As I write this, I don't know whether or not the Astros have won the World Series. I also know, in the bigger scheme of things, it doesn't matter. It changes nothing.

Houston won't be a better or worse place to live after game 7. Our public schools won't be any better and our private schools won't be any cheaper. There will still be people living on our streets and people who spend money every month storing their extra stuff.

High school students will still worry about grades and peers and their body image and keeping up on Snapchat. Seniors will still worry about outliving their money or their next trip to the doctor. Couples will still struggle to have those kind of hard conversations that keep their relationship going and growing.

Life will go on. I don't know who won the World Series five years ago—but I trust it created quite a buzz amongst the hometown fans. But it didn't change anything significant.

What does make for significant change in peoples' lives? What does make a difference?

Certainly there are times when change and growth come with overwhelming power. When I prayed for God to take over my life back in college, many things changed for me very abruptly. But the deeper transformation that followed that initial experience took years.

We watched the Astros playing in the World Series and we felt connected to them. We cheered and hurt for them. What we didn't see was the first time that Alex Bregman's mom or dad bought that first baseball glove and helped him learn how to throw and catch.

We didn't see the calloused hands or all the injuries or the tears he cried at night because he didn't play well that day. We didn't see inside of his spirit when he watched older kids play and he dreamed of being like them some day.

And we also don't see Alex Bregman in his daily life. How he treats his teammates, the Astros staff, his friends. We don't see his character. His commitments. His convictions. His compassion. Those universal aspects of who we are that really make a difference in the world. One person at a time.

But I am also firmly convinced that our spirituality and our character development begins at home and then moves into the wider communities of life, including congregational life. 

Christ Has No Body But Yours

A group of Faith members volunteer at CCSC's Food Pantry (which is located at the St. Luke United Methodist Church, Gethsemane campus) on a Saturday morning every month. On October 19, we did not work inside the building. Instead, we ran a Food Fair. We distributed fresh produce and food products from a big truck-trailer in the parking lot. The food truck was from the Houston Food Bank. Several members and visitors of Faith Chinese Fellowship came to volunteer that day. Two of them arrived in Houston recently. Here are some of the questions and comments they shared with me.

"We didn't know there were so many poor people in America. We thought America was a rich country where everyone had plenty of food to eat." They were surprised when they saw a long line of children and adults waiting to get food (we served about 200 households that day). I told them poverty and hunger are

real problems in U.S. According to the Houston Food Bank, 1.1 million people in southeast Texas are food insecure, meaning they cannot afford enough nutritious food to fuel a regularly healthy lifestyle. One in six Texans are food insecure. Can anyone explain adequately the large percentage of food insecurity families in one of the wealthiest nations on earth? I cannot.

"How can you possibly be certain that every person who receives food assistance today is really poor? Are they lazy? Don't they want to work hard to feed themselves?" they asked. I admit that there may be a few people who abuse food assistance programs, just as in other places in the world. Then I asked them this question: "If you have enough money to buy food from the grocery store, would you come with your children to the Food Pantry at nine o'clock on a Saturday morning, stand under the hot sun for 45 or even 60 minutes, give your name and other personal information to the receptionist, and then get free food?" They said, "No. I would not go through all the trouble of getting free food, if I had money to feed my children." I said, "Now you understand that most of the clients of the Food Pantry are having a real need of food assistance. They do not bring their children to this parking lot on a Saturday morning to get food simply because it is free." According to Houston Food Bank, two-thirds of food insecure homes have a working adult. Ninety-six percent of them have housing. I've read news reports on the website of Houston Public Media, "Why So Many People in Houston Are Going Hungry." In that article, a manager of Houston Food Bank was quoted as saying, "The households that are experiencing food insecurity, and even about half the households that are going hungry, are actually not households below the poverty level, and so in many cases they're not qualified for federal benefits but they're still not making enough money to make ends meet."

It takes 30 to 40 volunteers to run a Food Fair. Besides volunteers from Faith, there were also volunteers from other churches and organizations that day. Among them were about fifteen hard-working young men and women from the Mormon Church. Without them, we would have been severely short-handed. I talked with a few of them. They all come from other states (Arizona, California, Oregon, Washington). After high school they come to Houston and work as missionaries in two of the Mormon churches in Southwest Houston (one of the Mormon Churches is on Beechnut and Mullins Dr., which is very close to where I live). The boys stay in Houston for two years, and girls for seventeen months. As we bagged and handed out food to clients, I asked them to tell me what they believe. They said, "We are not allowed to talk about our faith now." "Why not? You said you are missionaries." "We have a rule. When we serve with our hands, we are not allowed to talk about our faith. When the work is done, we can talk." When I shared this conversation with my Chinese friends later, one of them said, "I kind of understand their rule. When they help people, they focus on people. They do not expect to get something from them. It is like you come to help because of your Christian faith. But you do not want to impose your Christian faith on people who need your help for food." On hearing this, I began to wonder what is the appropriate opportunity for me share my Christian faith with this friend. I also wonder about the meaning of the words of St. Teresa of Avila:

Christ has no body but yours,
No hands, no feet on earth but yours,
Yours are the eyes with which he looks
Compassion on this world,
Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good,
Yours are the hands, with which he blesses all the world.
Yours are the hands, yours are the feet,
Yours are the eyes, you are his body.
Christ has no body now on earth but yours.

