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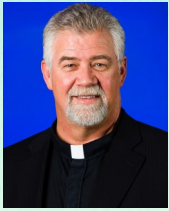

Scattered Thoughts

November opens with All Saints' Day and election day. That's an interesting combination. All Saints' reminds us of the Christian legacy that has been bequeathed to us to preserve and promote in the world. I am grateful to the people

of God of all times and places who have carried the light of Christ into our lives and have now handed the baton to us.

And election day reminds us of the great American experiment of self-governance. Neither Jesus nor Paul would or could have imagined a "one person, one vote" way of organizing our social, communal, interconnected lives. In fact, it wasn't until 1920 that WE did. Only with the ratification of the 19th amendment were women finally recognized as "persons" and included as active participants in self-government.

Should Christians care about good government? Yes. Should Christians involve themselves in government? Yes. Should Christians vote? Yes. Why? Because, when Jesus was asked about whether or not people ought to pay taxes to the government, Jesus answered, *"Give therefore to the emperor the things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's"* (Matthew 22:21).

Of course this is more complicated today because of the nature of our government. In Paul's day, Rome controlled every square inch where Paul traveled. The rules and the local ruler all came from Rome or operated only under consent from the Roman government. It was an empire. A powerful empire.

We live in a different day. We live under a government of our own choosing. We get to vote on who represents us. My sense is that this amplifies our responsibilities to be good citizens.

Further, we believe we live under a higher authority than those in Austin or

Washington...but we also believe that the positions people hold as public leaders is also a holy calling. This is why we pray for those who hold positions of leadership in just about all of our worship services.

Caring about public policy and good government is a Christian duty. Participating in the responsibilities of citizenship, including voting and paying our legally required taxes, is a Christian duty. Paying attention to governmental actions at all levels is a Christian duty. Speaking out and speaking up are Christian duties.

Christians disagree strongly with each other about where they stand on individual issues. As people of good will, sometimes that means we have to agree to disagree, and sometimes we have to admit that we are wrong and change our minds.

For example, on October 1 I received a letter from a California organization called "Pray for America" that included a flyer from the "Faith and Freedom Coalition." The letter listed what they believe Christians should be concerned about and the flyer endorsed the Republican candidate from Texas for the U.S. Senate. I don't think that is appropriate. No political party has cornered the market on Christian values or principles.

The letter listed three problems they see in public education that Christians ought to be concerned about - students not allowed to pray, teachers not allowed to read the Bible to their classes, and the gender/bathroom issue. Why those?

I think we all know that there are real challenges today in public education and that Christians ought to care. Why? Because Jesus cared for children and lifted them up before the adults of his day. Because we believe that every human being is a gift from God and blessed to be a blessing in the world. An education unlocks those gifts and hones them for service in the world. Christians ought to be first in line to defend and improve public education. This was, by the way, a major emphasis for Martin Luther. What good was a Bible in German if Germans couldn't read it?

Christian values would include seeing that poor kids and rich kids both get the advantages of excellent schools with the equipment and the resources they need to succeed. Teachers should be well compensated and free to use their gift for teaching kids instead of teaching for some kind of standardized test. Those, and many others, are all issues of public policy. We should care about such things. No one can stop a student from praying!

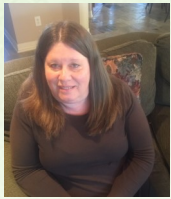

As much as I initially felt a bit out of place heading into an adult Learning Group room, the past several weeks have been a real blessing for me. I have met new people, and gotten to know them (as well as some old friends) on a deeper level. I have been able to share some things about myself that were not easy, and yet it felt good to be vulnerable and open. I have been led to think about aspects of my faith on a deeper level, and to enrich my understanding of the weekly scripture readings. I have been reminded anew of why "learning" is one of our three missional focuses at Faith – it really is critical to each of our spiritual growth and development.

So as an outgrowth of this experience, I want to encourage each of you to try something new this fall at Faith. Even for us old dogs, there are always new things to try, which will bring us unexpected blessings. What has God been nudging you to do, that you might be resisting? If you have been sleeping in, is it time for you to participate in a Learning Group on Sunday morning? If you have been participating in a Learning Group, is it time for you to think about leading one? If you have been attending worship, is it time for you to think about becoming a worship leader? If you have been enjoying the bell choir, is it time for you to think about joining them? In short, if you have been on the sidelines, is it time for you to enter the game and play on God's team?

To every thing there is a season. What season of your faith life is God calling you to be a part of this fall?

