Community of **Practice**

"Don't pick on people, jump on their failures, criticize their faults—unless, of course, you want the same treatment. Don't condemn those who are down; that hardness can boomerang. Be easy on people; you'll find life a lot easier. Give away your life; you'll find life given back, but not merely given back—given back with bonus and blessing. Giving, not getting, is the way. Generosity begets generosity." – Luke 6:37-38 (MSG – The Message Bible)

Ever feel like a bible verse was written with you in mind? Like you want to look over your shoulder as it's read out loud to see if everyone is staring at you, to see if you are paying attention?!

Eugene Peterson's "The Message" bible casts familiar readings in contemporary language. It's not a great translation for academic study but it's fantastic for devotions and a fresh take on Scripture. In this reading from Luke, in NRSV translation, Jesus says "Do not condemn." Since it's not our call to send someone to "the pit," it's relatively easy to obey this exhortation and skip ahead to a parable or something more interesting.

But Pastor Peterson's rendering makes it harder to skip over. It pulses with, well, conviction. Pastor Peterson names human inclination with painful accuracy. Think about it. After months of noticing who masks, who refuses a vaccine, who flies which political flag – we have made criticism a national sport and developed a finely honed capacity to judge a person's worth on the presence or absence of a 5 x 6-inch patch of cloth. We are certainly weary of pandemic, but aren't we *just as weary* of the interpersonal policing that has accompanied it? Criticism and nitpicking others "rebounds" after all and that negative energy has polluted our spirits and interactions.

So, what do we do?

We learned a hard lesson last year – there are no promises about the trajectory of our pandemic life, no assurance that this is the year we put it all behind us. So we can ask ourselves, if this turns out to be another year of aggravation and impatience, can we <u>learn</u> to approach it in a new way?

Right after the first of the year, the staff was each asked: Setting aside pandemic resolution, where will you seek hope this year? The answers ranged from connection with others, to our staff team, to the God we find in the incarnation. And more. Naming these sources of hope gave us a direction for our spirits and we filled our own toolboxes with each other's ideas for hope-making in the new year. It was uplifting and empowering.

And it will take <u>practice</u> to re-orient ourselves toward hope.

Which is one of many reasons why we are starting to speak of Trinity Lutheran Church as a: **Community of Practice.**

We encountered this phrase when staff and council went through the Intercultural Development Inventory (IDI) with Karen Gieseke. The IDI is a tool used to guide our understanding and awareness of our own and others' cultures, learn to become respectfully attuned to culture, and become anti-racist. It's really hard work and we get it wrong. A lot. A Community of Practice is a covenant community that understands we are all learning. A Community of Practice invites us to begin courageously trying to behave and speak in a new way. And because anytime we are learners, we know that we will sometimes (often?) get it wrong. In a Community of Practice there is grace granted to make mistakes, to give and receive forgiveness, and try again tomorrow. Because we know the *only* way to go a *new* way is to <u>practice</u>.

As part of becoming a Community of Practice, both staff and council are sharing our Racial Autobiographies. These are personal narratives that answer two questions: "When did you first become aware of race? When did you learn the most about race?" It is incredibly vulnerable and tender to tell truths about ourselves and how we grew up. But as a Community of Practice, our stories are received with equal vulnerability and tenderness. Because we are learning together.

As a Community of Practice that exists within the body of Christ we are learning, practicing together all kinds of things, whether it's a re-orientation to hope, learning to be anti-racist, courageously using God language, practicing radically inclusive hospitality. We are learning to navigate the political season as people of God. We are learning to acknowledge the unique life experiences of those both within and without our community. We are learning what it means to really do what Jesus did.

Yes, we hold one another accountable for language and hurtful missteps. But we do so as fellow learners. Learners who look to hope and commit to developing the discipline to avoid the behaviors Jesus admonishes us against: fault finding, criticism, condemnation and contempt as sport.

What a gift it is to discover that after the 2,000 years, after 150 years, the season of Epiphany can continue to reveal ways to be made new by the power of God as a present reality right now. God who invites us into co-creation. That's what a Community of Practice is. Learning to be co-creators with God.

Sharpen your pencils, friends. We have thins to learn and things to practice.

Your fellow learner in Christ who strengthens us even for the hard things,

Remembering the Children Lenten Prayer Service & Discussion with the Rev. Joann Conroy, President of the American Indian/Alaska Native Lutheran Association



Every culture pays special attention to the children in its care. Injury and harm done to the young impacts all generations. In recent months, we have heard more news about the American Indian children who were sent away to boarding schools and died there without being returned to their families. This is a horrendous part of our nation's history, as are other atrocities against the tribal nations within the borders of what is now the United States and Canada.

In response to the request of the American Indian/Alaska Native Lutheran Association and our Bishop Patricia Lull, we join the Saint Paul Area Synod in 225 days of remembering the children who have died in Indian Boarding Schools.

We pray for the communities who suffered the loss of their children. Their relatives are now receiving their remains with grief and honor for burial in their homelands. We repent of the role of the Christian churches who supported the taking of the children to the schools and have remained ignorant of the harm and trauma caused over all this time. We commit to 225 days of remembering the children in this congregation, in worship and in learning more to restore loving relationship and work together toward God's vision of beloved community between American Indian Alaska Native relatives and non-Native relatives, who are all God's people.

"Tomorrow she'll appreciate it more than I'll miss it." This is what Keith Bellefeuille, my father-in-law, said in response to my questioning look after seeing him leave a (very) generous tip for the waitress who took care of us for dinner one evening in 1986.

"My father helped start it and I want people to have enough to eat." This is what my mother will say if you ask her why she gives (very) generously every year to The Union Gospel Mission.


