# Peace! Be still!

'Jesus woke up and rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, "Peace! Be still!" Then the wind ceased, and there was a dead calm.' – Mark 4:39

"Between stimulus and response there is a space. In that space is our power to choose our response. In our response lies our growth and our freedom." – Victor Frankl, Austrian neurologist, psychiatrist, philosopher, author, and Holocaust survivor

'...do not worry in advance about how you are to speak or what you are to say (to your enemies); for what you are to say will be given to you at that time;" – Matthew 10:19

These three quotes showed up in my life in the space of a few days. Each from a different source: first the theme for this newsletter, the second was in daily email devotional, the last in a devotional app on my phone. I don't usually think God is speaking to me through emails or billboards, but sometimes one has to wonder.

These simple statements beckon us with peace, space, and waiting. Each statement—two from Jesus and one from a Holocaust survivor—is an invitation to pause a moment before response, to refrain from worry about what might be before it is here, to breathe in God's peace, and trust that God is present to soothe, inspire or guide.

We have lived through a period ripe with urgent calls to action and a sense of hurry. Quickly! Respond, fix, act, write, vote, protest, mask, argue, vaccinate, decide, decide, decide. And do it NOW! So, we hurry up as fast as we can, we read as much as we can, we consult the experts, we fix, act, write, vote and so on. And we reach the end of the day exhausted, confused, dissatisfied.

Certainly, urgency is needed to respond to gun violence and racism, to carve an equitable way forward, to

heal the wounds of the past. Even so, there is room to hear Jesus say, "Peace! Be still!" Room for a single breath to invoke that holy peace, to calm our minds, slow our hearts, steady our hands. A single breath to measure our responses and pray for wisdom and discernment. A single breath to allow space to feel the boat steady and the waters calm.

I invite you to try this at home. Turn off everything. Silence your phone. Find a comfortable place to sit with your feet on the floor. Set a timer for five minutes. Then close your eyes and breathe slowly in to a count of three, slowly out to a count of five. If an intrusive thought comes, let it go—like a cloud moving across a crystal blue sky. And focus on your breath. Some people like to use a "mantra" to keep their thoughts from wandering. For example: you could think "God's peace" as you breathe in, "God's love" as you breathe out. Use any short phrases that calm you.

Five minutes will calm the reactivity within you. Your blood pressure will settle, your heart slow, your brain clear. Five minutes in the peace of God's companionship. Done as a regular practice, you will be able to access that calm in moments you feel compelled to RESPOND RIGHT NOW, when waiting a breath might be wiser.

God's peace is not a theoretical idea. God's peace is the ground of our being. It was the first gift of the resurrection. Peace that gives us space to access our own humanity and remember the humanity of the other, before we act, speak or decide. Peace that reminds us of God's abiding presence even in the hurry up times, the scary times, the reactive times. Peace that shepherds, nourishes, and comforts.

May you hear Jesus' words: Peace, be still.

# Dear Beloved Godparents,

I just wanted to take a little time to say thank you for taking on this responsibility and to share some of my hopes for you as my sponsors.

First of all, I want to thank you for your prayerful willingness and commitment to this holy relationship. Your presence means everything. Not just at the Baptism ceremony, but walking with me as I grow spiritually, with God and in partnership with Christ's church.

Being so new and young in this world, I know that I am going to need others and depend on a community to help me learn and live in the fullness of God's love in Jesus. I hope and trust that you will help me to keep finding myself in God's ancient and still unfolding story.

Also, it means everything to me to know that I will never be alone in this journey, that you are going to be there and have my back, even as I wrestle and wonder and have questions. Right now, I'm not going to be able to read or talk in full sentences, but I LOVE colorful books. Will you promise to read the Spark Story Bible to me? Even before I know all the characters, I want to hear your voice as part of God's voice in the world.

Your faith and your life will also show me Jesus in you. My parents were so wise to ask you to be my sponsors! They knew it was your faith and love, not your perfection, that made you such a good choice for me. I'm excited to see how you will be an example for me in what it means to live a faithful life. # frequently asked QUESTIONS

**Is a sponsor and godparent the same thing?** Yes! The titles are one and of the same, and Trinity often uses the words interchangeably to recognize the person(s) who help nurture the faith of the baptized one.

