



With it comes the question: What delights, losses, opportunities will this new year bring?

Having abandoned the repetitive failure of New Year's resolutions years ago, I wonder what it would look like to just let Jesus do the heavy lifting: sweeping, cleaning, ordering my life. And Trinity? What would it look like for Jesus to come and sweep our shared house clean, put things in proper order, and burn the trash?

Yikes!

Those of us who have hung around churches, or families, know all too well that we struggle to agree on what is trash and what is treasure. Too often (maybe it's just me) we move quickly to a defensive posture with our feet planted and arms crossed in front of our own favorite ministry, practice, stuff.

But Jesus doesn't ask us what we'd like to keep. Jesus doesn't sweep around that to which we tightly cling. Jesus comes and *sweeps house*: every corner, under the beds (lost coin, anyone?), deep into the corners. Nothing is

hidden, everything is at risk. Not just the stuff, the practices, the ministries—but carefully crafted plans, budgets, even our understanding of who we are.

This is all much harder to imagine if we hear John's words as threatening, ominous: Get your house in order or Jesus will PUT it in order! Beware the burning pile!

But what if we hear John's words as a proclamation of liberation! Jesus will make you new!

Seen through the eyes, and broom, of Jesus, what might go in the bin? What in our collective narrative might go out the door? What stumbles, missteps, and errors need acknowledgement, forgiveness, and letting go? What practices take more energy than they give life? What commitments are more habit than joy? What room might we make by letting the broom whisk through?

Looking back on the first five years of our shared journey, we have worked hard to strengthen ministry that is positive, biblically grounded, theologically the best of our Lutheran confessions, transparent, sustainable, and inclusive. With that foundation, it's rather thrilling to imagine what might God sweep out and what might the Holy Spirit ignite within.

In the wake of the impossible made possible, the Incarnation, we now live with Jesus in our midst, making all kinds of things possible.

So here is to 2022 and what God might be up to: sweeping, clearing, ordering, igniting and uplifting!

Wise Men Remind us to Steward Our Gifts

"On entering the house, they [the wise men] saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh." —Matthew 2:11

The wise men (or magi or astrologers) are the first persons in the New Testament to offer gifts to the baby Jesus—specifically, gold, frankincense and myrrh. Christian tradition suggests these men from "the East" were wealthy and learned. They traveled a great distance and faced significant hardship to worship and offer their treasures to Jesus. What a beautiful example of stewardship they set for all future generations, helping us understand the blessing of using and sharing God's gifts.

To begin with, the wise men represent a sincere desire to seek after God, searching through science, nature, and their cultural traditions; leaning into their faith to discover God's will for them, even when it was something so unbelievable. Imagine their long, arduous journey, possibly thousands of miles to reach Bethlehem, over mountains and deserts, a journey that took many months. Surely on such a trip they faced numerous dangers from nature, bandits, and the fear of the unknown.

What faith, determination and sacrifice they must have had. They surely faced questions and skepticism from friends and family at the start. During their journey, unexpected challenges and discouraging setbacks would have been commonplace. Yet they persevered. They overcame the difficult trials of their journey, and persisted in their search for God's truth.

Their journey took them from King Herod's palace in Jerusalem to the insignificant village of Bethlehem. When they finally met God's truth, they found a Jewish peasant baby born in a barn. Imagine how astonishing that discovery must have been. Still, they went forward in faith, knelt down in worship and offered Jesus the most precious of their gifts. Even their leave taking was an act of faith and gift as they listened to God's warning in a dream and didn't return to Herod.

The story of the wise men is not simply a cute part of Christmas; rather, it represents central characters who



model a path of faith and stewardship worthy of reflection and imitation. They offer an example of a sincere search for God using the gifts they possess; a willingness to overcome significant obstacles in their journey towards God; and the witness of offering the best they had once they encounter the Christ Child.

Consider too, how the wise men are conscientious stewards with their knowledge, experience and wisdom, using their understanding of the stars to reach Bethlehem. As well they are stewards of their time and effort, journeying far. Further they are stewards of their wealth, showing that central to our worship of God is giving God our most valuable treasure—which is a way of saying, "You God are my treasure, not these things."

