God Loved You First

My family has plenty of experience in welcoming cats into our home. A number of years ago we agreed to cat-sit two older cats while their owners went to Florida for about six weeks. The cats were very shy to start with. They would spend all day hidden in the



basement only venturing out occasionally for food or water. Then they would scurry again to their place of safety. But gradually, very gradually, as we showed these cats much patience and love, they started to come out for a little longer and then a little longer. Eventually they allowed themselves to be petted and finally to sit on our knees and purr. This took a long time, but even more importantly, it took lots of love. The cats needed to learn that they were loved and safe and it was going to stay that way. We watched them for a number of years after that and each time it took them less and less time to adjust.

Do you occasionally feel a bit like those cats? Do you feel the need to retreat and hide from the world? Do you find it necessary hide bits of yourself from others, because you are scared that you are not acceptable or lovable? The most important journey of our lives is discovering that we are truly loved - loved by our family and friends, but most importantly-loved by God.

It appears simple and straightforward to believe and accept that we are called, valued and loved by God. But, in practice, it is hard. We must grow into knowing ourselves to be utterly and unconditionally loved by God. As the prophet Isaiah writes, "I am the LORD, I have called you in righteousness, I have taken you by the hand and kept you..." (Isaiah 42:6).

It is also easy to feel that in order for God to love us, we need to improve. But God loves us first, and it is when we know God loves us that we can be transformed. Experiencing and accepting God's love empowers change - not the other way around. We will never be holy enough or good enough in our own strength. However, God's mercy and generosity are abundant, and God draws us into divine love just as we are - then as we stand in this love, we are transformed to become the people God intends us to be. Just like my friend's cats.

It is when we know ourselves to be loved that we too can love. Then we are released to be our true selves; truly to worship and serve God and to be in the



loving relationship with God. Truly to be "a light to the nations, to open the eyes that are blind, to bring out the prisoners from the dungeon, from the prison those who sit in darkness" (Isaiah 42: 6-7). Just like my friend's cats, to emerge from our hiding place.

So, how do we find our identity in being beloved by God? We do it by being open to the nourishment of God as we open the word of God and hear the story of God's love, and as we break bread together and are fed by the Spirit of God. We can choose to spend time in God's presence, waiting on God and being seeped in God's love.

I encourage you to try to find time every day, even if it is only a few minutes, wherever you are, to be quiet and to allow yourself to rest in God's love – to know yourself to be God's precious beloved child. For when each of us gets to the end of our lives, what greater end to our life's journey than to know that our identity is as God's beloved.



Cancelled Stamp Ministry

Thank you so much for your box of cancelled stamps for leprosy. I am enclosing a letter I received after the last delivery I sent them—I am thankful to have a number of friends who still collect for me in light of the diminishing number of stamps we now receive. Your continuing involvement in this missionary effort is much appreciated.

Dear Zoe,

What an amazing gift! Thank you very much for the stamps you sent to us and for bringing us closer to a world without leprosy. We are very grateful for all your effort to save the stamps, trim them and send them to us. We continue to be encouraged by the enthusiastic response from stamp contributors and our goal is to raise \$7,500 in 2019, which will allow us to bring the cure to 75 leprosy patients! Through medical treatment, as well as education and rehabilitation, you are helping to restore dignity and courage to those who have suffered far too long.

Stamp wholesalers pay us \$10.00 per pound of trimmed stamps and this fundraising has helped make it possible to cure many of those suffering from leprosy. We are happy to accept any and all trimmed stamps, leaving no less than ½ inch and no more than ½ inch paper border. You do not need to soak the stamps from the paper. There is no need to separate the stamps into different types and countries. Should you have postcards or entire envelopes dated prior to 1950, kindly ship them without removing the stamps as they are greatly sought after by many collectors. We welcome all foreign, as well as Canadian and American commemorative stamps.

Your kindness and compassion are felt by the friends and staff of effect:hope and by the many people we serve. We look forward to your continued partnership with this Mission of healing and hope. Please keep on sending us your used postage stamps so that we can work toward the day when leprosy is eradicated.

A ministry start that start a number of years ago is growing! Dick Smith began


collecting cans to recycle. All the money he collected went to benefit our outreach ministries to those in need. Peggie continues this ministry in memory of Dick.


