

Politics and the Pulpit.

Siblings in Christ,

It is good to be back home with you all. Our trip to Tanzania was remarkable in many ways and we look forward to sharing it with you in the weeks to come.

It was life-giving to spend time away from email, social media, and most news outlets. Perhaps a more necessary sabbatical than in the past, with the divisive, vitriolic mudslinging from both sides of the aisle.

There is as much commentary out there on the *fact* of the negative, oppositional language as there is negative, oppositional language. We are living into the reality of posting opinions on the internet to be discovered years after we posted them. Perhaps years after we had a change of heart or been awakened to a new way of thinking. Anyone curious enough to look can find what we wrote and turn it into fodder for a campaign, a confirmation hearing or a news cycle.

And the mud-slinging goes on. Politics and political conversation fill the air waves and our brain waves.

We have had some conversations about the role of the pulpit in addressing our political life. Some of us are opposed to it under <u>all</u> circumstances. Some of us are more okay with it when it aligns with our own viewpoint. Others believe it makes preaching and the life of faith relevant to what happens the other 167 hours of the week.

Because the life of faith is relevant. And it is not separate from the rest of our lives. Faith is not something we put on with our Sunday best and then take off as we live our "real" life. Faith is what sustains us through each minute of each day. And faith informs how we live those minutes.

Politics is our public life together as citizens. Politics is the way we express our citizenship. Our citizenship is not apart from the life of faith. The life of faith is to be the whole of life. Which means our faith informs our vocation, our role as spouse, sibling or parent and our role as a citizen.

Jesus calls us to live as those reconciled to God and to live on behalf of our neighbors. Our neighbors are fellow citizens and they are hurt or blessed by the cumulative action of the citizenry just we and our children are. Sometimes they are hurt more. Sometimes less.

Frankly, a pulpit that is not addressing your political life and our political life together is a pulpit that is abandoning its call to explicate the Word of God. Pastors are called, by you, to do a number of things, including "... to speak for justice in behalf of the poor and oppressed."* Poverty and oppression often occur at the hands of those who hold power. We cannot do what we are called by you to do *unless* we address the sources of power in our country: legislature, corporations and so on. Even the church.

The limits to what we can say in the pulpit are based on tax law. They are not ecclesiastical or theological limits. Our non-profit status means that Pastor Peter and I cannot speak on behalf of a political party or encourage you to vote for a *particular* candidate. We can speak about policies, actions, behaviors, language, and violations of the law by leadership, corporations and other entities—including the church.

Here is a great question for conversation: Do you want to know what your church and the word of God have to say about how to live as a person of faith in a political reality? We, your pastors, are constantly challenged to bring a "relevant" word. What could be more relevant today than how to respond to our current political climate through the lens of faith? How do we as disciples of Jesus faithfully follow Jesus through the morass of political campaigns? How do we as people of faith think about our leadership and what we expect of them? How does God's word inform every breath we take and which boxes we check in the election booth?

This much is sure: it is an act of faith to be an engaged citizen and cast a thoughtful and informed ballot. Vote. Please. Pray and then vote. If you need help connecting with your polling place, ask me or Pastor Peter. We can help.

Peace and grace in this season of decision making.

We will now proceed to a congregational vote on the statement at the November 18th congregational meeting.

Trinity's Welcome Statement:

Trinity Lutheran Church is a faithful community in the heart of Stillwater.

We seek to be a church grounded in the reconciling Gospel of Jesus Christ.

In doing so, we intentionally educate ourselves in becoming more effective advocates for all of God's people.

We embrace those of strong, uncertain, or undiscovered faith.

We embrace all sexual orientations, gender identities and expressions.

We embrace every age, family structure, race, ethnicity, physical and mental capacity, and economic circumstance.

We believe all people have been created in the image of God, and therefore have valuable stories and infinite worth.

We hope that the Welcome Statement reflects the outward-reaching grace at the heart of Jesus' gospel. The statement puts us on a path. It does not declare that all in our congregation have arrived at the same place. It does not mean that we are going to stop having difficult conversations.

