Full to the Brim!

Full to the Brim. Four words we wouldn't normally connect with the discipline and practices of Lent.

Beginning with Ash Wednesday (this year on March 2), Lent is a holy, liturgical season of preparation for the coming of Holy Week. Traditionally a time of fasting and restraint, the focus has been on practices of self-denial – such as fasting or giving up some guilty pleasure. More recently, modern Lenten focuses have looked instead to adding a spiritual practice like daily prayer, bible reading, meditation, or service. In either case, the focus of Lent has been our own spiritual growth and purification ahead of the great gift of the Resurrection.

This year we are taking a different tack. Guided by the talented folks at "A Sanctified Art," we have chosen the theme of "Full to the Brim" which focuses on God's abundance and call to lives of possibility and justice. The Sunday bible readings paint a lively picture of God's grace and generosity and will ignite our holy imaginations. We look forward to this journey with you.

As you embark on your Lenten journey, both in the company of this community and in your private faith practice, I invite you to an exercise designed to fill you to the brim with God's lovingkindness. The meditative tradition of *Metta* is born of Buddhist practice and teaching and can

powerfully inform our own Christian practice and centering before God. Metta means "to care and wish well for another being without judging them, to accept them independently of agreeing or disagreeing with them, and without wanting anything from them in return. It is a universal love that can overcome all social, religious, ethnic, political and economic barriers." Certainly a hope for our time, is it not!

As followers of Jesus, we understand that God is the source of all love: familial, neighbor, romantic. Our capacity to love is part of the image of God in which we are created, and love is the life to which we are called. Love of God, Love of Neighbor.

The Metta practice begins acknowledging our belovedness – never easy, and then extending that love to those closest to us, and ultimately including the "tough customers" in our lives. It is a simple practice that promises to fill your cup to the brim, allowing lovingkindness to spill into the world.

A simplified version of this practice goes like this:

Find a quiet place and about 10 minutes. Even five, if you are just starting.

Settle your breathing. Imagine being bathed in a warm light. Breathe slowly in and out for a few cycles. Then repeat this:

May I be at peace. May my heart remain open.

May I awaken to the light of my own true nature.

May I be healed. May I be a source of healing for all beings.

Now cast your mind to include a few of your most/closest beloved. Turn the meditation toward them.

May you be at peace. May your heart remain open.

May you awaken to the light of your own true nature.

May you be healed. May you be a source of healing for all beings.

Now cast your mind to include that person or persons most difficult for you and repeat the same blessing.

When you feel "done" – which may be five minutes or 15 or more – breathe slowly a few more cycles and come back to wakefulness.

This practice in the presence of God is intended to create within you a well of lovingkindness, acceptance, equanimity, and world-transforming peace. As you imagine God's love brimming over onto the world, this type of intentional practice allows you to enter into and be a vessel for that love.

In addition, there are proven benefits of meditation: lower blood pressure, reduced anxiety, better digestion, less reactivity to discomfort or conflict, more recuperative sleep.

During Lent we are also offering a congregational book read; *My Grandmother's Hands* by Resma Menakem. Beginning March 9, we will gather each Wednesday evening at 7 p.m. in person or on Zoom for a chance to reflect, learn, and experience other practices that heal our community and our bodies and fill our collective cups.

Bring your empty hands, your open heart and join the journey.

Hybrid Church is just the Church

Lutherans have always been able to hold two things together simultaneously. It really goes to our very nature. Simul iustus et pecator, simultaneously saint and sinner. Both/And. Citizens on earth and citizens in heaven. The already and not yet. Jesus present in, with, and under the communion elements. The Word of God and the vernacular of the people. Always bridging.

At a conference this week, presenters shared their experiences bridging the intense simultaneity of in-person and online worship community. So much has changed so quickly. Folks who had never experienced a virtual gathering or a hybrid class now have joined the early adopters. Church leaders shared different experiments in technology, how they updated their systems to better quality as the pandemic ragged on, and how they trained and equipped their families to use the resources on the screens in front of them. Bible apps. Animator characters. Co-creators in streamlined content.

But over and over again, throughout the event, the presenters reiterated

that hybrid church is still just church: the body of Christ worshiping, learning, growing, and building faithcentered relationships.