Does a sponsor need to be a member of Trinity? No. For the sake of feeding your own faith, we hope that you are active in a church community somewhere. And, if you need a church home, we welcome you to join us at Trinity!

### Does a sponsor need to be baptized?

Yes, but don't let that stop someone from being a sponsor. Jesus' command to his followers is to baptize, but thankfully water is everywhere (see the Ethiopian eunuch in Acts)! The call of the baptized often comes far sooner than the water is poured. If for some reason a sponsor hasn't been baptized, we would love to make that happen in anticipation of their role as a Godparent/Sponsor.

What is stewardship? That's not a rhetorical question. I want to understand what stewardship means. As a new member of the Trinity Lutheran Church Stewardship Team, I figured that I should know this. But I don't. So I turned to the dictionary and found a definition of stewardship: "the careful and responsible management of something entrusted to one's care" (https://www.merriam-webster. com/dictionary/stewardship). I like that.

Does pledging make me a

steward? My family began

pledging after we became Trinity members about 20 years ago. Previously, we pledged at Roseville Lutheran Church, where my wife Sarah and I were members for a number of years. We decided to join Trinity after moving to Stillwater in 2000 with our young children, Stefan (now 25), and twins Erik and Anya (now 23). We were surprised when a Trinity pastor said, no, we shouldn't simply transfer our membership—and our pledge—from Roseville to Trinity. Even though we had been attending for a while, the pastor encouraged us to learn more about where and how we could serve Trinity's ministries, and then make our decision about membership. And pledging. We learned that membership at Trinity isn't an administrative function, and that pledges are not akin to club dues. I didn't realize it at the time, but that process was really about holistic stewardship.

During my first Stewardship Team meeting I learned that 337 families have pledged to support Trinity's life affirming ministries during 2021. That represents a lot of giving. But it doesn't include financial gifts that weren't pledged. Trinity's ministries are greatly blessed by all gifts, whether pledged (https://trinitylc.org/giving/) or not. Pledge numbers do not capture stewardship of all the gifts entrusted to one's care: time,

talents, treasures—stewardship of all creation! How does that meaning of stewardship align with the "responsible management" definition I found? After all, if you can't measure it, you can't manage it, as they say in the business world. Trinity doesn't track pledges of non-monetary stewardship, although that is an interesting notion. And I'm not aware of a stewardship fitbit that counts daily numbers of steps walked in Jesus' path. Hmm, perhaps my "can't measure it" definition of stewardship is insufficient.

So how do I practice stewardship of all God's gifts, entrusted to me, and beyond measure? Trinity introduced me to a holistic understanding of what stewardship means. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America provides additional resources that discuss stewardship in different ways: generosity, creation, financial response, leadership, lifestyle, and a StewardNet newsletter (https://www.elca.org/Resources/Stewardship). I'm curious to learn more about what stewardship really means. Will you join me?

# Financial Highlights April 30, 2021

Contribution Income for April of \$89K was \$36K less than April of 2020 but, \$4K over last month. Note that April 2020 was the first full month of the COVID-19 pandemic shutdown of worship and a correspondingly strong outpouring of generosity from our congregation. Contribution Income YTD is still \$15K ahead of last year. Program Registrations, Fees & Payments and Building Rental Income are off a combined \$56K YTD vs. last year, showing the continuing effects of the pandemic and reduced activity in our building. Learning programs expenses are correspondingly down by \$25K YTD compared to 2020. As discussed, the timing of receipt of some annual Contribution gifts fluctuates every year. Overall, YTD Operating Expenses are \$46K less than YTD April 2020. YTD our Contribution and Total Income continue to exceed expenses, enabling us to maintain our Line of Credit Balance at zero for the fifth straight month! Last year we also had a zero balance against the line at this time.



