Veterans' Day * November 11

Veterans' Day began as Armistice Day to mark the end of World War 1 and honor those who served in The Great War. In 1956, after World War 2 and the Korean War, President Eisenhower signed a Congressional Resolution changing it to Veterans' Day to honor all who have served in our armed forces, especially those who saw combat.

Though we remember those who died in wars on Memorial Day, it's appropriate to remember them also on Veterans' Day.

Ron Bouton researched and compiled the numbers of those who have died in American conflicts:

Civil War (1860-1865): Estimated 620,000

World War 1 (1917-1918): 116,500

World War 2 (1941-1945): 405,400

Korean War (1950-1953): 30,500

Vietnam War (1955-1975): 58,200

Gulf War (1991): 260

War on Terror: (2001-2021): 7,700

Total – 1,238,560, the majority of whom

were men between the ages of 18 and 24.