We hope that as you consider this statement, you will join us in entering a larger conversation about who God is and how we live in response to the radical hospitality and abundant love that God offers to us all.

FROM THE STEWARDSHIP TEAM

The theme for Trinity's 2019 financial stewardship pledge drive is God's Purpose, Our Gifts! The Stewardship Team selected this theme because of its clarity on roles—God's versus ours. God's role is to establish our purpose in the world, as individuals and together as a faith community. Other words we could use are setting the agenda, establishing the plan, or laying out a vision for us—that's God's role. Our role is to use all of our gifts—time, capabilities and financial resources—to achieve that purpose in the world. As Pastor Chris writes in this year's Stewardship brochure, "Together we are God's economic delivery system. We are the only hands, feet, and wallet God has to accomplish God's amazing purpose in the world."

All of our gifts are needed to achieve God's purpose in the world. However, the focus of the annual pledge drive is to invite us to share our financial gifts by making a 2019 financial plan and pledge to Trinity that boldly demonstrates our trust in God and our desire to support God's amazing purpose in the world through Trinity.

Everything that happens in and through Trinity Lutheran Church is the result of our giving—worship, faith formation for all ages, care for our members, and outreach and service to local and global neighbors. Consider, for example, the importance of your gifts to support Sunday morning worship and faith formation, which serve about 480 people each Sunday. Based on the 2018 budget, direct costs total about \$6,670 or about \$14 per person. If you add indirect costs to these figures (like building, mortgage, and administrative costs), the number doubles (conservatively) to about \$28 per person. Multiply that by 52 weeks and the annual cost per person, just for the Sunday morning experience is, roughly speaking, about \$1,400. And this doesn't even include the hundreds of volunteer hours that support Sunday morning.

The point of this exercise is not to suggest that we begin charging \$28 per person to attend Sunday worship and

faith formation. After all church is not a social club or the Rotary. Rather, we are the living, breathing body of Christ where all are welcome to encounter the living God, regardless of economic circumstances or any other qualities or characteristics or human conditions that may pose impediments in the wider world.

So, God's grace is indeed free to all of us. But to achieve God's purpose in the world requires that we bring forward all of our gifts, including financial gifts that help pay for the cost of Sunday morning and the many other life-giving ministries we support through Trinity. Giving as we have been gifted by a loving and generous God. No gift is too small, no gift is too large, all gifts to Trinity are used to support God's purpose in the world to love and serve.

A few details about this year's pledge drive. The Stewardship Team set goals of increasing by 10 percent in four categories:

- Increase by 10 percent, pledged contribution income over 2018 to \$1.1 million
- Increase by 10 percent, households who make a pledge to Trinity over 2018, or 35 new pledgers
- Increase by 10 percent, pledgers who increase their 2019 pledge over 2018, or 17 pledgers
- Increase by 10 percent, pledgers who fulfill their pledge through automated giving over 2018, or 17 new automated pledgers

While ambitious, we are confident we can achieve these goals as we see the Spirit at work within our gifted Trinity faith community, challenging, inspiring and calling us to support God's purpose.

Always start with prayer, as you consider making your giving plan and pledge to Trinity. Immerse yourself in gratitude. Reflect on God's love and graciousness, on all God's gifts to you and your family. Seek to understand God's purpose for you and for Trinity. Then, make your pledge.

You can do this online at www.trinitylc.org then select GIVING then YOUR GIVING PLAN. Or by filling out a pledge card. Stewardship is really pretty simple. God loves me. God loves you. God has a purpose for each of us and for us together as the body of Christ at Trinity. Commit your gifts to achieve God's purpose for the sake of the world.

In response to a drive for the homeless encampment, Trinity's Knitting Ministry recently donated 58 knitted adult hat and scarf sets and 26 youth hats to the Franklin Tent Camp in Minneapolis. Forming Intentionally Intergenerational Faith

Numbers 14:8 -

If the Lord is pleased with us, he will bring us into this land and give it to us, a land that flows with milk and honey.

