Your council and pastors encourage you to take heart in the face of the departures of Pastor Deb, Faith Community Nurse Sue Peterson and Senior High Coordinator Kelsey Cruisinberry.

These remarkable, gifted women each chose freely to enter a new chapter of their lives and/or careers. Pastor Deb is called into a first retirement and more time for family. Sue has been called into a second (!) retirement. Kelsey has been working toward a Master's degree in education which will require a fulltime internship. The staff is sad to see these wonderful partners in ministry go. And we look forward to who God will call to be part of this strong staff team.

Please hold these women, their families, the staff and the congregation in your prayers as we move through this holy time of farewells, discernment, and hellos.

As you know Pastor Steve Hokonson has joined Trinity in the part-time staff position of Visitation Pastor for an interim assessment period. And we have begun the process of hiring a Faith Community Nurse through the Lakeview Hospital Faith Community Nurse Program to continue the excellent work of our care ministries. Dear Friends in Christ,

Together, we are continuing our journey through the year of renewal. In the first step as a congregation, we participated in a survey, to which over 340 individuals responded. On April 16th, the Renewal Team shared those results with the congregation. If you missed the meeting, you can still watch the video of the presentation and/or review the Trinity Vitality Congregational Survey Report, both found on the Trinity website at www.trinitylc.org.

Our second step was to go deeper by listening to as many of you as we could in one-to-one interviews with our team of 40 volunteers. Together we gathered thoughts from about 200 of you to listen deeply for how God is calling us to be church."

Why all the listening? After all, haven't there been a lot of surveys and listening sessions over the past two years? The work of listening is the most important part of the renewal process at Trinity. Lutheran theologian, Paul Tillich asserts: "The first duty of love is to listen." The listening is about much more than process and gathering information. It is rather about transforming ourselves and others, for the sake of God in the world. As Pastor Chris said, "Our task is not to decide for ourselves how to be church. Our task is to listen deeply for how God is calling us to be church."

With that introduction, I am pleased to share with you a summary of our internal listening session results. Themes were divided into three categories. A theme means that our listeners reported hearing these statements from more than just a few people.

What is going on in our lives?

• Family is important. It's what gets us up in the morning.

- Our children no longer go to church as adults.
- Many are longing for "community," but can't find it.
- Small groups provide connection and care for each other.
- Many are concerned about the world and our country.
- Others are more concerned about Trinity members, the health of our congregation.
- Life is busy.

What do we see going on in our community (in and around Stillwater)?

- Churches are needed to help people and to provide connections.
- People are longing to connect with something important.
- People are concerned for the environment.
- Some people deny that social problems exist in our community.
- Gun control and mental health issues are a concern.
- People love Stillwater's valley location.
- The community has many unaddressed differences.
- Social justice is not understood in our community.
- Community issues should not intrude into our worship and preaching.

What prominent themes did we hear related to Trinity?

Themes about "All are welcome" and making connections:

- Most people love the "all are welcome" inclusivity, but others doubt our sincerity.
- Trinity has a core group that is hard for newcomers to break into.
- Trinity is large and some people appreciate being anonymous.
- Members need assistance with ways to invite others to Trinity.
- New members often have friends or connections that bring them here.
- How can we better connect people with needs to people who can help?

Themes about leadership:

- Leadership and the new staff are going in the right direction.
- Council is too small.
- Volunteerism is done well at Trinity, but we rely on the same few.

Themes about our values:

We value our tradition.

- We value our Lutheran theology.
- We value or worship and music ministries.
- We value social justice.
- We value multigenerational activities.
- We value becoming a Reconciling In Christ (RIC) church.
- We value our children's ministries.

Themes about faith formation and Christian education:

- We should have faith milestones that connect generations.
- We should better balance children in church with Sunday School.
- Sunday and Wednesday night age groupings can split families with children in both ages.
- How do we better assist parents to grow the faith of their children?
- Create adult learning on Sunday that is not during worship times.

Themes about worship:

• We love the pastors and the sermons.

- "Contemporary" worship needs to be refreshed.
- Most appreciated preaching about contemporary issues, but others prefer to leave those issues outside of worship.
- The quieter tone and community of the Saturday night service is missed.
- Many people appreciate the healing service.

Other themes:

- Many are still concerned about our debt and our finances.
- People are split on keeping or selling the drive-in.
- Make people aware of resource needs within the church.

The next step in the Year of Renewal is to turn our listening ear to those outside of Trinity, in our neighborhood and in our larger community. What is God already doing in our community and how can we get involved?

Financial Highlights

Financially, we are still in a deficit YTD. The deficit increased slightly in May due to semi-annual property tax payments, partly offset by improved Rent Income vs. April. For the fiscal YTD 2018, thru May, we show a deficit of \$17,741. That compares to a deficit of \$146K as of May, one year ago! Contribution Income for May 2018 was \$8K more than May 2017. YTD our Contribution Income is \$101K higher and Operating Expense is \$65K less than a year ago at this time. Increase in long-term debt reflects new Thrivent mortgage, more than offset by zeroing out line-of-credit balance. There is additional financial data below.

As we enter the final quarter of fiscal year 2018, we now ask for your help to finish strong financially. If you have been making financial contributions as an expression of your discipleship, thank you! Thank you as well to those who generously pledged for 2018 to help us realize an increase in pledged income for this year. If you are able to do more before the end of August, we would be most grateful. For those who have pledged, meeting that pledge or bringing your pledge contribution current by August would move us into a balanced budget position for the fiscal year.

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. by Claudia Swendseid, Stewardship Team Lead

Psalm 23, The Divine Shepherd, was the Scripture on Sunday, June 10, and the basis for Pastor Deb's last sermon as Trinity's pastor. As she observed, it is a well-known and beloved psalm among the 150 in the Bible. My women's circle, for example, closes each of our gatherings praying this psalm. According to the Lutheran Study Bible, Psalm 23 is one of 11 "trust" psalms—so called, as it expresses faith and confidence in God amid difficulties, threats, and dangers.

