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

Scattered Thoughts

The earliest morning class I took during my years in seminary was my course on the prophets, with special focus on Jeremiah. The professor was a kind, gentle, softspoken man long past retirement

age. His soothing voice and my "I just got out of bed a few minutes ago" were a fatal match. I didn't learn much. But what I did learn keeps coming back to me again and again.

Jeremiah was an "object lesson" prophet. He experienced in his life what he was telling the people of Israel on God's behalf. That makes for some seriously strange moments in his life.

In the thirteenth chapter, he buys and buries some cotton underwear by the river. Later he dug them up. They were ruined just like Jerusalem was soon to be ruined.

In the eighteenth chapter, he goes to watch a potter at their craft and sees in that a symbol of the ways that God painstakingly worked in shaping the lives of God's people. In the nineteenth chapter, Jeremiah breaks a pot to emphasize what was soon to happen to Israel.

In the twenty-seventh chapter, Jeremiah wears a wooden oxen yoke out in public as a sign of the yoke of the Babylonians that would soon be visited upon Jerusalem.

I think you get my point.

Through the years, those lessons from Jeremiah have come back to me again and again. They keep reminding me that we can't confuse the good times of our lives with God's favor any more than we can confuse the difficult times as signs that God is punishing us or deserting us.

Instead, the eyes of faith tell us that there is a lesson in everything. That God is always at work. And that "spirituality" - as in "the Spirit PLUS my reality" - invites us to ask, and to wonder about, "What is God up to in this? Where is God leading me/us? How best ought I respond?"

I'm actually writing this on Maundy Thursday as I'll be away after Easter. I was originally planning on a continuing education trip to Greece and Turkey but that has been postponed until next year. But then my daughter got into a very bad emotional place and needed help. Thus, instead, a pile of books and I are headed to Big Bend on my way to participating in Family Week at a treatment center in Arizona. I didn't see that coming but I'm grateful for it. I trust that our extended family will make the most of it.

Even though I'm writing this before Easter Sunday morning I am well aware that we have lived IN Easter for 2000 years. The empty tomb is the beginning of the Christian movement. The empty tomb tells us that the Jesus way of being in the world is the healthiest, most loving, most healing, most wholistic way of being – because that is how we are created to live. We forget that, we ignore that, we reject that. But God doesn't forget, ignore, or reject us. We can't have Easter Sunday in this world without Good Friday. But Easter wins in the end and even in the crucifixion, though it seemed like God disappeared, God was right there. At work. Bringing life out of death.

And that all means that there will be a little Jeremiah in all of us. We will experience, in all the chances and changes of our lives, the growing pains of acceptance and rejection, of rebellion and return, of idolatry and faithfulness, of sickness and health. Our lives become object lessons, ever reminding us that God is ever and always at work in us. With us. Through us.

Who would have known that the sleepiest, most boring, most confusing class I took in three years of seminary education, would have grown to be the most helpful and the most impactful class of all?

Who would have thought that the story of an empty tomb would still inspire, comfort, challenge, and confound us 2000 years later?

God. Because God knows what God is doing. And it is good. Very good. Happy Easter Life!

Making All Things New

A series of bombings hits hotels and churches in Sri Lanka, killing more than 350 people. Over 500 people were wounded. It happened on Easter Sunday. Many of the victims were Christians attending Easter services. This hideous crime and many other senseless, tragic, horrendous happenings in the world have provoked many questions: Why? Why on Easter morning? What difference has Easter made? Has the resurrection of Jesus changed anything?

If you read the resurrections stories in the New Testament, you will find that Jesus' resurrection was not a headline at all. A lot of people in Jerusalem witnessed or heard about the crucifixion of Jesus on Good Friday. But very few knew or heard about the resurrection of Jesus on the first Easter. Only a few women

followers of Jesus went and saw the empty tomb and encountered the angels announcing of the good news of the resurrection of the Lord. When the women reported the incredible news to the disciples, their words "seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them" (Luke 24:11). It was as if the first Easter was not going to change anyone or anything in the first century Palestine.

But then, the risen Lord appeared to the disciples on various occasions. Upon seeing the risen Lord, the disciples went through a miraculous

transformation of life.

The risen Lord appeared to Peter. The one who denied Jesus three times was given the triple commands to "feed my lambs," "tend my sheep," and "tend my sheep."

The risen Lord appeared to Paul. The former persecutor of the followers of Jesus became one of the great pillars of the early Christian movement.

Everywhere the disciples preached, the power of Easter began to work in people's lives. Beautiful things began to happen. Cruelty began to give way to mercy; hatred began to give way to love; division began to give way to reconciliation; pagan immorality began to give way to Christian morality. In the period of



three hundred years, the Easter faith had firmly taken root in and transformed the Roman Empire. The Easter faith has become the most significant spiritual force that has shaped the world ever since.

In the past two millenniums, the Good News of the risen Jesus inspired and transformed countless individuals, whose daring faith and action has helped transform the world: St. Francis of Assisi, Martin Luther, John Calvin, John Wesley, Mother Teresa, Martin Luther King Jr. ...

Margaret Mead said, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed, citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has." Leo Tolstoy said, "Everyone thinks of changing the world, but no one thinks of changing himself." Mahatma Gandhi: "Be the change that you wish to see in the world."

Jesus says, "See, I am making all things new" (Revelation 21:5)! How is Jesus doing it? Through people like Peter and Paul, like you and me who are willing to be changed by his resurrection power. Let us remember what our baptism is all about, "...we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:4).

