Scattered Thoughts

For most of our history in the United States, congregations like ours used the month of October to emphasize Christian stewardship – how we use our God-given gifts of time, personal talents, and money. It made a lot of sense. But we haven't done that for

the past few years at Faith. Here's why:

In a largely agrarian society, and with the majority of Lutheran churches located in small town and rural areas, October was a great month to talk about financial stewardship. October meant that the harvest had been gathered and people were usually feeling pretty flush. It is much easier to talk about generosity when the granaries are full. And, for the business side of congregational life, setting next year's budget usually happened in November or December. It made sense.

Times have changed. Many things have changed.

Time itself has changed. We have more time-saving, labor-saving, automatic gizmos, gadgets, and systems, than anyone in history. And yet, how can we STILL feel like there aren't nearly enough hours in the day?

There was a time when it was normal for people to sit down together around a table for an evening meal at 6:00 PM. What happened to that? There was a time when people got off work at 5:00 PM and went home. Who does that anymore?

How we use our personal gifts and talents has changed. The stuff we are gifted to do, the stuff we love to do, the stuff God created us to do – continue to be poured out into the world. But the world is thirsty and it never feels like there is enough of us to go around.

People work so hard these days. They leave early, get home late, and spend hours squeezing kids into the family cab for the trip to the next practice, or lesson, or scout meeting, or therapy session. People feel stretched to the breaking point. It isn't easy to add volunteering to that mix.

Money has changed. Some people don't feel flush, or even get paid, until they receive their quarterly or year-end bonuses. Others look forward to a little raise on January 1st, or the little boost when they get their tax refund. Still others live on retirement income and worry that they will outlive their money.

Read Philippians 4:10-20 and Psalm 9:1-11

"I can do all things through him who strengthens me." (Philippians 4:13)



In the children's story, "The Little Engine That Could," the little engine didn't let the size of the mountain deter him. The engine focused instead on the greatest needs of the children and mustered all its strength to complete its mission, saying, "I think I can, I think I can."

The apostle Paul is like the little engine of the New Testament. Paul knew that the Good News of Jesus Christ needed to be shared with God's children throughout the world. Very few people get paid on Friday afternoon in cash so they are ready to put some in the little offering envelops the church used to use.

Most of us never see real money anymore. Our income is an electric blip into an account from which few of us ever write checks. Most of our bills, maybe even including our church offering, are set up for automatic payment. Far too many of us have credit cards that get used far too often, usually when we feel we have no other choice. It can be very painful when that fiddler needs to be paid.

Times have changed. Yet I don't think any of us, if we think deeply about yesterday, want to go back there. We've become accustomed to cell phones and cable TV – even though we pay many times more per month for our cell and cable services than we used to pay for a phone and free TV.

What does that mean for the church and all that happens in and through congregational life?

First, it means that people have less time to do things around church. When congregational life is given high priority in peoples' lives, they have time to show up and participate. They just don't have the time to think of things, plan things, or organize things. So the role of the church staff has greatly expanded. And the work of the church staff is absolutely dependent on people showing up and participating.

Second, it means that we can no longer easily rest upon the "we've always done it this way before" way of doing things. Far too many of those things no longer work. This means that we all need to be much more intentional about our discipleship. We all need to prioritize our lives, make new commitments in our lives, to do things that used to just be the natural "how everybody does it." Back in the day, if your family sat down to eat at 6:00 PM, you knew that all of your friends were probably doing the same thing. But if you want that family time together today it is going to require a level of choices and time management that no one used to have to do.

Third, it has always been the case but perhaps now more than ever—our homes remain the primary training ground for Christian discipleship. We join together as a congregation to help one another through life, to help people find connections, to help parents raise children but it is when we are away from the property of the church that all of that gets real. Or it doesn't. We all need to take personal responsibility for our part in all of that.

