It is good, Lord, to be here. Right? It is, right?

First, a painful story. One of the final candidates for Pastor Peter's position used a precious Sunday off to worship at Trinity with their spouse. Except for the greeter (whose job it is) and the usher (who handed them a bulletin), no one greeted them. No one shook their hand during the passing of the peace. No one offered them a cup of coffee or asked their name. No one even spoke to them.

Another story. Some years ago, I was sitting in worship at the church my family belonged to. I was not yet in seminary but was a frequent worship leader. At the passing of the peace, I introduced myself to the woman in front of me and asked her name and if she was new. She very briskly said, "No, I am NOT new. And I know who YOU are." She abruptly turned away and didn't speak to me again. I had never even seen her before. I had no way of knowing her. You can imagine how frightening it was to risk introducing myself to someone after that.

And another. After a Wednesday morning Lenten Service, I introduced two women, Ann and Barb, to a third woman, Pat, whom they did not recognize. Barb asked Pat if she was new. Pat said, "No, I have been here since 1983." For some reason, in spite of being members of the same church for the past 35 years, Ann and Barb had never gotten to know Pat. Everyone was gracious about it. Pat was not cranky about the fact that someone asked her if she was new. She was kind and interested in meeting Ann and Barb.

An observation. When I first arrived at Trinity, everyone was asked to wear nametags in worship so that I could get to know your names. The greatest response was how much it helped you learn each other's names! (Anticipate more name tags in our life together.) We are a big church. It's impossible for us to all know one another by name. It's hard to tell the difference between visitors and members we have not yet met. Too often, that uncertainty makes us timid. Which can leave people feeling unseen and unwelcome.

In the early church, one of the main reasons the Gospel message caught on was because of the incredible hospitality Christians showed one another. They opened their homes to other Christians traveling through their town, offering food, lodging, even clothing. They shared meal hospitality, sometimes daily. They held everything they owned in common so that no one went without. People were attracted to the hospitality and if they ventured into a gathering, they were warmly and extravagantly welcomed in.

Hospitality was the original hallmark of Christianity.

Hospitality can be the hallmark of Trinity Lutheran Church.

One thing is sure: we have a responsibility, as the people of God, to be extravagantly hospitable to everyone, known and unknown, who enters our building. It begins at the door and takes no special skills. How?

Say hello and introduce yourself. A simple hello and a handshake go a long way in making people feel welcome. You don't have to be able to answer all their questions. Just be friendly. And if you are a long-time member and someone asks if you're new, be gracious. It may not take special skills but it does take courage to speak to another person. Honor that courage in others.

Get out of your pews. Sit somewhere new. Sit by someone new. Move around the sanctuary, the narthex/commons or just down the row. Greet people sitting alone, people you haven't met, people who might be new and hungry for a word of welcome. We never know who might be lonely. Be the reason they feel welcome and want to come back.

Wear a name tag. Every Sunday. You might assume everyone knows you because you have been here a long time. But if they are new, normally worship at a different service or just sit on the other side of our huge sanctuary, they may not know you. Wearing a nametag is an act of hospitality and is not just for new people. It actually makes new people feel more welcome.

Sign up to do the fun jobs! (We will train you, which is also fun AND you will meet someone new.)

- Greeters are there to say "Welcome! We are glad you're here! Come on in."
- Ushers help visitors AND members find their way, offering a bulletin and echoing the welcome.
- Making and serving coffee extends our celebration of Holy Communion! A cookie and something to drink gives us a chance to offer table fellowship to people we meet on Sunday morning.

These are GREAT jobs for families, small groups and kids. And there is always staff around to help answer your questions. Perfection is not the goal. Hospitality is!

Plan to come to the Hospitality miniretreat on Sunday, April 22 after worship. Come be part of the conversation as we learn together how to be make hospitality the hallmark of Trinity Lutheran Church. We will feed you lunch! Watch for more details in the coming weeks! Welcoming Ministry Team Begins with Graceful Engagement at Trinity

A new Welcoming Ministry Team has begun its work at Trinity. Our mission is to help our faith community in their journey to becoming an openly welcoming and affirming church, embracing and celebrating diversity in our church home and in our community.

This past fall, we hosted a training session for our committee members and interested members from other churches in Minnesota and Wisconsin. The training session was led by two staff members from ReconcilingWorks, our resource partner. They have been helping us as as we seek to build an inclusive church, openly welcoming the LGBTQ community into our Trinity family. There are over 750 Reconciling in Christ churches in the ELCA who have followed this path in the past 30 years since the beginning of ReconcilingWorks.

