Hello, Dear Ones,

We had quite a surprise on July 4 – a family of five young kittens on our front porch! The mama cat is a feral and lovely diffuse calico who's been hanging around since mid-winter and daddy is a young black and white guy who has finally let me pet him after months of trying.

We're sure of this parentage because three of the kittens look exactly like the dad, and

mom and dad are very lovey-dovey, which is quite adorable. The other two kittens are an orange and white boy and a regular calico girl.

The thing with feral kittens, though, is that they stay wild, and grow up and have more wild kitties. Not good. But it is SO hard to tame them because they're SO skittish.

But since we had some relatives visiting, everyone was drafted to grab and stroke the kittens, in the hopes of beginning their taming. Well. Mama cat was so upset by that whole thing she moved her babies overnight. Fortunately, they were still on the porch, so I continued the taming process. It worked!

Kittens run to everyone who comes on the porch or out the door. Whew. We'll be able to find homes for them and keep the feral population somewhat under control.

Now that they're a bit older, they're exploring more. They're especially fond of the slanted drying rack Patrick uses for onions, garlic and shallots. The high end lands atop one of the houses we provide for kitties. When they reach their high goal, we can see them through the kitchen window. Adorable.

We call that "climbing the onions." It reminds me of parts of *Looking for God in Messy Places* by Jake Owensby, the book we're currently using in Wine and the Word.

"We can encounter God's love for us not only in the interior chambers of our own hearts but also in the depths of all that surrounds us...Wonder is the response of our whole being to that encounter with the divine, whether we meet God in the sunset, a starry sky, the Holy Sacrament, the lines of an old person's face, or the immensity of the sea."

Or in something as simple as "walking the onions." Somehow, that makes it easier to remember, and that can only be good, don't you think?

As you might guess, people can also "walk the onions." Maybe all of us should consider where and when we can do that because, as Owensby also writes, "Finding the risen Christ in our surroundings is our vocation as people of the Resurrection."

(Oh, and who would like to adopt a very tame, onion-walking kitten?)



The *early* results are in for the Erie Gives Campaign.

Total donations to all of the 438 non-profits participating came to \$7,019,728 with \$10,752 individual/

family donors.

Harborcreek Presbyterian Church received \$8,190 in donations from 25 donors. These are early results so the figures may change. The church will also receive a portion of the non-designated funds according to designated percentages. We will know soon the final results and will share that with you.

SPECIAL DONATION OPTIONS

During the year you may want to make a special donation in memory (or in honor) of someone.

Following are the many options available:

Memorial Fund: This is a special account to collect funds to be used within the local church for worship and education related expenses. Monies can be earmarked for special projects and sometimes a plaque is dedicated to the memory of a loved one.

Endowment Fund: Generally donations (often memorials) can be directed to this Fund that is managed by the Presbyterian Church USA Foundation and their New Covenant Mutual Funds. Yearly dividends are split between missions and capital improvements for our church. As with most endowments, numerous options for bequests and investing are available.

Capital Improvement Fund (CIF/Building Fund): Donations directed to this account are used to make payments towards any loans (none at this time) and to provide 'seed money' for future projects. Recent ones were exterior painting and maintenance of the church and manse and a new bell tower roof scheduled for 2021.

General Fund: Of course donations are gratefully accepted any time to help support the general running of the church and its programs.

Notes from June Session meeting:

Diane Bourne requests to have her son Daniel Robert Bourne baptized on July 11th, 2021 during the morning worship service. On a motion Session approved. Motion carried. Welcome Daniel.

CORRESPONDENCES: A letter was read concerning a Memorial gift in honor of Boyd and Monojeane Cockburn who were married in this church and longtime members.

PROPERTY: The tower project is scheduled to start during the 2nd week of July. A down payment on the bid from Joe B's carpeting for all 3 entrance levels of church was made. The committee has been working on bids for the Preschool "hepa" screening. The committee is also looking into purchasing choral risers

SPIRITUAL FORMATION: Vacation Bible School - Each Sunday night starting June 27th - August 1st (but not on July 4th) there will be a short evening program. Program will include craft, and activity (bonfire, movie night, mission night), and/or games and Bible story. This will be held outdoors only (no gathering if rain) for about an hour or so. Plus, will also have take-home kits with ideas and Bible story for the week.

WORSHIP/MEDIA MINISTRIES COMMITTEE: Communion will be provided during services on June 20th. A grape and cracker will be provided in a baggie. The committee has reported that the second screen in the sanctuary has been installed and would like to display sheet music of hymns on them during morning worship. Much discussion followed as they will not take away the ability to use actual hymnbooks or words in bulletins.

MEMBERSHIP CARE & DEVELOPMENT: The Deacons, with help from this committee, will be asked to provide an after service coffee hour for longest church members.

The cookbook is still being worked on as they compile the congregation's favorite recipes.

MISSION & OUTREACH: Preschool report: Good news that pre-registration for next year's morning classes are going well and also full.

About 40 people were fed on May30's at St Paul upper room.

LONG RANGE PLANNING: Bob Kellerman provided an update to Session with the results of their past 3 meetings. The number one concern was activities and programs for the youth of this church. The second issue involves the possibly partnering with the Emmanuel Presbyterian Church. Next meeting will be June 16th.

OLD BUSINESS: On a motion and second, Session agreed to approve a 4 member committee of Pastor Robin Cuneo, Brian Griffith, Dave Maille and Chris Thomas to meet with Emmanuel Presbyterian Church on June 16th.

This program has been restarted with new forms and software. They have not asked for financial support from area churches at this time and will communicate when needed.

TRAILBLAZER'S REPORT: The 2nd annual Family Funfest was June 19th despite the rain. A good time was had for those church families and area neighbors who attended. Volunteers were thanked with Barb providing the breakdown of expenses and concerns. The grand prize winner for the gift card was announced. Session decided to hold this project annually.




