As a bonus, I will act as the official liaison to the PNC from Committee on Ministry. I'll attend every meeting and make sure the process goes as speedily as it can. That's possible because I'm so familiar with both you and the process. (All those years of COM meetings are paying off!)

Well, I've taken up way too much space in the newsletter. Just please know that God is at work for your future, and that serving you has been the great privilege of my life.

Now I just need to come up with a different hiding place for my alarm clock.

PASTOR SEARCH UPDATE

The "Sharing Committee" that was approved by the congregation in June to explore the POSSIBILITY of sharing a pastor with another church has been busy these last few months. The Committee (Chris Thomas, Dave Maille and Brian Griffith) has met with representatives from Emmanuel Presbyterian and has taken a plan back to our Session.

The Session has approved moving forward with exploring the sharing of a pastor with Emmanuel and on October 24th the congregation voted to form a Pastor Nominating Committee which will work in conjunction with a PNC from Emmanuel to begin the process of finding someone suitable to both churches. Our PNC consists of Sue Kellerman, Evan Foust, Kyle Foust, Jared Mosier and Brian Griffith (Sharing Committee rep).

These guidelines were set by the Presbytery as the steps required to continue with the job of finding a new pastor to share. The specifics of what this partnership will look like are still being worked on by the Sharing Committees and soon the combined PNCs. Once the major details are agreed upon there will be a joint Session meeting with Emmanuel moderated by General Presbyter Anita Bernhardt.

We will continue to keep you informed both with pulpit announcements and in this newsletter. Please feel free to offer questions or your input to any of the committee members and keep the committee members in your prayers as they strive to move forward with the next chapter of our church history.



Music for Advent and Christmas Worship

Worship music for Advent and Christmas will be a bit different this year, but still gorgeous and joyous.

Until the Centers for Disease Control advises otherwise, Chancel Choir will refrain from singing together in person. Wizard Bill Nesgoda has agreed to put together some virtual choir numbers, depending on his recovery from back surgery.

Among the music to look forward to are performances by the Harmonizers and Gil Long.

The annual cantata on the last Sunday of Advent, Dec. 19, will be "The Road to Bethlehem" by Lloyd Larson. This is also planned for virtual presentation. Linda DeAngelo and Joyce Kriner have already recorded the organ and piano parts for the eight songs.

For any choir members who have not yet performed virtually, Music Director Chris Thomas invites them to give it a try. All that's needed are a cell phone and a computer or tablet. "If I can do it, you can do it," Chris said.

Copies of the cantata books are available in the office during church Sunday or during Mary's office hours Mon., Wed. and Fri. from 9 a.m. to noon.

The annual Christmas Eve service at 7:30 p.m. will feature a combination of live and virtual Chancel Choir and Bell Choir favorites.

Bell choir will continue to practice together in person Wednesdays at 6 p.m. with masks required. Chris hopes the bells can play together live a few times during Advent, and a few times virtually so the performances can be saved for future use.

"To everyone - Thanks for your patience and understanding as we continue to praise the Lord through music in the safest way possible during these crazy times," Chris said. "Thanks for your dedication to the music program."