⁶ My Pastoral Internship

Many of you know that I have officially begun my internship at Faith. This is part of my preparation for candidacy in Word and Sacrament ministry. Through the Collaborative Learning program at Wartburg Theological Seminary I am able to stay in place and use Faith as my internship site. This is really a blessing for me and my family. I can't imagine doing seminary or internship in any other way.

My internship will last 18 months. It started in February 2019 and will go through August 2020. This is about six months longer than a traditional seminary internship that would that would take place in over the third

year of seminary. Another difference with my internship is that I also take classes while I'm an intern. I am finishing up my second year of course work now, and have two more years to go.

Part of my internship includes meeting regularly with an Internship Committee. We meet about every other month and talk about what my goals are for internship and what I am learning. I am grateful for this team of people that are helping me get the most out of this time or preparation:

I have lots of learning goals for my internship. I want to develop my sense of pastoral leadership. I want to grow my theological articulation of the Lutheran faith. I want to develop my pastoral voice through preaching. I want to expand my experience in worship leadership. I want to develop my skills at providing pastoral care to people. I want to integrate stewardship practices into all areas of my ministry (this includes stewarding my life as well as time, talent, and money). I want to increase my experiences in teaching adults and well as youth and children. I want to enrich my knowledge of church administration. I want to consider the role of evangelism in ministry. I want to develop my pastoral ethic through social ministry. I would welcome a conversation with you about what I'm learning in any of these areas.

I have already registered for my classes for the Fall 2019. I will be taking a full time course load that includes classes in Church History, Lutheran Ethics, Palestinian Liberation Theology, Loss and Grief, and a Lived Theology seminar. I think these are going to be really interesting classes and I can't wait to start reading the books for them.

Read Romans 12:1-8 and Psalm 66:3-20

The Faith of a Child

"Then he said, "I tell you the truth, unless you turn from your sins and become like little children, you will never get into the Kingdom of Heaven." Matthew 18:3

Easter is such a joyous time. We spend an entire 40 days, excluding Sundays, to prepare for Christ's triumphant resurrection. This year's Easter Vigil was the perfect reminder to me of what it means to be a child of God, and to simply have faith. At the vigil this year we celebrated the baptism of seven individuals. One of the candidates was a little girl, who visibly could not wait for her turn. From the moment that those

who were to be baptized began to move towards the font, she had a constant smile on her face. That smile only got wider as the water began to pour from the pitcher into the font. The girl was so excited that she actually had to be held back from wanting to touch the water. Then when it was her turn, and the candle was handed to her and she was addressed for the first time as "child of God," it was apparent the joy that was surrounding her and the room in that moment. Her smile widened even further, and just stood quietly grinning. Then when it was time to extinguish her candle and return to her seat, she verbally said that she didn't want to put the candle out and that it was her light. She did blow it out carefully, then galloped around behind the chairs before returning to her seat.

All of this reminded me what it means to be a follower of Christ. To be truly joyous in the promises that have been made to us through baptism. It is something that we cannot get anywhere else, and it amazes me that it took seeing a small child taking such joy in it in order for me to take joy in my own faith.

The experience also reminded me of a story that was told to me at camp. The story was about a woman who went out to an expensive dinner. After she had finished her entree, the server came to clear her dishes. The server reached down to take her plate, but the woman stopped the server and said, "let me keep the fork, I know what is coming next." The thing that was coming next was dessert, and the woman knew that it was exactly what she was wanting.

These stories are excellent reminders of knowing what it means to be a child of God. Showing God's love and grace through small and large things, among the people that we interact with everyday. The smiles on our faces may be noticed by someone who needed to see it, and we can always be someone who can remind people that there is hope in the future and that they should "keep their fork." Everything that we do can be a reflection of God's love in the world. He is the vine, and we are the branches. This is what Easter meant to me this year, and I pray that each of you have a blessed Easter season.

Why is the Christian Community Service Center's (CCSC) Azalea Dinner worth my time and money?

Faith is one of 42 area Christian churches working together through CCSC to reduce the effects of poverty in our community. CCSC helps families in crisis through its food pantry, where clients can turn for food, clothing, and financial assistance. CCSC helps get people back to work through its JobNet and Martha's Way programs. And CCSC helps our community's most vulnerable population through its Back to School program, Jingle Bell Express, and Vision Care program for underprivileged students. The following is CCSC "by the numbers" for 2018

28,816

Clients supplied with nutritious food packages.

772

Households received electricity, water, natural gas, or rent assistance

7,606

Persons were provided with gently-used clothing.

455

Job seekers gained valuable skills through workshops, computer training, and personalized coaching with 32% gaining employment

6,573

Students started the academic year with new school supplies and clothing

2,662

Children received new toys, books, and family food packages for Christmas

1,109

Students received vision screening, **588** were provided professional eye exams, with **539** receiving new prescription glasses.


In addition, **237** persons received medical assistance for eyeglasses, dental services, or prescription medication; **6,975** pounds of produce was harvested for clients at the CCSC garden; and **269** motivated entrepreneurs participated in a 42hour vocational training program.

To accomplish its ministry—Faith's ministry as a CCSC member church—CCSC relies on volunteerism, in-kind donations, and cash donations. CCSC's primary fundraiser is the **Azalea Dinner**. This year, the event will be held **May 2, 2019**, at the Post Oak Hilton. The evening is a fun night of fellowship (as we

enjoy a meal together), learning (as we hear from CCSC staff and volunteers), and shopping (silent and live auctions). Please help Faith fill tables at this event.