Some of the platforms might be different and some of the distribution methods may reach beyond what we ever thought or imagined, but the message of Christ crucified and risen remains the same.

I came away from these conversations pretty re-grounded in the opportunity that being the hybrid church has always been who we are. A both/ and people. Translating the Gospel in context. Integrating faith into daily life.

This doesn't mean that we are all going to become avatars in some metaverse. It also doesn't mean sacrificing solitude and contemplation for constant screens. But it probably will include utilizing tools that help us stay connected, engage community and interact across new creative spaces, and tag our God-stories across the generations.

That's what the church has always been – which is Good News. Even in mobile form.



GIFTS MANAGEMENT

Returning the Gift We are showered every day with gifts—gifts we have neither earned nor paid for.

Words from a stewardship lesson? Of course. More specifically, words from an essay by Robin Wall Kimmerer, originally published by the Center for Humans and Nature in their Minding Nature Journal. (https://www.humansandnature.org/returning-the-gift)

"We are showered every day with gifts of the Earth, gifts we have neither earned nor paid for: air to breathe, nurturing rain, black soil, berries and honeybees, a bag of rice, and the exuberance of a field of goldenrod and asters at full bloom." Trinity's ABIDE Readers (see back cover) gleaned and treasured much wisdom and knowledge from Kimmerer's *Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants.* The stories of Giveaway Ceremonies and the Thanksgiving Address (Words That Come Before All Else) commanded our deepest humility and highest respect. The stewardship values that we merely profess are lived by Native Americans.

God created the universe and all that is within it and granted us the privilege and responsibility of taking care of all creation. That is pretty much the gist of the First Commandment and the first article of the Apostles' Creed. It is certainly the stewardship message we hear annually, although a daily reminder would be even better.

Kimmerer's teachings are similar to the lessons that our Stewardship Ministry Team (once called the Gratitude Team) imparts to us:

• **Gratitude** is the most potent offering we possess. It is founded on the deep knowing that our very existence relies on the gifts of other beings.

- Gratitude provides an opening to **reciprocity**, the act of giving back, to living in a way that the Earth will be grateful for us.
- Paying attention is an ongoing act of reciprocity in which attention generates wonder, which generates more attention—and more joy. Paying attention leads to amazement, but it also leads to acknowledgment of pain. Open and attentive, we see and feel equally the beauty and the wounds. Paying attention to suffering sharpens our ability to respond, to be responsible.
- Paying attention is a gift because attention becomes **intention**, which coalesces itself to action.
- Deep attention calls us inevitably into deep **relationship**.
- Naming the gifts with which we are showered establishes a relationship between giver and receiver and creates a feeling of
 - **enough**, a radical idea in a consumption-driven society.
- We are bound in a covenant of reciprocity, a pact of mutual
 - **responsibility** to sustain those who sustain us. All flourishing is mutual.
- **Generosity** is simultaneously a moral and a material imperative. The well-being of one is linked to the well-being of all.

Reciprocity in a culture of gratitude: we are showered every day with gifts which multiply by our care for them. We are called to offer our gifts of mind, hands, heart, voice, and vision and to dance for the renewal of the world— in return for the privilege of breath.

We will meet one Sunday a month in between worship services (at 10 a.m.) for caring conversation and discussion.





Wednesdays March 9, 16, 23, 30 & April 6

6 pm – Worship & Naming

6:30 pm – Discussion following worship

7 pm – My Grandmother's Hands Study Groups

Prepare – This prayer service may evoke lots of embodied emotion, that you may or may not be able to name. We ask that you sit with all that comes to your heart, mind, and body. Notice the rage. Notice where it hurts. Notice how you feel drawn and held. May the Spirit continue to move in all of us.

Service will include land acknowledgement, music, prayers, call and response, time of naming, reflection, poetry and blessing. Service will be followed by a time for discussion. Then those reading *My Grandmother's Hands* will meet in study groups.

