Scattered Thoughts

"Beware of the yeast of the Pharisees, that is, their hypocrisy. Nothing is covered up that will not be uncovered, and nothing secret that will not become known."

Luke 12:1b-2

As a pastor, and as a Christian, it is painful to log into our hometown newspaper to read an exposé about the extent to which Christian congregations deny, hide, and cover up the emotional, physical, and spiritual violence that results from sexual abuse and predatory behaviors.

For many years now we have heard about the sexual abuse of young people at the hands of Roman Catholic priests. Just last month an archbishop was kicked out of the priesthood both because of his own actions and his covering up the sexual misbehaviors of others. Now we learn about the same thing happening in Southern Baptist congregations. We shouldn't be surprised.

The truth is that no institution, that is, nowhere that people come together in relationships, is immune from the possibility of the sexual exploitation of the innocent, the vulnerable, and the gullible. As Luke writes, eventually everything comes to the light, but first it is hidden away in secrecy, shame, and denial.

Further, the truth is that most sexual molestation happens within relationships where the perpetrator is a trusted family member, friend, or person in authority. When the behavior is exposed, the common reactions include blaming the victim, defending the perpetrator – I just can't believe that he possibly could have done this! – or covering it up as if it was a one-time thing, a slip, an accident, that

won't ever happen again. The broader public reaction is often limited to outrage, shame, and retributive justice – they should cut 'em up, lock 'em up, and throw away the key!

The problem is that those reactions, understandable though they are, ignore the painful reality that sexual abuse and exploitation result from, create, and perpetuate on-going cycles. Very commonly, it is about victims victimizing victims. This seems counter-intuitive. You would think that a person who suffered physical or sexual abuse at the hands of a person in authority in their lives would be the last ones who would do the same thing to someone else. But physical and sexual abuse are profoundly irrational, even pre-rational. They are symptoms of the underlying effects of undiagnosed and/or untreated trauma. Shame doesn't heal trauma; shame fuels trauma.

So what can we do that will make a difference? First, we need to recognize that, until we can move beyond shame and denial, the cycles will continue. Anything we can do to treat mental illness, and encourage mental health – just like we treat physical illness and encourage physical health - the more we can break cycles of abuse and prevent future abuse. Perpetrators, or those inclined to become perpetrators, need to hear that there are resources and treatment available to them before they cross lines that can't be uncrossed. Victims need spaces where they can speak their truth and process their pain without shame and with support.

Second, every institution needs firm policies in place that seek to prevent abuse. Here at Faith we have our "Safe Haven Policy," clearly written guidelines of how we operate to keep young people safe. We are also very clear that any allegations of sexual or physical abuse will be handled directly and confidentially. Pastor Tan and I are both compelled by law and professional ethics to report abuse of children or the elderly to the appropriate state agency. And we will! And there is a clear policy that, should a pastor be the perpetrator, our response will include both the bishop and the legal authorities. There will be no denial, or covering up, should something like that occur at Faith.

No one can understand the devastation and the life-long pain that someone carries as a victim of sexual abuse. It is essential that we do everything we can to prevent such abuse in our church, in our homes, in our schools, and in our community. And that we be a safe place for people to find opportunities to name and seek healing for the scars that they carry.

My son John, a sixth grader, started confirmation last Fall. As a parent, I have accompanied him and participated with him in the confirmation class from the beginning. In January and February, the confirmation students and parents took three field trips to visit three houses of worship: the Congregation Brith Shalom, the River Oaks Islamic Center, and the ChristChurch Presbyterian. At each house of worship, one or two spiritual leaders spent 90 minutes to two hours with us, explaining to us their religious beliefs and practices, answering questions that we had about their faith traditions. I'd like to say these three visits were truly eye-opening experiences. To walk into different worship spaces with different religious symbols has made me more aware of my Lutheran Christian

identity. At the same time, to listen to and converse with religious leaders who share with us their unique understandings of God and life has also led me to affirm the common spiritual identity that I have shared with all people. That is, all human beings are children of God regardless of our different faith traditions and cultural, ethnic backgrounds.

In Genesis 2, God first created Adam. In the Gospel of Luke, the author traces the genealogy of Jesus all the way back to Adam, and then ultimately to God. Why is that? One Jewish tradition explains it this way:

For this reason a single human being only was created at the time of Creation: to teach you that whoever destroys a single life, Scripture reckons it to him as though he had destroyed a whole world; and whoever saves a single life, Scripture reckons it to him as though he had saved a whole world.

Also for the sake of peace among human beings, so that a man should not say to his fellow: "My father is greater than your father." Also to prevent the heretics from saying that there are many divine powers in heaven, each one responsible for the creation of a different human being.