All Saints' Day is a widely celebrated event in the Christian world. In the Roman Catholic Church it is officially called the *Solemnity of All Saints*. It is also known as *All Hallows* or *Hallowmas* (from which we get the word "Halloween," from "All Hallows Eve"). All Saints' Day is celebrated on November 1. At many churches, including Faith Lutheran, it will be observed the first Sunday thereafter (November 3). It is a day to honor all the saints, known and unknown, who have gone before us in the faith.

Who are the saints, and what do they have to say to us? Rather than being perfect Christians, the saints are people who have been made whole by the grace of God, through baptism into Christ. The communion of saints is a diverse array of witnesses who remind us of God's continuing faithfulness, past, present, and future. In the picture painted by the gospel reading from Luke, the saints challenge us to embody the surprising, world-reversing ways of the reign of God.

Throughout the texts assigned for All Saints' Sunday we hear language and descriptors of life as it is now and life as it will

be forever. In Daniel's vision, the holy ones will "possess the kingdom forever—forever and ever" (7:18). In Ephesians, Christ's authority and dominion are described as reigning both in this age and in the age to come. In Luke's version of the beatitudes, the blessings come to those who are hungry now, who weep now; likewise, woe comes to those who are full now or are laughing now. How does the promise of what is to come inform and shape the right now? Consider this tension of *now and forever* in light of our connection and witness to the saints.



By virtue of our baptism into the death and resurrection of Jesus, we are made saints while we are still sinners. Every day in this nautically juxtaposed life we navigate through rough waters such as sin, evil, pain, heartache, addiction, abuse, hunger, disease, and fear. With the scriptures as our compass and the confessions our map, we sail as a part of the great flotilla of saints on the waters of baptism, with the wind of the Spirit at our backs, always pointed in the direction of our guiding Daystar.

On November 3 we give thanks for the saints who have gone before us, for the saints still among us, and for the saints of God still to come. We give thanks for the examples of faithful living that the saints have given us as they navigated the stormy waters of life, and also for the faithful acts of service we are empowered by God's Holy Spirit to do in our own seas. We give thanks, too, for the fullness of eternal life in which the saints of God who have gone before us now partake and which we have yet to fully enjoy. (from SundaysAndSeasons.com)

Often when we think of saints, we think of the heroes of the Bible, like St. Paul. Or maybe it reminds us of famous Christians over the centuries, like St. Patrick. Saint also can mean every baptized person, those who have already died, and those still alive. This year for All Saints' Sunday, consider this: some are considered holy saints, but all of us are wholly saints in Christ.




Marlin Douglas Wogstad was born on May 17, 1927 in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, to Elvina and Gilbert Wogstad. He graduated from St. Olaf in 1950, did his post-graduate work at Luther Seminary and the University of Chicago Divinity School, and was ordained in June of 1954 in Minneapolis. He served as missionary in Taiwan from 1955 to 1976, teaching at universities there, like Tainan Theological Seminary, and serving Redemption Lutheran in Taipei and Gospel Lutheran in Panchiao. Following this, he worked as a hospital chaplain in St. Paul and in Houston (MD Anderson and Hermann) from 1976 to 1980. He served Augustana Lutheran Church in Houston until 1995, when he retired. He continued to remain active as a supply preacher. Reverend Marlin D. Wogstad died peacefully September 1, 2016 surrounded by his family. (source: www.legacy.com).

The Value of Camp Ministry

Since my early elementary school years I have been involved with summer camp in one way or another. I started my camp experience within my own church, when the local camp would come and do their day camp program. This was a great experience for me as I wasn't ready to strike out on my own and go to sleep away camp just yet, but I wanted to have the experiences to sing the songs and learn the Bible stories, both while making new friends along the way. I think my mother really enjoyed this too; at the time she wasn't too sure about sending me away for a week yet either.

Fast forward a couple of years, I had gotten to know how the "camp" day at the church worked and began to get more and more comfortable with putting myself out of my comfort zone of interacting with people. So I decided that I wanted to try going to the week long program of sleep away camp. Looking back on it now, that single decision has now formed me to be who I am today.

What I discovered was that sleep away camp was really similar to camp in the church building. We sang many of the same songs, the counselors were really cool and nice, and I was able to make many new friends while learning more about my faith. The only difference was that I ate breakfast, lunch, and dinner at camp, and I slept at camp. Within that first week of being on-site it was almost instantaneous, the thought crossed my mind, "Why did I wait so long to do this?"

From that point forward, I attended camp every single summer throughout my elementary, middle, and high school years. Then as soon as I was old enough I became a counselor myself, and even further down the line I lived at camp year round. Even to this day, while I am working at Faith, I am very connected to Camp Lutherhill and their staff, I often talk with them about the programs and how we can support one another.

Here at Faith we have the Faith Camp program. A three week on-site day camp where kids have the opportunity to grow in their faith, and to spend time with other kids who are their age in a positive and enriching environment. I like to look at Faith Camp as a steppingstone for kids to make their way to the over-night camp experience. Many of the same songs are sung, the staff are caring, and so on. It doesn't even have to be a "one or the other!" Lutherhill has weeks of camp all summer long!

I am planning on going to Camp Lutherhill the week of June 7-12, 2020 and would love it if some of our kids and youth from Faith would join me. There are programs that week for all ages from Elementary through High School. They will have a familiar face with me being there, but will also have the chance to make many new friends who believe in the same things that they do.