Our ReconcilingWorks training was called Building an Inclusive Church. The training helped our team as we design and implement a journey for our Trinity faith community to publicly and intentionally welcome people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions. The team leaders helped to equip us with ways to create dialogue, rather than sparking debate and division.

As we go through the process of becoming a Reconciling in Christ (RIC) church, some may ask why our focus is on the LGBTQ+ community. (LGBTQ+ means the lesbian, gay, bisexual and queer community. The + stands for any additional identity not named in this acronym.) Unfortunately, LGBTQ+ people continue to experience exclusion from people supposedly acting in the name of Christianity. Even some churches that declare that "all are welcome" often demonstrate to LGBTQ+ individuals and families that welcome does not include them. We hope to help create a culture in our church that is dynamic, life-giving and fulfilling to all participants.

During the last few months, our team members have been conducting oneon-one conversations with members of Trinity to gain their input for our RIC journey. We have received many great ideas and helpful suggestions. The Welcoming Ministry Team has put together a flexible timeline that is helping us to frame our process. We will seek to address questions and open up dialogue on issues of building a more inclusive and welcoming church.

Continuing our process, we will be putting together a statement of welcome for our congregation. This statement will need to voted on by the congregation before it becomes Trinity's official statement of welcome and affirmation. We will then look for ways to show that welcome in our church and community.

We think our church has had a past of including those in need and people on the margins of our local and world communities. Through our work on the Welcoming Ministry Team, with the help of the congregation, we want to continue that tradition and expand it. We ask ourselves the question: What if extending a specific welcome to the LGBTQ+ community sparks a renewal in our faith community? We want to be a loving community that extends grace and acceptance. Will you join us on this journey?

Self-Discovery on the Continental Divide Trail: A Love Story with Ted Olson







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PASTOR OF CARE MINISTRIES

Trinity, like many congregations, has a growing number of members who are no longer able to attend worship or other church events. We have identified thirtyseven individuals who fit this description. (For lack of a better term, we refer to "the homebound.") Likely, there are others of whom we're not aware.

Our emerging Volunteer Visitation Team is increasing in numbers, and, the positive impact of making and maintaining connections within our faith community is already evident! Six individuals are currently, "in the field," providing regular visits, and five others are eager to get started. Another volunteer is gearing up for the task of logging visits and monitoring needs. We are extremely grateful for their commitment.

There is no set design for the volunteer visits; each homebound member, each visitor, each encounter is unique. Yet, consistent among all these visits is the centrality of Christ's love and grace. This is highlighted in Trinity's Volunteer Visitation Ministry covenant and is articulated in the Visitation Resource Guide through the commentary, "Visitation Ministry: Grounded in Christ's Love," which is included here.

Trinity's Ministry of Visitation is grounded in Jesus' teaching, preaching, healing and selfless love for others, particularly those least able to fend for themselves.

God, speaking through the Old *Testament prophets, repeatedly drew* attention to widows, orphans, aliens, the poor and the disadvantaged as those who required special care and protection from the community (Exod. 22:21-17; Deut. 27:18-19; Is. 58:6-7). Jesus echoed those prophetic words in his ministry. He illustrated, with parables, how we are to show compassion to our neighbors. "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." (Matthew 25:35-36)

Jesus consistently reached out in compassion to society's outcasts. Some were deemed "unclean" for such afflictions as leprosy (Mark 1:40-45) or continuous hemorrhaging (Mark 5:25-42). Others lacked family or community to support



them, like the Samaritan woman at the well (John 4). Jesus even healed the sick and the lame on the Sabbath, despite the legalistic concerns of the Pharisees and the implications for his own career and safety (Luke 13, Luke 14, John 5). He fully understood how physical illness and disability are barriers to full communal fellowship. The isolation that accompanies illness and disability further intensifies physical, emotional and spiritual suffering. Throughout his ministry, Jesus demonstrated that reconnecting the marginalized with their faith community is an act of love and healing.

Followers of Christ, in the early church and still today, are called to extend our hands and our hearts to the sick, the isolated and the vulnerable. This means caring and advocating for one another so none in the community are neglected.