The wise men highlight that true joy comes through sharing all that we have. Finally, they remind us that the most important gift in this story is the gift of Jesus; what we have first received from God. Gold, frankincense and myrrh are nice, but not all that important, when compared to a Jewish peasant baby, the hope of the world, the gift of grace, the source of love, God's child, Jesus.

One day, a person complained to her pastor that the Church and Christianity is one continual "give, give, give." To

which the pastor replied, "Thank you very much for the finest definition of Christianity I have ever heard. You are right, Christianity is all about a constant "give, give, give." God giving God's only Child to the world to show God's unconditional love. The Child Jesus giving His life on the cross to forgive our sins and destroy death. Then our Lord's disciples giving all they had to make sure God's Good News of love was preached to all people everywhere. They not only gave away their homes and businesses, but even gave up their lives as martyrs in gratitude to God! And after all that giving of God to the world, yes, God does ask God's followers today to imitate God's own generosity by giving—by offering back some portion from all that God ultimately has given each person! So, yes, the Church and Christianity is one continual "give, give, and give," but from a good and holy perspective!

The story of the wise men offers a challenging perspective of Christian Stewardship. We are called to understand that all we have in life—from life itself, to our intellectual abilities and specific talents, as well as to our faith experiences and material possessions—all we have in life is God's holy gift. As we seek to follow Jesus, each of us is called, like the wise men, to steward these gifts.

Financial Highlights November 2021

Contribution Income for November of \$84K was \$10K less than November of 2020 Contribution Income YTD is \$13K behind last year. Mission Revenue is up \$17K vs. last year as are Missions expenses (Tiny Home program). Program Registrations, Fees & Payments and Building Rental Income are up a combined \$14K YTD vs. last year, showing an increased level of activity in our building this fall. Total Income YTD is \$10K higher than last year at this time. As discussed, we continue to see the timing of receipt of some annual Contribution gifts fluctuates every year. Overall, YTD Operating Expenses are \$26K higher than YTD November 2020. As we compare the difference in deficit this YTD v. last year, the increase in Staff benefits of \$17K v. last YTD is impactful but, unavoidable. YTD our Contribution and Total Income continues the depressed trend of the fall season, causing us to carry a balance in our Line of Credit of \$45K, up \$15K v. last year at this time.

HIGH SCHOOL MINISTRY MISSIONS 2022 - GLOCAL

In the last three decades, more than 1,700 students and more than 600 adults have been sent to various mission fields as representatives of Trinity Lutheran Church and the Stillwater community. Even though our recent attempts at a High School mission trip have been thwarted by COVID-19, we are hopeful that Summer 2022 will find us in a position to re-engage our Sr. High mission plans. In fact, Covid delays have allowed us to offer a unique two-pronged mission experience that normally could not happen. We're calling it our global+local mission experience: GLOCAL!

Puerto Rico: July 25 – July 2, 2022

In the summer of 2022, we will travel to a site in Puerto Rico working with host congregations near San Juan. The island is still recovering from Hurricane Maria in September 2017 and earthquakes in January 2020. We will work at various sites each day, cleaning up, painting, and doing light construction. Each evening will conclude with devotional large-group time; songs fill the campsite and a message of good news is shared by an adult or student leader. The group may also be organizing a Vacation Bible School for their partner congregations and take some time at the end of the trip to see some of beautiful, historic San Juan. This is our GLOBAL focus.

ELCA Youth Gathering, Minneapolis: July 24 – 28, 2022

Every three years, 30,000 high school youth and their adult leaders from across the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America gather for a week of faith formation known as the ELCA Youth Gathering. Through days spent in interactive learning, worship, Bible study, service and fellowship, young people grow in faith and are challenged and inspired to live their faith in their daily lives. For the first time in decades, the 2022 Gathering will be held in and around Minneapolis, with large group sessions taking place at US Bank stadium. Participants will stay in hotels near the stadium and participate in three days of learning, fun, and service in our own back yard. This is our LOCAL focus.