So that is why we don't do the big stewardship focus in October in the ways we used to. Because Christian stewardship today can't be a once a year thing. We all know it takes money to have a congregation and it takes generous congregations to keep other ministries alive and flourishing beyond what we can do ourselves. We need to be encouraging one another about how we use our time, talents, and treasures all year long. We encourage each other as we come to know and remember that we're all in this ministry of Faith Lutheran Church together.

Please do enjoy having dinner together sometime in October. May our gatherings remind us that we're all in this together.

My Rock, My Fortress, and My Deliverer

I love you, O Lord, my strength. The Lord is my rock, my fortress, and my deliverer, my God, my rock in whom I take refuge, my shield, and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold. I call upon the Lord, who is worthy to be praised, so I shall be saved from my enemies. Psalm 18:1-3

Many psalms are attributed to David, who praised God for being his strength, his rock, his fortress, his deliverer, his stronghold, and his salvation. When we read Psalm 18 and many other psalms, we cannot help but be touched by his heartfelt love and gratitude for God. When we read the story of David that is recorded in the books of 1 and 2 Samuel, we see the great and miraculous

things God did to protect and deliver David.

David was the rising star in Saul's court and army. Saul became so jealous and fearful of David that he was determined to kill him, but God saved and protected David from the hand of Saul.

First, God sent friends and allies to help David. Saul gave his daughter Michal to David in marriage with an evil intent, but Michal fell in love with David. She disobeyed her father and helped David escape. Saul's son Jonathan loved David as his own son, he became David's loyal friend and ally. Jonathan's friendship and confidence in David was vital to his survival and eventual triumph. Nabal, a wealthy man, humiliated David and his men, Nabal's wife Abigail successfully persuaded David not to shed innocent blood in rage. After the sudden death of Nabel, Abigail became David's wife. Her wisdom and wealth became an important asset to David who was a fugitive.

Second, God strengthened David's faith in his plan for him and Israel. He had two chances to kill Saul, but he refrained from doing so. Why? Because he said, "As the Lord lives, the Lord will strike him down; or his day will come to die, and he will go down into battle and perish. The Lord forbid that I should raise my hand against the Lord's anointed" (1 Samuel 26:10-11). David was a warrior, not hesitant to kill his enemies. But killing Saul was a different matter. If David's hands were stained with the blood of Saul, he would not have gained the trust and support of the northern tribes of Israel years later. His road to the throne of Israel would have been much more torturous. It was God's invisible hand that prevented David from killing Saul.

Third, God gave David the wisdom and audacity to seek refuge among the arch enemies of Israel, the Philistines. Saul hunted and persecuted David for years. In desperate, David and his men fled to King Achish of Gath. Achish even gave David the city Ziklag to live in. While David lived among the enemies of Israel, he still remained loyal to his own people. Did David think of Ziklag when he wrote the verse "I take refuge in you LORD" (Psalm 31:1)? God works in mysterious ways, often contrary to conventional wisdom. It is our job to seek, to recognize, and to accept God's help in whatever form or shape, in all times and places.

David was one of the greatest kings of ancient Israel. He was also a man with deep character flaws. During his lifetime, David shed much blood, committed many grave sins, and had many failures. His sins and failures had long-lasting and devastating impacts on his family, his dynasty, and the nation. Like everyone of us, David was saved by God's grace. He accepted God's grace by repenting of his sins. David wrote these words after committing adultery with Bathsheba: "Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love, according to your abundant mercy blot out my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin" (Psalm 51:1-2).

How does God help us in difficult and trying situations, such as unemployment, divorce, freak accidents, and natural disasters? How does God defend us against malignant forces bent on harming and hurting us, like violence, hatred, terrorists, poverty, and injustice? How does God deliver us from our own sins and sins of our enemies? How does God save us from illness, disability, aging, and death? May we find clues and hints from the stories and Psalms of David. May we keep trusting God and following Jesus, who is our Savior and Lord, our great physician and deliverer.

Report from TUNE UP 2019

The TUNE UP Worship Band Gathering took place at Christ Church United Methodist Church Sugar Land on August 17, 2019. The TUNE UP gathering is an annual event in the Texas-Louisiana Gulf Coast Synod for contemporary church musicians. Over 50 participants from 20 different churches gathered in the Houston area in August for a day of training and networking. This was the sixth annual event that brings together a diverse group of leaders and participants to work on issues related to band-led worship in a congregation.