Having Enough to Be Thankful

The holiday season starts with Thanksgiving. Without the attitude of gratitude, the holiday season will most likely make you feel dreary, grumpy, exhausted, even depressed. Here are three stories that teach the lesson of gratitude:

Story one: A man one day ran to his Rabbi and said, "Rabbi, you have to help me. My house is hell. We live in one room, my wife, my children, my in-laws, and me. It's hell! There's not enough room for all of us." The Rabbi smiled and said, "Okay. I'll help you, but you have to promise to do whatever I say." The man said, "I promise, I really promise! It's a solemn promise." The Rabbi said, "How many animals do you have?" The man said, "A cow, a goat, and six chickens." The Rabbi said, "Put the animals in the room and come back in a week." The man did not believe what he was hearing, but he had promised. He went back home depressed. However, he indeed brought the animals into the room. The next week, he went back discouraged and said to the Rabbi, "I'm going crazy! I'm going to end up having a stroke. You have to do something..." And the Rabbi said, "Go back home and put the animals outside. Come back to see me in a week." The man went running back to his house and did what he was told to do. And when he came back the next week, his eyes were shining, and he said "Rabbi, the house is a wonder, so clean, so spacious. It's paradise!"

The attitude of gratitude and scarcity mentality cannot coexist in your heart. Do you believe that you have enough to be thankful? You do not need to compare with others to decide whether you have enough or not. You can count your blessings now and give thanks.

Story two: There's an old European story about a traveler who came upon a barn where the devil had stored seeds that he planned to sow in the hearts of people. There were bags of seeds variously marked "Hatred," "Fear," "Lust," "Despair," "Unforgiveness," "Envy," "Greed," "Drunkenness." Out from the shadow, the devil appeared and struck up a conversation with the traveler. He gleefully told the traveler how easily the seeds sprouted in the hearts of men and women everywhere. "Tell me," the traveler asked, "are there any hearts in which these seeds will not sprout?" Glancing about carefully, the devil slyly confessed, "These seeds will never be sprouted in the heart of a kind, generous, thankful and joy-filled person."

Jesus admonished us, "Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions" (Luke 12:15). Apostle Paul talks about the fruit of the Spirit, "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control" (Galatians 5:22,23). As followers of Jesus, we are to cultivate, share and be grateful for the riches of spiritual life.

Story three: A Zen master lived in a little hut up in the hills. He did not own many things. He lived a simple life. One night when the master was away, a thief broke into the hut only to discover that there was nothing to steal. The master returned and caught the burglar. "You have put yourself to much trouble to visit me," he said, "You must not go away empty-handed. Please take my clothes and blanket as a gift." The thief, quite bewildered, took the clothes and escaped into the night. The master sat down naked, looking at the moon, its silvery light spilling over the mountains, making all things quite beautiful. "Poor man," lamented the master, "I wish I could give him the gorgeous moonlight."

Do you feel so abundantly blessed that you are willing to share? God blesses us so that we may be a blessing to others. It is when we are willing to share God's blessings that we truly experience the joy and abundance of living. There are many opportunities in church and the community for you to share, to give, and to bless during this holiday season and beyond.

6 Faith Library Re-Opens

Many thanks to Sara Karow, Laura Swanson, Gary Chaffee, and the Women's Connection for their help in getting our library reorganized and putting our catalog online. Here are some Frequently Asked Questions about the library:

What types of books are in the library? Biblical studies, Christian living and novels, children's books and much more!

What if I want to browse the library, but I am unable to get there? You can browse our library by logging into <https://www.librarything.com/catalog/FaithLC-Bellaire>. Browse the list or use "**Search this library**" to search by title or author.

How do I check out a book? Self-checkout is available during library hours using the card system for now. Instructions are posted in the library.

When can I use the library? The library is open Monday through Friday 8AM – 5PM. Please sign in at the church office on the first floor. The library is open on a limited basis on Sundays to pick up books.

Can I pick up a book on Sundays? Yes. On Sunday mornings the room is used for a learning group. However, the library is open on a limited basis before and after services and learning groups. Friendly reminder that on Sundays, staff and volunteers are focused on Worship and learning groups and unable to assist with computer log in, etc.

Does the library have a computer? Yes. There is one computer in the library and is available Monday – Friday from 8AM – 5PM, please check in at the church office on the first floor to obtain the guest log in. If you need to print a document, please limit printing to a maximum of 4 sheets.

Can all books be checked out? No. Some books are fragile and should be handled with extreme care. Those books are in a special section marked **Not for Circulation**. Those books can be reviewed, but please do not remove them from the library.

Can I check out DVDs and study guides? We are still organizing and cataloging books and other media. If there is something you want to check out, but there is not a card jacket and check out card, please leave us a note.

What if I want to donate gently used books I have at home? We are not accepting donations of used books at this time, but appreciate the thought. There are other organizations, such as CCSC and Houston Public Library Foundation, which accept gently used books.

What if I want to donate a new book? We appreciate your interest in building our library. A wish list of new books is available here: <http://a.co/aPmaHZ9>.

Are young children allowed in the library? Yes. We have a children's section and table for the children to read. We ask that all children under 12 years old be accompanied by an adult (parent or caregiver).

What if I have other questions? Contact the library volunteers Sara Karow and Laura Swanson at library@faithbellaire.com.

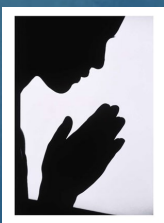