Land Acknowledgement – Trinity Lutheran Church is located on the original and ancestral homelands of the Očhéthi Šakówiŋ (translated as Seven Council Fires) Dakhóta people, specifically the Wahpekute Nation (translated as Shooters Among the Leaves). We are on Dakota and Anishinaabe (Ojibwe) land. This land holds spiritual and ongoing importance for its original stewards, the Native nations and all Indigenous peoples of the St. Croix Valley region. We give thanks for their presence here since time immemorial. We also wish to recognize and honor all our Indigenous siblings who have and continue to call this land their home.

Prem – A poem by Abigail Echo-Hawk (Pawnee) written in 2021 – "I wrote this for our people, I wrote it because I couldn't quit crying as I read newspaper reports of this genocide against Indigenous people, I wrote it because my heart was crying justice that my tongue couldn't shape words for, so my hand did."

When they buried the children What they didn't know They were lovingly embraced By the land Held and cradled in a mother's heart The trees wept for them, with the wind they sang mourning songs their mothers didn't know to sing bending branches to touch the earth around them. The Creator cried for them the tears falling like rain. Mother Earth held them until they could be found. Now our voices sing the mourning songs. With the trees. The wind. Light sacred fire ensure they are never forgotten as we sing JUSTICE

Plessing – God of All Creation, who created this world with magnificent wonder and awe, awaken us to see the beauty of all our sacred relations. Mold our hearts with thankfulness and care, as we walk daily in prayer, seeking the fulfillment of your eternal blessings. Amen

DREAMS IN A DUFFLE BAG THE SADAT FAMILY UPDATE

If you had two duffle bags in which to pack your most essential and treasured earthly belongings-knowing you were to travel halfway around the world to a strange country, never to return home again-what would you choose? A shawl handed down through the generations? Or would it be wiser to pack a warm coat? The family photo album? Or should you bring your prayer book? A sports coat? Or would it be more astute to bring three pairs of jeans instead? Surely there would be no room for your favorite chair or the musical instrument you loved playing ... or your bike ... or your favorite cooking pan. Your television, radio and great grandmother's clock would never endure the jostling and tossing involved in a trip covering thousands of miles over who knows how many days? The one salvation you would have is knowing, regardless how full those duffle bags were, there would still be room for your hopes and dreams.

Really, what would you pack?

This may all seem like a theoretical mental exercise, until you greet the Sadat family of five at baggage claim #3 at MSP airport and help them load their life belongings—their nine duffle bags—into the back of a pickup. The Sadat family has arrived from Afghanistan via Fort Dix, New Jersey and members of the Sadat Family Welcome Coalition (SFWC) —folks from Boutwells Landing, Ascension Episcopal Church, the Eastern Twin Cities Islamic Center, the Minnesota Council of Churches and Trinity were there to welcome them.

Over the next four to six months the SFWC will help the Sadats transition into their new life; furnish and set up an apartment; bring them to health, social services and employment appointments; welcome them with a food train; help them with shopping and food needs; help them navigate mass transit; work with them on ESL classes; and create a support circle.

We don't know much about the Sadats at this early stage. We do know the

parents are a pleasant, ambitious couple, with three bright, curious kids aged 8, 6 and 5. And we know why they chose to flee Afghanistan. The Sadat father explained they left so their children could have a better future and a safe environment in which to explore that future. He added another thing he'd realized upon arriving in Minnesota—another reason for optimism—was "People here value us as humans and want to support us. Where we came from there was no value to human life anymore."

A sweet footnote: As the family was getting into a vehicle at the airport for a ride to their temporary housing quarters, a group of Somali youth shouted, "Welcome to America!" A greeting so big, it couldn't fit into a duffle bag of any size.

Trinity Scholarship Fund

The Trinity Scholarship Fund was established by the estate of Jeanette Johnson, a Trinity member who dreamed of being able to offer college tuition assistance to youth whose achievement and character indicated they possessed the qualities necessary to achieve excellence in higher education.

Trinity awards up to four scholarships each year on the basis of academic status, co-curricular achievement, good citizenship and active involvement at Trinity. The trust also stipulates that scholarship recipients must be baptized at and confirmed by Trinity, and active participants in Trinity youth programs.

Once selected, scholarship winners may renew their scholarships for up to three additional years, providing they maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.75 or a "B-" or, in the absence of a similar grading system, remain in "fine academic standing" as indicated by official record. Scholarship recipients must reapply each year for renewal.