A Two-For-One Missions Experience

Because of a quirk in Covid-19 delayed scheduling, we are offering what normally would be two alternating summer events during the same summer. Thanks to some scholarship funding, to make both events accessible, the ELCA Youth Gathering costs will be rolled into our regular costs and fundraising for our Puerto Rico Mission Trip. Family commitment (out-of-pocket) money for both events will remain \$500, and sponsorship requirements will also remain at the level they normally would be for our PR mission trip experience. In other words, participating in the Puerto Rico trip also allows students to experience the Youth Gathering at no extra cost. GLOBAL + LOCAL = GLOCAL!

Flexibility: Events and Costs, 2020 Sponsorships

Schedules vary by family, so there is no requirement to attend both mission events. Students can choose one or the other (details on choosing the Gathering alone will be forthcoming), but we sincerely hope kids and families look at the fantastic opportunity to be involved in the life-changing experiences of both events. Also, we do not want cost to be a barrier for anyone, so scholarship help will be available as needed.

No mission experience would be possible if it were not for one group: the sponsors. For every wall painted or bucket of cement mixed, the sponsors' hands are also taking part in the process, and missionaries will have the opportunity to ask for any needed sponsorships at worship services in 2022. Online sponsorship options will also be made available. Participants in our original PR 2020 trip who collected sponsorships will be able to count much of what was collected to the 2022 mission trip. Specific details will be shared as we solidify numbers of participants involved in our 2022 trip.

Calendars and Schedules

Applications for our Missions 2022 events are due at our next informational/introductory gathering for students and parents on Wednesday, Jan. 5 with a \$200 refundable commitment money deposit due then. Our monthly bonding/preparation meetings begin Jan. 17, with monthly gatherings occurring as we prepare.

The tradition of High School Missions is an important part of our congregation, and we are excited to offer this unique mission opportunity to students in 2022! Questions? 
ABIDE Collection Inspires Readers



Dear White Christians by Jennifer Harvey If reconciliation is the takeaway point for the civil rights story we usually tell, then the takeaway point for the more complex, more


truthful civil rights story contained in *Dear White Christians* is reparations. From the preface to the second edition with the troubling and painful events of the last several years from the killing of numerous unarmed Black men and women at the hands of police to the rallying of white supremacists in Charlottesville, it is clearer than ever that the reconciliation paradigm, long favored by white Christians, has failed to heal the deep racial wounds in the church and American society.

In this provocative book, originally published in 2014, Jennifer Harvey argues for a radical shift away from the well-meaning but feeble longing for reconciliation toward a robustly biblical call for reparations. Now in its second edition with a new preface addressing the explosive changes in American culture and politics since 2014, as well as an appendix that explores what a reparations paradigm can actually look like Dear White Christians calls justice-committed Christians to do the gospel-inspired work of opposing racist social structures around them. Harveys message is historically and scripturally rooted, making it ideal for facilitating the difficult but important discussions about race that are so desperately needed in churches and faith-centered classrooms across the country. A Good Neighborhood by Therese Anne Fowler


The first page in Fowler's third novel, her first set in the present, lets readers know that there will be a funeral; they'll wonder whose it might be right up to the book's final pages. With his wife and two daughters, local HVAC celebrity Brad Whitman moves into his new dream house on the lot behind Valerie Alston-Holt's property, where





she lives with her son, Xavier, in charming Oak Knoll, North Carolina. When it's clear that the Alston-Holts' beloved, centuries-old oak tree is suffering because of the Whitmans'

construction, ecology professor Valerie, who is Black, takes action that prompts Brad, who is white, to reveal his true colors in a spiral of devastation. This is hardly an easy setup for the budding romance between teens Xavier and Juniper Whitman, which was already complicated by the purity promise Juniper's parents encouraged her to take. Narrated by the neighborhood, a diverse, collective "we" that sometimes interrupt their storytelling to reflect on all they knew and didn't know, this is a rippling story for fans of suspenseful domestic dramas. 
How the Word is Passed: A Reckoning With The History Of Slavery Across America by Clint Smith Beginning in his hometown of New Orleans, Clint Smith leads the reader on

an unforgettable tour of monuments and landmarks 'those that are honest about the past and those that are not' that offer an intergenerational story of how slavery has been central in shaping our nation's collective history, and ourselves. It is the story of the Monticello Plantation in Virginia, the

estate where Thomas Jefferson wrote letters espousing the urgent need for liberty while enslaving more than four hundred people. It is the story of the Whitney Plantation, one of the only former plantations devoted to preserving the experience of the enslaved people whose lives and work sustained it. It is the story of Angola, a former plantation 'turned' maximumsecurity prison in Louisiana that is filled with Black men who work across the 18,000-acre land for virtually no pay. And it is the story of Blandford Cemetery, the final resting place of tens of thousands of Confederate soldiers.