One of the unique things about TUNE UP is the multi-denominational atmosphere. This year musicians and worship leaders from Lutheran, Methodist, Baptist, Nazarene, and non-denominational churches all participated in an ecumenical and collegial environment.

The gathering began with opening worship and presentations from Clayton Faulkner (Director of Worship, Faith Lutheran, Bellaire, TX), Craig Gilbert (Purposed Heart Ministries, Alvin, TX), and Mark Swayze (Pastor of Contemporary Music and Community Growth, The Woodlands United Methodist Church, The Woodlands, TX). Words of welcome were offered by DeAndre Johnson (Pastor of Music and Worship Life, Christ Church Sugar Land, TX). The opening worship band was formed by the track leaders for the day. This included music led by Brian Christopher Clay (Worship Leader and Director of Communications and AV technology, St. John's Lutheran Church, Knoxville, TN).

Healthy relationships among band members quickly emerged as one of the main takeaways for the day. Many of the struggles and conflicts that bands run into can be

best addressed through healthy relational connectedness both at and away from church. Leading worship together begins with mutual

respect and care for one another.



After opening worship everyone divided into instrumental, vocal, and tech breakout groups. The instrumental breakout groups were divided by specific area (worship leader, acoustic/electric guitar, bass guitar, keyboard, drums, vocals, and sound tech). There were also conceptual track offerings in the afternoon that included sessions on leading in humility, working with what you've got in your specific context, invitational leadership, and running an effective rehearsal.

One of the highlights every year is the "Coaching for Bands" session. This was essentially a masterclass on arranging music for bands. A group of volunteers from the attendees were spontaneously selected to form an "instant band" that had never played or sang together before. They were given a popular worship song to lead together. After a run

through, they received feedback and help with their musicianship and presentation from a panel made up of the breakout group leaders. By the end of the session the group had made great strides in improving their cohesion and leadership of the song.

One attendee who has participated for several years commented, "Each time we think, 'We've gone every year - what more can we possibly get out of this?' Then we attend and remark on the way home, 'Wow! So glad we went because we learned this and this and that.' This is why we want to see this keep going. We learn new things each time AND we also realize how far we've come in implementing items we've learned in the past when they are suggested to others during the current event. Such a great opportunity to exchange ideas with other groups that we do not currently get anywhere else."

Another attendee commented, "The concepts presented are applicable to any style of worship, not just contemporary. Listening with an open mind uncovers the challenges we face and encourages us to use new thinking in our approach to worship and music and excellence in execution."

LEAD Team: A Year in Review

Over the past 12 months the LEAD Team has been working to learn and understand better the ways that we, as a church community, can better do children, youth, and family ministry. We worked with the LEAD organization and were assigned a consultant, Jessica Noonan, who helped guide our way through the process of discovery and synthesis. The LEAD Team members were: Betty Becker, Courtney Lerch, Matt Grove, Wendy Farner, Pastor Kerry Nelson, and John Vickery.

The first step of the process, like many other projects, was to identify goals. The goals that the team set were:

- Discover new ways that we can foster growth in relationships
- Discover new ways that we can promote growth in learning
- Discover new ways that we can promote growth in faith formation

After the team was formed and the goals were set, we were ready to get started. The first step in the process that we were led through was one of listening. The listening that would be carried out would happen in two sets; the first within the congregation, and the second out in the neighborhood. The goal of these listening sessions was not to interject the team's opinions, or to only have conversation; the goal was to intentionally listen to individuals and families to help us get a picture of how life looks for them.

During the listening in the congregation the team selected 12 families and conducted brief interviews with each of them. From those conversations we learned some of the challenges that families face, the things that families value within the church, what families are passionate about, and what families expect from the church.