The Trinity Scholarship Fund was established through the generosity and foresight of Jeanette Johnson, a dear, departed, long-time member of Trinity Lutheran Church. It was her desire to provide the means by which Trinity could offer assistance to its young people whose achievement and character have indicated that they possess the qualities necessary to achieve excellence in higher education. The scholarships are awarded on the basis of academic status, cocurricular achievement, good citizenship and active involvement at Trinity.

Special thank you to Jeanette's nephew, Bruce Rydeen for his efforts in seeing to it that Jeanette's wishes continue to be a reality.



Does a sponsor need to be Lutheran?

No. While we love the way that Lutherans live and love by God's grace in service to our neighbors, lots of Christians of different denominational stripes (or none at all) do this too.

Does a sponsor need to be a relative?

No. God's family is big and beautiful, connected by water and God's word. Young people need a lot of grown ups in their corner as they grow and mature in faith. Thank you for being one of their cheerleaders!

Does a sponsor have to do or say anything during the Baptism service?

Yes. Please stand alongside the parents/caregivers of the one being baptized. When the pastor prompts you to respond, just "follow the leader." You don't need to prepare anything, just come as you are!

Should a sponsor get a gift for the one being baptized? Up to you! It's not required, but a small keepsake for the one being baptized is a great treasure for them to have throughout life, and something that you can get out each year to help remember and celebrate on the Baptism anniversary. Gift suggestions: a book of prayers or blessings, a Bible, a cross necklace, a stuffed animal, or a special picture frame to hold a picture from the day of the Baptism.

Does a Baptism sponsor bear any legal custody responsibility? No. While parents/caregivers might separately ask you to be a legal guardian of their child, for the sake of being a Baptismal sponsor, your duties are to lead by example a life of faithfulness and love, and to pray for and encourage the one being baptized.

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# Thinking outside the box when planting trees

When I think of the three most popular trees with Stillwater residents. I think of crabapple, with its beautiful flowers and bark; spruce, with its attractive shape and screening abilities; and Autumn Blaze maple, with its amazing fall colors and fast growth. However, before you go out and plant one of these, I feel compelled to say this: these trees have become severely overplanted, threatening the health of the urban forest. And not just that, these trees actually have tons of issues that are rarely noticed until it's too late. Crabapple trees have many minor diseases, but these diseases have become prevalent because, well, so are the trees. Spruce trees will contract an alarmingly common needle disease, causing the branches to die from the bottom up. Autumn Blaze maples actually grow too fast, causing major structural issues, with the end result

often being a blown-apart tree after a bad storm. Consider some of these lessplanted alternatives:

### **Crabapple alternatives:**

- Eastern redbud—native to the Eastern United States, this tree has a brilliant spring display of pink flowers.
- Serviceberry—This vastly underutilized small tree puts on an incredible show of white flowers in the spring and has perhaps the best fruit you've never tasted (if you can beat the birds to it).

### **Spruce alternatives:**

- White fir—native to the Western
  United States, this is an extremely
  hardy evergreen. The needles, when
  crushed, smell just like lemons or
  tangerines.
- Swiss stone pine—A dense and narrow pine native to the Alps. It's a beauty.

### **Autumn Blaze Maple alternatives:**

- Kentucky coffeetree—an under planted Minnesota native specimen tree. They can look a little underwhelming the first few years, but your patience will be rewarded with explosive growth that is much stronger than Autumn Blaze.
- American elm—elms are back!
   Dutch elm disease-resistant varieties are dependable and absolutely beautiful. Try the St. Croix elm. The naturally disease-resistant parent tree was found just south of us, in Afton.

- Create a gradual off-ramp to the eviction moratorium that allows the federal assistance program to have time to take place to make renters and landlords whole.
- Follow the lead of the Homes for All Coalition on housing and homelessness concerns. That agenda is detailed and complex, so just say to go with Homes for All proposals. (Homes for all is a coalition of almost 200 organizations statewide, including providers, faith-based organizations, housing developers, and more. Lutheran Advocacy-MN is an active member of Homes for All).

**READ:** Check out the book everyone is talking about—*Caste: The Origins of our Discontents* by Isabel Wilkerson. 