A deeply researched and transporting exploration of the legacy of slavery and its imprint on centuries of American history, How the Word Is Passed illustrates how some of our country's most essential stories are hidden in plain view whether in places we might drive by on our way to work, holidays such as Juneteenth, or entire neighborhoods like downtown Manhattan, where the brutal history of the trade in enslaved men, women, and children has been deeply imprinted. Informed by scholarship and brought to life by the story of people living today, Smith's debut work of nonfiction is a landmark of reflection and insight that offers a new understanding of the hopeful role that memory and history can play in making sense of our country and how it has come to be. ABIDE Readers Book DiscussionDear White Christians by Jennifer Harvey

ABIDE Readers is an engaging group of Trinity members, non-members, women, men, monthly attendees and occasional drop-ins, who discuss books (and stories in other media formats) that open our hearts and minds to the stories and to the lives of our neighbors. And who are our neighbors? When Jesus was asked that question, he replied with the story of a man who had been beaten and robbed. The victim was ignored by a priest and a Levite (those who held the most sacred positions at the temple). But it was a Samaritan (Samaritans were despised by Jews) who responded with utmost grace and compassion. Jesus turned the question back to the lawyer:

Jesus: "Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?

The lawyer: "The one who had mercy on him."

Jesus: "Go and do likewise."

Accountability, belonging, inclusion, diversity, and equity are the group values of the ABIDE Readers. We have much to learn, to discuss, and to do. Our Trinity Library is building an ABIDE Collection that offers powerful stories that bring us together in faith, hope, and love. In November we had an inspiring discussion of the absolutely amazing *Braiding Sweetgrass* by Robin Wall Kimmerer. We wrap up that book discussion on Dec. 27.

McMillian's case, including police and prosecutorial misconduct, with other startling cases. The war on drugs and tough-on-crime political postures have resulted in hundreds of juveniles sentenced to life imprisonment without parole for non-homicidal offenses. Among the cases Stevenson cites: a 14-year-old condemned to death for killing his mother's abusive boyfriend and a mentally ill adolescent girl condemned to life in prison for second-degree murder for the death of young boys killed in a fire she started accidentally.

Through these cases and others, Stevenson details changes in victims' rights, incarceration of juveniles, death penalty reforms, inflexible sentencing laws, and the continued practices of injustice that see too many juveniles, minorities, and mentally ill people imprisoned in a frenzy of mass incarceration in the U.S. A passionate account of the ways our nation thwarts justice and inhumanely punishes the poor and disadvantaged. 


OUTREACH MISSIONS

SUPPLY DRIVE FOR AFGHAN REFUGEES

REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT TEAM—IN MOTION





What can we as members of Trinity do to help? A newly-formed branch of the Outreach Missions team is working to find out. At this point, this yet-to-be-named refugee resettlement team has:

- Collected truckloads of much-needed supplies and furniture for apartments for newly resettled Afghans (in partnership with Lutheran Social Services). The initial outpouring of donations has been amazing.
- Eagerly begun conversations with Ascension Episcopal Church (our next-door neighbors), the Social Justice Group from Boutwell's and the Eastern Twin Cities Islamic Center (ETCIC) about forming a coalition to help resettle refugees in the Twin Cities area.
- Connected with agencies in the Twin Cities area about cosponsoring new families
 resettling in the area. Co-sponsorship usually involves welcoming families and
 helping them get oriented to their new environment; helping with shopping,
 language, customs and using public transportation; supplying meals for the first
 few weeks and much more.
- Discussed co-sponsoring refugees from countries other than Afghanistan.

The evacuation from Afghanistan was a chaotic affair, and the nature of the resettlement process is no less chaotic. We will keep the Trinity community aware of progress—and how folks can help—as information unfolds. 

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