The Ministry of Visitation brings the transforming message of Christ, in a tangible way, to those confined to their homes. It connects them to their faith community and to the broader church, and it honors their place within the Body of Christ. This ministry also opens us up to the expansive love of Jesus as we receive many blessings in return. "We love because he first loved us." (1 John 4:18)

6 Ways You Can Help A Loved One On Their Healing Journey

Take a moment to consider all the people in your life: your coworkers, friends, family. At any given time, 1 in 5 of these individuals is living with a mental health condition. You may have noticed them struggling, but if you're not a trained mental health professional, you may not have known how to help.

However, you *can* help. You can be supportive and encouraging during their mental health journey. Here are a few tips on supporting the mental health of those you love.

1) Educate Yourself

There are hundreds of mental health concerns; your job is not to become an expert in all of them. When you do notice potentially troublesome symptoms, it's helpful to determine if those signs may indicate a mental illness. Familiarizing yourself with common symptoms can help you understand and convey your worries. You may also benefit from expanding your knowledge by taking a course or joining a support group of individuals who can relate to the hardships you and your loved one may be facing.

2) Remain Calm

Recognizing that a loved one might need help can be daunting, but try to remain calm—impulsively approaching the individual might make you seem insensitive or aggressive. Try to be mindful and patient. Take time to consider your loved one's symptoms and your relationship before acting. Writing down how you feel and what you want to say may be useful to help you recognize and understand your thoughts and feelings, and help you slow down while connecting to your good intentions.

3) Be Respectful And Patient

Before talking to someone about their mental health, reflect on your intention to promote healing and keep that in mind. Ask how you can help in their recovery process and be cautious not to come off as controlling. While encouraging a person to seek help is okay, it is not appropriate to demand it of them. Let them know that if they ever wish to talk in the future, you're available.

4) Listen

Give your loved one the gift of having someone who cares about their unique experience. Don't bypass their narrative by making connections to others' experiences. You might recognize a connection to your own experience, however, sharing your story prematurely may undermine their experience. You may be prepared with hotlines, books, or a list of community providers, and although these are excellent sources of support, it's important to take time to thoroughly listen before giving advice. It's a privilege to have someone share intimate details of their mental health. Be present and listen before moving forward.

5) Provide Support

One of the best ways to help is to simply ask *how*. It's not helpful to try to be someone's therapist, but you can still help. People don't like being told what to do—asking how you can help empowers them to take charge of their recovery, while also letting them know you are a source of support.

6) Establish Boundaries

As you support your struggling loved one, it's important to consider both your boundaries and theirs. When trying to help, you *are* susceptible to neglecting yourself in the process; boundaries will help you maintain your self-care, while also empowering your loved one. Be sure you're not working harder than they are at their own healing process.

As a caring person, you may grapple between wanting to encourage and support your loved one while wanting to honor their process and independence. Unfortunately, there are no foolproof guidelines for helping your loved one on their journey towards recovery. However, you can connect to your intentions, convey compassion and maintain your own selfcare while empowering your loved one regardless of where they are in their healing journey.

The word Psalms comes from the greek word "Ψαλμοί" (PSaIMOI). It's one of those strange words in English like psychology that drop the "p" because "ps" is just impossible to say. But these 150 prayers, hymns, poems, liturgies, and meditations are all about the unique language that speak to the heart of God's people. No other Biblical source is guoted as regularly as the Psalms. "The Lord is my shepherd." "Be still and know that I am God." "My soul thirsts for you." The voices in these verses span the generations and offer a rich guidebook for our intimacy with God throughout our lives-to be known-to be loved-to be found in grace.

I love the bold claim that Acts makes about our lives in God: that no matter where we are or what we are doing – God is really close. Like REALLY close. That regardless of where we search or strain or struggle, God is near.

Acts charts the course of the Gospel and the early church from Jerusalem literally to the ends of the earth (like where is that?). I've often thought about God's movement in this book as reverse map making, that instead of creating these strict red lines that mark our divisions, God is opening up the story beyond our perceived boundaries and borders.

That God's hope for us in Christ is that we would find God, often unexpedly right where we are.

After the Passion and Easter and the eggs and the shouts of Alleluia, where God has been found in the most unlikeliest of places, Acts reminds us that because God has gone to the grave there is really no rock left unturned. No matter where we are, there too God will be. There too we will find the Spirit at work. There too will be the crucified and risen Christ.

Not long ago, there were some unfortunate responses floating around following the tragic Parkland school shooting. They were saying that this awful event was a result of "Keeping God out of the Schools," referring to the supreme court decisions around the particular composition of school prayers and religious affiliation by school officials.

Not only is this abusive theologically, but it doesn't follow God's remapping of the world Post-Easter. Easter




Church in Society: A Lutheran Perspective
