Waiting for the light.

This past weekend I had the great joy of spending three days with our eldest daughter, Maggie. She had purchased Ted's car and flew home from Northeastern Ohio, where she lives, to drive it back. I rode back with her, eager for time together and looking forward to being immersed in the life she has built for herself in Akron. (Which is a remarkably vibrant city!)

As Monday in Akron dawned, I woke with an ache in my bones that augers the arrival of an intense low-pressure system. Pulling back the drapes revealed an eerily gloomy day; not entirely unlike the deep threat of a June storm. But without the energy and anticipation of something coming. Maggie said that is what winters are like in Akron. Heavy, leaden gray. Warmer than ours, wetter. But with less sunshine.

My flight to MSP from Cleveland was an early one and we landed in sparkling sunshine. My spirit was hungry for the light. Hungrier than I had realized. And this after just a day and a half in the darkness.

Advent is a season set aside for waiting and watching. It was built into the liturgical year so that we—who are post-Easter people—can experience what it felt like to wait for a Messiah. For centuries, the people of God waited, hungry for light. Hungrier



perhaps than they realized. They were not a people without hope. After all, they trusted in God's ancient and abiding promise of deliverance. But the prophet Isaiah called them "the people who walked in darkness...."

Their darkness was not the darkness of an Akron winter. But it would not have been unlike the personal darkness of seasonal affective disorder, depression, grief, abuse, isolation or neglect. Neither would it have been unlike the communal darkness of poverty, oppression, conflict, exclusion, racism, or xenophobia.

Advent starts on Sunday, Dec. 1. Your pastors and worship leaders invite you to experiment with a seasonal discipline of weekly worship for the four weeks of Advent. Choose one service to attend each week or alternate between the two. Maybe one Sunday you will worship elsewhere with friends. But try the experience of letting weekly worship undergird your waiting and support you in whatever darkness in which you find yourself.

We also encourage you to step away from as much busy-ness as you can. Give yourself time to wait, time to anticipate, time to watch the darkness. Let the holy hunger of waiting on God lead you into the joy of what comes by the light of a glittering star. After a disciplined wait, Christmas comes with a poignant and deep joy, reaching into all the hungry, hidden places of your body, mind and soul. Filling you with a hope and joy that is enduring, even through the long Minnesota (and Ohio) winters.

Together and individually, we are entering a deeply holy time of year. May you be blessed as together we make our way through Advent.

#### Generous God, Grateful People.

As a member who isn't visible or out front leading the Stewardship emphasis here at Trinity, I was uncertain when asked how to approach writing this column. My first thought was my need to express appreciation and say thank you to Claudia Swendseid and her Stewardship Team. These good folks devote time and effort year round to developing a comprehensive emphasis which strengthens and invigorates our collective understanding and commitment to Stewardship. I appreciate their work helping to fund Trinity's mission and ministry so that we can love and serve each other and further God's Kingdom—or as this year's theme emphasizes: Generous God, Grateful People.

While trying to bring my thoughts back to the task at hand, I noticed squirrels scurrying around our back yard, mostly comprised of a contingent of aggressive black squirrels. One black squirrel was gathering sunflower seeds from the ground under our bird feeder, probably preparing for cold and snow. A couple grey squirrels were trying to barge in, but they were quickly chased off by the black squirrel. Must be that the black squirrel doesn't believe in sharing the harvest?

That said, Stewardship has always been a challenging word for me to understand—and I assume it challenges others as well. Someone once told me Stewardship begins with God's Grace and that it encourages faith in action. This broad definition suggests that I am not the owner, but a manager or steward of God's many gifts and blessings.

It is a challenge for me to fully accept that I don't own anything, that I am only a steward of all that I have and all that I am. I have to admit when I receive my monthly social security check my first thought is not that this belongs to God. After all, it has my name on it. But when I truly reflect on my blessings I fully, and I hope humbly, acknowledge a multitude of blessings-my wife Sharon, my family, career, health, financial resources, the blessings of retirement, heading south to escape the winter, and on and on. Through this wider lens I can praise God as the creator and owner and more fully respond to His incredible love through Jesus, His son. When I reflect on the big picture—on all of my blessings—I am enabled to respond with less emphasis on my ownership and more as a Christian Steward.

I'm pleased that the Stewardship Team, along with our pastors, challenges us to participate, to belong, to make the most of all that we are and of His many blessings to us. Is there no difference for them to educate and inform us of our Stewardship responsibilities than for them to teach and preach on the Ten Commandants? And being a manager does include funding Trinity's mission and ministry. The church should not refrain from calling us to be grateful and generous. As long as there are human beings with bodies and souls, our congregation will require material things in order to minister to them

from cradle to grave.

Obviously there are numerous other volunteers and Committees that deserve our thanks and gratitude. And we are so blessed with our pastors and our staff. I am grateful for the word and sacrament ministry, the Christ-centered theological foundation, the desire to reach out beyond the congregation, and the emphasis on inclusiveness—as well as the uplifting sprinkles of humor during worship. These mission and ministry values add to my motivation to financially support this faith community.

As a member of the Green Team Committee, I am also thankful that many recognize the need to face head on the threats to God's creation and to manage and use wisely our natural resources for the betterment of humanity and the planet on which we live.