<u>Challenges:</u> Many demands for their time, how to cultivate faith formation in the home, building connections with other [families], differing financial positions among families

<u>Values within the church:</u> The door is always open and welcomes everyone, dedication to service in the community, relationships/ community to worship together, sermons that are closely related to "real life."

<u>Passionate About:</u> Outreach programs, social justice, helping with poverty, educating parents, welcoming new people, and small group studies

<u>Expectations:</u> Programs in which the youth can be trained as leaders, opportunities for children of all ages to serve, inter-generational interactions, whole family involvement, events scheduled in advanced so people can be better planned/prepared.

The second phase of the listening process was to travel into the neighborhood and talk to area businesses and schools to gather information about how the area is perceived through their eyes. Most of the information in this area came through talking with school administrators from the surrounding area. We learned that they believe that there is much more to people that what meets the eye. We learned that in many cases, parents feel lost and in need of support in various areas especially in the way of affordable early childhood care. Across the board, almost everyone that was interviewed each said that they were concerned for the safety (physical, emotional, and spiritual wellbeing) of the children that are in their care.

After all of the listening sessions were concluded, the team then began to form their learnings into a list of values. Through an activity that was aimed at helping us identify our values for Youth and Family Ministry, we considered many different terms and used a process of elimination to

reach our final value statement. That statement reads as follows:

Faith Lutheran Church builds/grows an intergenerational community that:

- 1. Practices intentional inclusivity of all people
- 2. Equips every age to follow Jesus
- 3. Practicing faith at church so that we live out our faith at home, school, and work



Once the team had formulated a statement to guide future activities and planning, the team decided that it would be wise to conduct one more survey of parents within our community. The top three findings from this second survey were:

- 1. Parents and families want to have a consistent support system surrounding them.
- 2. Families want predictable activity schedules that allow for families to participate together so that families only need to put one date on their calendar. Structure events that would appeal to multiple age groups.
- 3. Guidance with Faith Formation, things to do at home.

After the team completed their listening and formulation of their values, it was time to try putting some of the learnings to action in the form of an experiment. The decision was made that we would try a new program during the learning hour through the summer called, "FAITH5 Summer." The purpose of this new program was to demonstrate the ritual of FAITH5 and encouraging those who participated to use it in their homes. At the conclusion of the summer the team met to go over the experience of the summer and some of the takeaways were:

- 1. It was a great way to see people that don't usually interact with each other be together
- 2. Noticing that in other meetings around the church, elements of FAITH5 are now being used
- 3. The process provides a space for people to talk about their lives and build relationships within and outside of their families

At the end of the process the team noted that this is not an "end point," instead it is one step along our journey together. There are more conversations to be had, and more listening to be done to better understand the ever-changing world that is around us.

Along with the meeting of the LEAD Team, I personally have had the opportunity to meet with a professional coach once a month. Through this coaching I have been able to focus in on my leadership skills, recognizing my strengths, and evaluating my weaknesses. I have spent a great deal of time exploring a concept of Situational Leadership as it pertains to Youth and Family Ministry. This is a concept of realizing how volunteers work, get involved, and how volunteers feel empowered to stay involved. There were several other topics that I also explored around how I can improve as a leader at Faith Camp, as well as a leader beyond our church's four walls.

Now that the work of the LEAD Team is concluded, it is time for the Youth and Family Team to reconvene and carry the work forward. The Youth and Family Team will be continuing to explore how we do ministry to families, develop programs that keep our values in the forefront, and explore how we can better execute existing programs that also point toward the same values.

This has been a very exciting year for all of us, and there has been a tremendous amount of work done; and I would like to recognize the LEAD Team for their dedication and support over the past year and beyond.

Finally, if you ever have any suggestions, ideas, or would like to become more involved with Youth and Family Ministry I would love to hear from you, there is a place for everyone! Pastor Kerry often says that Christianity is a team sport, and Youth and Family Ministry is no different. Together, as a team, we can develop opportunities that are uplifting, educational, and that promote interconnectivity with those around us. I invite you into these conversations, and I am looking forward to what we can do together over the course of the coming years!