And also to proclaim the greatness of the Holy One, praised by He. If a human being stamps several coins with the same die, they all resemble one another. But the King of the kings of kings, the Holy One, praised be he, stamps all human beings with the die of the first man; and yet not one of them resembles the other. (Jakob J. Petuchowski, Our Masters Taught: Rabbinic Stories and Sayings, p. 15)

We Christians believe Jesus is the descendent of Adam. When we read the stories of how Jesus Christ treated people with different ethnic, religious backgrounds and moral standings, it becomes imperative that we need to follow in Jesus' footsteps and affirm the dignity and value of every human being. We are to affirm that everyone is a child of God, everyone is a brother or sister of Jesus Christ, and therefore everyone belongs to a single family—the family of God. In this big family of God, we all are brothers and sisters. A tale from the Hindu tradition goes like this:

A Guru asked his disciples how they could tell when the night had ended and the day begun.

One said, "When you see an animal in the distance and can tell whether it is a cow or a horse."

"No," said the Guru. "When you look at a tree in the distance and can tell if it is a neem tree or a mango tree."

"Wrong again," said the Guru. "Well, then, what is it?" asked his disciples.

"When you look into the face of any man and recognize your brother in him; when you look into the face of any woman and recognize in her your sister. If you cannot do this, no matter what time it is by the sun, it is still night." (Anthony De Mello, Taking Flight: A Book of Story Meditations, p. 161)

Jesus is the light of world. "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it" (John 1:5). "But if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin" (1 John 1:7). Now, let us think about it and ask ourselves:

What are the sins that we need to be cleansed from?

What are the ideologies that divide people instead of uniting people, exclude people instead of welcome people?

What are the racist and nationalist slogans that put one group of people above and over the rest of humanity?

What are the political, religious, moral prejudices and judgements that cause more conflicts and divisions in the family of God?

Let us ask God to forgive and cleanse our sins. Let us work together in the ministry of reconciliation—to be reconciled with God, to be reconciled with one another. Let us practice in our personal and public life the spiritual truth that is taught in the Scripture: "for in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith. As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:26-28).

Youth Ministry in the Digital Age

Over the past several months I have been thinking about the ways that I reach out and interact with the youth of our church. This is something that is always in my mind, but lately I have been considering the High Schoolers particularly following our retreat to Lutherhill last month. On that retreat I was able to have conversations directly with the high school students and get a sense of how they communicate and interact with each other. Through these conversations we decided that we would start to meet on a weekly basis, each Saturday evening, online and create a Virtual Youth Group. At first I was hesitant to consider such an idea since it would not be a weekly youth group as I was accustomed to from my high school years. But then something clicked in my mind; perhaps to build a High School Youth program that is successful

I would need to integrate myself into *their* world rather than finding ways for the high schoolers to integrate into *mine*. What this means is that maybe high school students of today don't feel the need for the in-person element of relationships to feel like they are connecting with one another and the world around them.

So I came back from the retreat thinking that surely someone out in the world had done a study on how teenagers interact with each other and the methods that they employ. What I came across was a Pew Research Study from 2015 that surveyed over one thousand teenagers ages 13 to 17. The following are some of the study's findings that I thought were particularly interesting:

- When asked the top places where teens hang out with close friends, 55% said they hang out using online methods while only 21% said they hang out at places of worship.
- 94% of teens spend time with their friends on social media (facebook, instagram, snapchat) and 83% of teens say that social media makes them feel more connected to their friends' lives.
- 68% of teens say that they have received support during hard times through digital means and social media.
- 60% of teens use video chat methods to stay connected with their close friends.

After looking at the study I quickly came to the realization that this is how teens connect in today's world. In turn, if I am to build a program that means something to today's youth, perhaps this is the mindset that I also need to be in. This reinforced for me the decision to utilize an online video conference platform to host Youth Group. The kids are able to participate regardless of where they live, and it allows for significant schedule adaptability while at the same time creating a space to connect to one another in a way that high schoolers already consider to be worthwhile and valid.

I am excited to see how this new program goes, and to see how it can potentially lead to something that is a building block for future programs in Youth and Family Ministry!

And CCSC helps our community's most vulnerable population through its Back to School program, Jingle Bell Express, and Vision Care program for underprivileged students.



The following is CCSC "by the numbers" for 2018:

26,125

Clients supplied with nutritious food packages.

893

Households received electricity, water, natural gas, or rent assistance

7,370

Persons were provided with gently-used clothing.

461

Job seekers gained valuable skills through workshops, computer training, and personalized coaching with 30% gaining employment

6.502

Students started the academic year with new school supplies and clothing

2,865

Children received new toys, books, and family food packages for Christmas

1,458


Student received vision screening, **494** were provided professional eye exams, with **449** receiving new prescription glasses.

In addition, **283** persons received medical assistance for eyeglasses, dental services, or prescription medication; **7,917** pounds of produce was harvested for clients at the CCSC garden; and **231** motivated entrepreneurs participated in a 42-hour vocational training program.

To accomplish its ministry—Faith's ministry as a CCSC member church—CCSC relies on volunteerism, in-kind donations, and cash donations. CCSC's primary fundraiser is the **Azalea Dinner**. This year, the event will be held **May 2, 2019**, at the Post Oak Hilton. The evening is a fun night of fellowship (as we enjoy a meal together), learning (as we hear from CCSC staff and volunteers), and shopping (silent and live auctions). 

Take "Stock" in our High School Ministry March 3 and 10 Lobby