And so I continue on my Stewardship journey. Sharon and I have pledged to this year's Generous God Grateful People emphasis. Many of you have also responded, and as a fellow member I say thank you.

I also recall a time-honored cliché that says "To do nothing is to make a decision." So if you haven't yet made a financial pledge, I encourage you to sit down, take a few minutes to reflect on your blessings, both large and small, and to then make a prayerful decision to pledge. It is your faith in response to a generous God—and it really feels good.

I'm just hoping the grey squirrels find an abundant source of sunflower seeds. Let's all pray for lots of generosity and gratitude!

## The Gift of Books in the Trinity Library








As The Map of Salt and Stars by Jennifer Zeynab Joukhadar begins, ten year old Nour and her family are moving from New York to Homs, Syria to be near relatives after the death of her beloved father. Within months of returning to their homeland, the enormity of their mistake is revealed as protests roil the streets and the bombs that were once thought to be a distant threat have crept closer. Tragedy inevitably strikes and the story is thrust into the horrific chaos that became an every day reality for the people of this country. They flee for their lives and become refugees seeking safety and home in a dangerous trek across the Middle East.

Nour, as narrator, brings to the novel the simple innocence and discovery of childhood. Having spent her young life in New York, she also brings western eyes to a very different land and circumstances that are hard for much of the world to grasp. A parallel story runs through the book as she recalls her father's epic bedtime story of a young adventuress who, centuries ago, followed a similar path across the region, imbuing the storyline with a thread of heroism and hope.

The author graces the narrative with a poetic and vivid flow made even richer by endowing Nour with the perceptual phenomena of seeing colors as she hears words, a gift which solves dilemmas and proves to be life saving. This is a captivating story of a child asking the universal questions of life and meaning about which we have all wondered.



While sitting at my kitchen counter sipping hot raspberry lemon tea the thought popped into my head to do some research on church coffee hours to garner information for this article. So...I typed the words "coffee hour at Lutheran church" in the Google search bar. In .055 seconds about 7,820,000 results appeared on the computer screen. The first result was a Google map with Trinity Lutheran Church, Stillwater, MN being the first thing I noticed. True story.

In the article, "The 4 C's of Fellowship" on Lifetouch.com, the author writes:

Coffee, community, comfort, and church are the foundation of fellowship across religions and denominations. Having a highquality coffee hour at your church will consistently attract members, encouraging ongoing bonding and stimulating growth.

Our coffee fellowship before and between services doesn't just happen on its own. It takes supplies, stocking of supplies, restocking, and volunteers working together to prepare and set out airpots of coffee, lemonade and water, trays of treats, and then cleanup when finished.

Our Coffee Crew has two shifts each Sunday.

#### Shift #1 is from 8-9 a.m.

These volunteers prepare coffee, lemonade/water, plate treats, and setup serving areas in The Commons and Narthex.

#### Shift #2 is from 10-11 a.m.

These volunteers keep coffee flow going by replacing empty airpots and treats until finished. Then, cleanup.

Donna Schafer wrote, "The goal of coffee hour incarnationally is to embody the welcome Jesus gives us to His realm." ("Ministry Matters"/"The Art of Coffee Hour")

So, the questions I ask are: How are you embodying the welcome of Jesus during our coffee fellowship? Will you help prepare/setup coffee? Help with cleanup? Volunteers are needed to help both shifts of the Coffee Crew.

If making coffee or cleaning up isn't your thing, it's okay. You may help by making or buying treats that will be served with the coffee. Please prayerfully consider joining and helping on the Worship Hospitality Team as you are able.

# EMERGÉNCY WINTER SHELTER Emergency Winter Shelter

While they were there, the time came to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth and laid him in a manager because there was no room for them in the Inn.

– Luke 2: 6-7 (NRSV)

The Christmas story is significant in may ways, not the least—the family had to seek *emergency winter shelter* in a stable. Many in our community face the same emergency shelter need during the winter months. Trinity is partnering in a community initiative that includes the Stillwater area faith community, civic groups, service organizations, Washington County Host team, and individuals called to provide potential life-saving shelter to those experiencing homelessness.

Emergency Winter Shelter operational planning meetings are currently underway, and the first volunteer training session is tentatively planned for Tuesday evening, Dec. 10. Please watch for confirmation of the date, time and location.

Trinity Lutheran Church and St. Andrews Community Resource Center will be the two locations for Emergency Winter Shelters in the coming months.

The shelter location dates, hours of operation, and temperature guidelines are as follows:

#### Emergency Winter Shelter – Dec. 29, 2019 through March 7, 2020, planning items:

#### **Operation dates:**

- St. Andrews Community Resource Center (SACRC) — Sunday, Dec. 29, 2019 through Saturday, Jan. 31, 2020
- Trinity Lutheran Church (TLC) Saturday, Feb. 1 through Saturday, March 7, 2020

#### Hours of operation:

- Daytime: volunteers 9:30 am-5:30 pm
- Nighttime: volunteers 5 pm 10 am (multiple shifts will handle this period)

#### Temperature guidelines to open (actual temperature, not wind chill):

- Daytime: Zero (0)F degrees if forecasted for a minimum of 3 hours duration.
- Nighttime: Below (or equal to) 10 degrees below zero (0)F if forecasted for a minimum of 3 hours duration.