My dad never really said why. He just picked a handful of civic causes that mattered to him, and he picked his church, and he gave generously to them his whole life.

I tend to think there is generosity in each of us. What turns tendency into behavior, however, are role models. I am blessed with good ones.

My father-in-law's nine-word statement has been in my head for 36 years. And more than once his generous nature has been the role model that pushes me (or us) to make a spur-ofthe-moment gift; as well as a significant, planned, annual gift.

My mom and I spend an hour together each January as she models the behavior of an annual giving plan. It's one of the best hours of my year. She has a statement to make about each cause, just like the one above for UGM. Her gift to the church is her most generous, and that's saying something. Her church decision is accompanied by memories of how important All Saints Lutheran has been to our family as well as her sense of amazement that God created the gift called generosity, something so deeply meaningful and important to both giver and recipient.

My dad modeled generosity in quiet but uncompromising ways. At a call from his pastor he'd sit for hours with dying church members he didn't even know, day after day. At a call from the Red Cross he'd drop everything and give blood or platelets because someone he would never know needed emergency surgery, and he was a universal donor. Over his lifetime he gave away barrels of blood. He was proud, and if nudged he'd tell you about it. And in the telling was the message, that is, the role that he modeled: Tonight someone needs a pint of your blood more than you do. Tomorrow someone needs the loving community of the church more than you need the money that

makes that community possible. His stories carried one part obligation and ten parts invitation: Give of yourself. Embrace God's gift of generosity. You'll know few greater joys.

As I said, I've been blessed with beautifully generous role models. I've joined the stewardship team at Trinity thinking that perhaps I can pay that forward. I hope these quick stories help you work out your own generous behaviors. Feel free to steal my role models. They'll guide you to the joy of generosity.

Financial Highlights December 2021

Contribution Income for December of \$168K was \$40K less than December of 2021. Contribution Income YTD is \$53K behind last year. Program Registrations, Fees & Payments and Building Rental Income are up a combined \$21K YTD vs. last year, showing an increased level of activity in our building this fall. Total Income YTD is \$9K less than last year at this time. As discussed, we continue to see the timing of receipt of some annual Contribution gifts fluctuate every year. Overall, YTD Operating Expenses are \$21K higher than YTD December 2020. As we compare the difference in deficit this YTD v. last year, the increase in Staff wages (includes 2% increase) and benefits of \$26K v. last YTD is impactful but, necessary. For the month of December we did reduce our overall deficit position by \$20K but, we still trail last year at this time. YTD our Contribution and Total Income continues the depressed trend of the fall season, causing us to carry a balance in our Line of Credit of \$75K, up \$35K over last year at this time.

How do we be church? What is the larger church of the ELCA up to in the mission of being church and how does our Trinity community connect and engage with the larger church community?





Youth Servant Leadership Camp



LENT BOOK STUDY: Somatic Abolitionism and Engaging Embodiment in My Grandmother's Hands

One of my favorite and most inspiring metaphors of incarnational Christian theology is an abiding appreciation of the Body of Christ. It's actually one of the most intriguing lines in the Apostle's Creed when we say together "I believe in the Resurrection of the Body." God dwells in both the crucified and risen body of Jesus. And our bodies too.

This Body as Paul Describes in 1 Corinthians is not simply an individual element or organ but an interconnected web of human flesh, and soul, and sinew. Everything is connected. Every part of us matters. The ones that we like and the parts that we don't. Neuroscience and physiologists are also noting that while the mind may forget, the body keeps track and keeps score.

In both call to action to heal our bodies and the Body of Christ as well as a powerful dismantling of white-body supremacy, Resmaa Menakem (a local Twin Cities author and clinical social worker) explores how our collective bones and muscles and brains are impacted by racism.

Through an incredibly thoughtful grace-filled—shame-shedding—heart mending—settling and slowing down process, Resmaa invites American bodies to rewire our core embodied systems in response to white-body supremacy. We all have a role and a body at stake in this shared work.

Throughout the season of Lent, Trinity's Racial Justice Ministry Team is inviting you into this embodied practice. Please join us in reading *My Grandmother's Hands* by Resmaa Menakem. Watch for upcoming discussion groups and action items.

It both shocked me and broke my heart. His story requires the strength of forgiveness to overcome. The detailed story can be read on Pastor Peter's blog page on the Trinity website. Chris struggled with multiple mental illnesses, took full responsibility for his mistakes, and found some peace working in the prison library and recommending books to other inmates. The selection of books was small and often in poor condition.

A person close to me said that when we lose someone, we need to honor them by lifting them up in our hearts and celebrating them. This book collection is a way for me to do that. In the months of January, February and March, you will see bins at Trinity designated for this book drive. I ask and pray that you will find the message of Jesus in your heart, and donate some of your gently used books for the inmates at the Willow River/Moose Lake correctional facility.

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

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Trinity Scholarship Fund

The Trinity Scholarship Fund was established by the estate of Jeanette Johnson, a Trinity member who dreamed of being able to offer college tuition assistance to youth whose achievement and character indicated they possessed the qualities necessary to achieve excellence in higher education.

Trinity awards up to four scholarships each year on the basis of academic status, co-curricular achievement, good citizenship and active involvement at Trinity. The trust also stipulates that scholarship recipients must be baptized at and confirmed by Trinity, and active participants in Trinity youth programs.

Once selected, scholarship winners may renew their scholarships for up to three additional years, providing they maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.75 or a "B-" or, in the absence of a similar grading system, remain in "fine academic standing" as indicated by official record. Scholarship recipients must reapply each year for renewal.
