. Many of us know the joy of giving generously to our children and family, and of supporting them in ways that build them up and afford them opportunities they would not otherwise have. What if we viewed church giving in a similar way? What if we sacrificed something so that our ministries could be funded abundantly and grow in ways they could not otherwise. How joyful would we feel to see that happen and know that we contributed to it? How much would we grow in our relationship with God to reflect back the grace that God so abundantly and freely gives us? My prayer is that we all find out.

#### **Bringers of Hope**

The Lutheran Church has made a huge difference in healing the wounds and rebuilding broken lives in the midst of the ongoing political and military conflicts in the Central African Republic (CAR). This is the message that came through clear and loud if you were one of the 20 plus people who gathered at Faith to listen to Willie and Anne Langdji, the ELCA missionaries in the evening of July 9.

Since the 2012 outbreak of the violent conflict in CAR, over a million people have been forced to flee their homes (the population of CAR is close to five million). The Evangelical Lutheran Church of CAR, in partnership with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and other ecumenical partners, has done a terrific job to minister to the people who have been traumatized by the war. Various life-saving and life-changing ministries of the

church were showcased in the 10-minute video, "Bringers of Hope," that Willie and Anne showed us.

**Shelter:** Many homes were destroyed in the civil war of CAR. The Lutheran Church of CAR helped build 600 homes for the displaced people.

**Education:** Before the war, many school buildings were thatched-roof huts without walls. After the wars, the church has helped many villages build nice brick school buildings.

<u>Agriculture</u>: The church provided food, seeds, and tools to starving farmers during the crisis. The development advisors from the church also teach good farming practices and technologies to help farmers to feed their family and increase their income.

**Health Care:** The government-sponsored health care is nearly non-existent in the rural areas of CAR. It is the Lutheran church that builds village clinics to provide life-saving vaccinations and other basic health care to children, women, and men.

<u>Water</u>: So many villages in CAR do not have access to safe and clean water. The church has worked with communities to build safe water sources (such as spring boxes) and provide education about water and sanitation

The Lutheran Church of CAR continues to experience growth (both numerically and spiritually) despite of the political turmoil and

economic poverty. "People in CAR are not hiding their faith. They openly share their Christian faith with their neighbors and invite them to church," Anne Langdji said. People go to church and embrace Christian faith because the Lutheran Church of CAR has adopted a holistic approach to evangelism and church growth. The church has provided not just spiritual food but also physical food, not just Sunday worship services but also social and economic services. The church has helped save and preserve soul and body alike. The Bible says, "The LORD is my rock, my fortress and my deliverer; my God is my rock, in whom I take refuge, my shield and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold" (Psalm 18:2). I believe this prayer and praise is what our Lutheran brothers and sisters in CAR have experienced not just Sunday morning but also throughout the week.







#### <sup>6</sup> First Steps @ Faith FAQ

First Steps @ Faith begins soon and here are the answers to some of the most frequently asked questions:

WHO? First Steps @ Faith is designed for adults who want to deepen their faith. We

can imagine lots of different people that would be interested in an intentional discipleship journey such as this. Our first group of seven participants ranged in ages from 20s to 70s. It is how we support those who would like to enter preparation for baptism. Some members of our congregation might have spouses that attend worship



occasionally but have never been baptized or formally engaged the church. A parent or couple might be interested in having their child baptized, but they feel like they need a more solid foundation to their own faith before trying to teach their child about believing in God. For many adults, engaging in Bible study and sharing their faith experiences ended with confirmation when they were adolescents. Whether you are baptized or not, First Steps @ Faith is for you.

**WHAT?** First Steps @ Faith is a process of study, mentorship, and prayer sort of like confirmation for adults. The fancy church word that describes this is *catechumenate* (an organized time of Christian formation and education). We call the participants "candidates." Each candidate is matched up with a sponsor. Each week you spend time getting to know your sponsor and talking about what faith in God looks like in your life.

WHEN? Come to our interest meeting on Sunday, August 26 at 12:00 PM in the Faith Center Room 300. Lunch is available. Weekly meetings for First Steps @ Faith take place on Wednesday evenings at 7:00 PM. Childcare is available.

WHY? Having faith and believing in God is not about having the right answers. First Steps @ Faith is about building relationships. Having faith is a mysterious thing. If you are filled with doubts and questions, this journey is for you. If you already know a lot about God but are hungering for a deeper walk, this journey is also for you. Whether you are baptized or not, this is a path we walk together in learning how to follow Jesus.

Read Acts 1:21-26 and Psalm 118: 15-29

"...one of these must become a witness with us to his resurrection." (Acts 1.:22)

With Judas gone, the apostles were one person short. There was work to be done! They were still waiting to get to it, but they knew the apostolic office was theirs and that the vacancy had to be filled. Here's their one-line description of the job: "Witness to his resurrection."

There's no underestimating how important the apostles were. The Book of Acts is actually, "The Acts of the Apostles." The apostles were the Lord's chosen and sent direct eyewitnesses of the resurrection. There have been none

like them, before or after, and it is their apostolic word, as recorded in the New Testament scriptures, that is the bedrock of the Church's life and work to this day.

The resurrection is the essential message of the apostles. It confirmed that Jesus was who he claimed to be, both for the skeptics who didn't think he was fully God and also for the doubters who didn't think he could really defeat sin and death. The message of the resurrection puts both skepticism and doubt to rest. It's the basis for our hope. And it is this message we all continue to share and declare in our various callings in life.

Pray: Father in heaven, may the testimony of your Son continue to relieve doubt and unbelief in our lives. Amen.

But, come next summer, many will return for another three weeks, and others will return as staff; ready to serve and help the next kids behind them have the same experiences that they did. That really is the great adventure!