Psalm 23 also offers rich lessons on stewardship, beginning with the opening verse: The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. Or depending on the translation, I lack nothing. I shall not be in need. I have everything I need. The Psalm goes on to describe a world that God has provided for us—lush, restorative, peaceful; God guides us; we walk comforted and unafraid; we sit down to a table of abundance; our lives are filled with goodness and mercy; we live in right relationship with God. No wonder we love this psalm. What does it mean to you to not want; to lack nothing? Does that describe your day? Your week? Your life?

I asked myself these same questions in reflecting on my past week and I must report that God had blessed me abundantly. Consider:

- One afternoon I spent with my mom, taking her on errands, after which we shared tea, stories, and a lot of laughs. I felt buoyed and grateful for a mother who has cherished, guided, and supported me all of my 63 years.
- Wednesday night I spent with Trinity's Stewardship Team, working together to update a brochure on Trinity's Endowment Fund and to begin planning next fall's financial stewardship campaign. I left filled with gratitude for the creativity and dedication of this team of people.
- Midweek I participated in the kickoff of "summer camp" at Solid Ground, playing with a group of wonderfully rowdy youngsters

enjoying the swings and slides and games. I left feeling young and vital and crazy happy.

- A couple of mornings I rode my bike along the Gateway bike trail exhilarating in the beautiful countryside, spotting all sorts of birds including yellow warblers, eastern bluebirds, and a harrier hawk.
- Friday, I indulged in a walk, followed by dinner in downtown Stillwater with a dear friend of over 30 years. She shared recent challenges involving her husband's and father's health. I felt honored by her trust.

And that's just a sampling of God's blessings to me in the past week. I do not want. I lack nothing. Or at least nothing important and nothing the Lord thinks is good for me.

But I haven't felt that way throughout my life. My sense of want has changed from childhood to middle age to now, my 60s. Plus, I know that there are too many in our community, including most likely persons in our church that do experience want—of many kinds. Material want; emotional want; spiritual want. The first I see first-hand at Solid Ground, where I volunteer. It's an award-winning, nonprofit organization in White Bear Lake that uses a holistic approach of stable housing and empowerment services to help homeless families in Washington and Ramsey counties to build strong foundations they need to emerge from homelessness and poverty into a brighter future. For these families, who come to Solid Ground typically with only the clothes on their back, material want is very real.

Washington County is among the most affluent in the state of Minnesota; nonetheless, about 5.1% of the population lives at or below the federal poverty line (defined as annual income of \$20,780 for a family of three—try living on that!)

Back to Psalm 23. I can only imagine how a family living in poverty thinks about

the phrase, I shall not want? Very differently from me with all of the many privileges I enjoy. As Christians we work for a more just and more equitable world—God's kingdom come on earth as in heaven. Still as long as gross inequity is a feature of our world, I wonder what "community" reading of the psalm suggests. What would it mean to be a community in our wants or lack of them? The New Testament presents the early Christian community as sharing their possessions so that each member had enough. That's not likely realistic for everyone today. But there's plenty of room to share the abundance the Lord has provided to me to address the real wants of others. If my table is well prepared and my cup is overflowing, perhaps the psalm can be read as a vision of generous living? To welcome the entire community of God's beloved children to the lush and bountiful world in the psalm.

Then there's John 21 with its image of the shepherd and sheep in need. Jesus asks Peter three times, "...do you love me?" The third time, Peter gets irritated and says, "Lord, you know all things; you know that I love you." So, what does Jesus say, "Feed my sheep." Not "thank you for loving me" or "love me more" but "feed my sheep." Jesus doesn't want our love; Jesus wants us to love others; to show God's love to God's world in tangible ways. I may feel blessed to overflowing and without want, so the Lord provides me with bountiful opportunities to extend God's largesse to me, to others.

The Lord is my shepherd. I shall not want. Psalm 23 presents a vision of a whole creation that does not want, which we can help bring forward in this time and in this place. God's goodness and mercy follow me all the days of my life. Imagine yourself walking through the day, followed by bright and glorious sunshine, quiet waters, feeling comforted, with all you can eat and drink and as you walk that sunshine and water and comfort and bountiful table falls on everyone you encounter. Stewardship doesn't get better than that.

Support for Children & Adults with Mental Illness

We offer our heartfelt sympathy to Lily's family and friends. We pray for their eventual comfort and peace as they experience the unfathomable pain of losing a loved one to suicide.

Mental health issues can affect all of us either directly or indirectly. Suicide attempts can be a response to unbearable emotional pain. A person feels that this pain is not likely to go away. It isn't surprising to know that this brings on feelings of inadequacy and shame which increase the likelihood that a person keeps these feeling to his or her self. Some feel that asking for help will make them a burden to others when in truth most of us would be willing to do anything in our power to help. Taking the initiative by asking them directly may help them speak of something they would not usually approach you with. Asking someone if they are considering suicide does not increase the likelihood that they will attempt it. In fact, it may help prevent an attempt.

NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) is an organization dedicated to improving the lives of children and adults with mental illnesses and their families. NAMI offers education, support and advocacy. NAMI vigorously promotes the development of community mental health programs and services, improved access to services, increased opportunities for recovery, reduced stigma and discrimination, and increased public understanding of mental illness.

NAMI, MN offers more than 500 free classes and over 70 support groups each year.

Perspective in the Psalms



On Wednesdays in June, middle school kids from churches all over the St. Croix valley gather at Trinity for a morning service project and a fun afternoon activity.




Dear Trinity Friends,