One of the most unique and amazing things about being the church is that it is intergenerational. So few communities can even achieve this beautiful balance, but there is nothing more powerful than when we gather as God's people across the boomers and babies and blossoming believers. When we commit to forming intentional intergenerational faith, there is nothing that more reflects God's promised land of milk and honey.

In the churches that I grew up in Minneapolis and outside of Owatonna, it wasn't the theology that I remember most, but the support, encouragement, care, birthday cards, building bird houses, and mission experiences of other impact adults that has stuck with me. It was seeing the active faith of Jesus in others and being in deep relationships that mattered most.

One of the things that Rev. Dr. Rich Melheim (Trinity member and founder of Faith Inkubators) likes to say is that there is nothing stronger than when "the wisdom of the elder and the wonder of the child collide on a regular basis." I couldn't agree more.

Throughout Scripture, it's pretty clear that all generations were practicing their faith together.

When the Israelites were escaping from Egypt, they were supporting ALL generations in faith and freedom.

When Jesus invited children to him and blessed him, he was calling the community to worship, celebrate, praise, and encourage the faithful to be intentionally intergenerational. For such is God's kingdom.

At Trinity, there are all kinds of ways to form faith intergenerationally. We want to continue to be intentional about these opportunities and highlight the ways that God is working at the intersections of faith.

From being a small group leader (which you don't have to have youth in the program to be) or serving at the Lutefisk Dinner, you can see the generations come together. From gathering over a thousand socks and underwear for Undie Sunday to decorating your vehicle for Trunk or Treat, you can see how the generations can serve together. There's also God's Work Our Hands, TrinityFEST, communion/greeting/ushering, and so many more ways to intentional serve across the ages.

Back in September, my partner Ashley shared after a busy Sunday morning that our youngest daughter Emily received no less than 12 hugs from 12 different impactful women. What a gift to have so many faithful "aunties" and "grandmas" at her church. What a gift to feel loved and cared for in Christian community.

I know she won't ever forget it.

May we continue to find ways to help the wisdom and love of the elder collide with the wonder and hope of the child.

More recently he has worked with displaced communities and refugees in the Middle East, focusing especially on Kurds.

He was also a presenter at the Nobel Peace Forum at Augsburg University.

This year's stewardship theme "God's Purpose,Our Gifts!" aligns beautifully with the work of outreach missions and the role we each play in sharing our gifts and resources with neighbors near and far.



Growing the Green **

Did you know that fall is a perfect time to plant a tree? We are taking advantage of that to add some more green to the Green (the "green space" on the south side of our church where the old post office used to be).

Even though we have found a number of ways to use the Green for worship and other activities, many have had the lingering feeling that the space is underutilized and underdeveloped. Over the past year, a work group has been looking at best ways to use the Green in the future and what, if any, changes should be made. After much consultation and discussion with internal groups, architects Brian Larson and Paul Homes (members of our congregation), a landscape architect, the city, and others, a plan has been approved to improve the Green to enhance its appearance while retaining its wide-open feeling for a variety of uses.

Now we are bringing this plan to life literally! The improvements to the Green will include a handsome lighted sign near the corner of 3rd Street and Myrtle (you may have seen the "test" signs in various locations over the summer), and a perimeter of maple and prairie crab apple trees on 3rd and 4th Streets. Vic and Connie Thalacker have generously donated the maple trees. The Prairie Crab apple trees have been purchased from a local nursery with a gift from Melissa and Aaron Haase in memory of their stillborn twin son, Nicholas. We are grateful for the memorial gifts and bequests given for this project, including a significant, anonymous memorial gift for the sign.

Our goals for the Green include keeping the space usable for a variety of purposes, enhancing the sense of hospitality, and being a good neighbor by keeping our property up to date and beautiful. Watch for these changes in the coming weeks.

We are so excited to be moving forward with this plan and look forward to the enhancements it will make.
