The Rector's Report for 2021

This time last year, we were praying and thinking, "SURELY the pandemic will be over soon..."

God answered our prayers with a "Not yet" ...and don't call me "Shirley!"...but he's been gracious and is getting us through ... just as he promises.

Here's what happened in 2021.

By the numbers: we had 9 baptisms, no weddings, and 10 burials (none of which were from COVID).

Our Average Sunday Attendance (ASA) in-person was 209 – a drop from our pre-pandemic ASA of 328. Our Online Average Weekly Viewings were 388 for the English service and 477 for the French service, for a **total average of 865 folks watching our online services every week**.

I'm still amazed at how many folks join us virtually!

But the most important stuff was what we did in person with each other. Here are the month-by-month details:

JANUARY:

4 (Monday) – I offer Drive Thru Communion. When the pandemic began, and the Bishop forbad inperson worship, we offered Drive-Thru Communion every day of the week, except Saturdays. When we were able to resume in-person worship, we continued offering Drive-Thru on Sundays after the 9:30 service and Mondays from noon-1pm and again from 5-6pm, for those who watched us online and wanted personal contact with a clergy person. Drive-Thru was a sweet time of touching in, praying together, and sharing the Sacrament. We dropped Sunday Drive-Thru when people transitioned to in-person worship and quit coming on Sundays. We continued on Mondays through June, when the number of communicants dropped to one.

6 – At the Wednesday morning Eucharist, we celebrate the Epiphany, when the Wise Men showed up to give Jesus gifts, and God revealed himself to non-Jewish people ... like most of us.

At noon, our parish staff gets together – as we do every week – to eat lunch and check in with each other, pray for you, and coordinate how we serve you and our community.

That afternoon, I hear the Confession from one of our parishioners. Like the Roman Catholic Church, we offer you the option of private Confession with a priest. UNlike the Roman Catholic Church we do not REQUIRE you to do that. Our stance about private confession – and LOTS of things! – is: All may. Some should. None must. If you'd like to make a private confession, please contact Father Soner Alexandre or myself, and we will be honored to let you unburden your conscience.

Senior Warden Mary Kay Predmore and I meet to pray for you, as we did every week in 2020 and will do every week until we get our new Senior Warden at the end of this month.

7 – I offer Chapel to our Preschoolers, which I do every Monday and Thursday morning. We look at parts of the building and what they tell us about Jesus and how he loves us, and I pray for each child and their teachers.

Father Soner, Deacon Julie Altenbach, and I attend the first West Orange Ministerial Association (WOMA) lunch of the year. Every month, local Christian leaders gather to pray for the community, encourage each other, and enjoy a lunch hosted by a church or ministry in the area. It's a way for the leaders of all the different "brands" of Christianity to get to know and trust one another, so we can love and serve our community as friends and coworkers, rather than competitors and rivals.

10 – On the 1st Sunday after the Epiphany, the Feast of the Baptism of our Lord, we baptize Charlie Joiner and Clara Duppenthaler in the morning and Phoenix Haughton in the evening, the first of 9 baptisms this year.

13 – Our Clergy Team meets – as we do twice a month – to check in and encourage each other and pray for you and our community.

14 – I meet with a couple for their Premarital Preparation before their wedding. An out-of-town priest is officiating their wedding, so I'm glad to step in and provide the preparation our Canons (the laws of the Church) require.

Our delegates to Diocesan Convention (Anthony Beckford, Chris Brown, seminarian Laura Cook, Janice Hull, Mary Kay Predmore, and all our Clergy) attend the Pre-Convention ZOOM Meeting to go over the 2021 Diocesan Budget.

21 – Deacon Julie, Father Soner, and I attend the Deanery Clericus at All Saints' Winter Park, which is a lunch with the Bishop and fellow clergy from the Central Deanery, which are the other parishes in Orange County. 24 – Our Vestry meets – as we do every month – to pray together, pray for you, and conduct the business of the parish family. Please see the Vestry Minutes published in the monthly *Messenger* newsletter and on the website to see what's happening every month.

We had our Annual Parish Meeting, when we celebrate all God's done in the past year; say "Thank You!" to our retiring Vestry members: Senior Warden Mary Kay Predmore, John Peacock, Patty Tate, and Dawn Wirbel; present the 2021 Budget; and elect Marci Babione, Steve Borst, Ron Lancioni, and Sarah Wolfe as our new Vestry members. I appoint Joyce Taylor to be our Senior Warden this year.

25 – My wife Debbie and I fly to Nashville, Tennessee to visit my 90-year-old dad as his Christmas present. He lives with my sister, and his health is declining, so we go several times this year to take care of him and to give him and my sister a break from each other (!).

28 – Our Diocesan Convention delegates ZOOM to practice how to vote at the upcoming virtual Convention.

29 – Senior Warden Joyce Taylor and I meet to pray for you... as we do every week for the rest of the year.

The Vestry meets for an in-house retreat to pray together, get to know one another, and organize themselves for ministry. Vestry elects Chris Brown as Junior Warden. Bob Tate continues as our Treasurer, and Joyce Taylor volunteers to be Clerk to keep minutes of all the meetings.

FEBRUARY:

4 – I attend the West Orange Ministerial Lunch.

6 – Our delegates attend the Diocesan Convention online to conduct the business of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Florida. I get elected to the Standing Committee, which is a council of advice to the Bishop, who participate in screening people for ordination as deacons and priests in this diocese, and who get a voice in every Bishop election in the Episcopal Church. I've served on this Committee twice before in the past 25 years.

8 – **I** attend the Ordination of Deacons at the Cathedral Church of St Luke in Orlando.

11 – I attend Business After Hours (BAH) with the West Orange Chamber of Commerce as a way to meet leaders, movers, and shakers in our community; to give our parish family more visibility in our area; and to interact with unchurched people with the hope of attracting some to worship with us. 14 – Bishop Greg Brewer visits our French Service to celebrate, preach, confirm 18 of us, and receive 2 more into the Messiah family.

At SHINE Kids' Club that afternoon, I burn the palms leftover from last year's Palm Sunday to make the ashes for Ash Wednesday.

16 – Our ACTIVATE teenagers host the Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper, and everyone begins Lent a pound or two heavier.

17 – Ash Wednesday. At Noon and 7pm we remember we are dust, and to dust we shall return, and from 5-6pm we offer Drive Thru Ashes for those who chose to watch us online.

Vestry Outreach Team leader Doreen Stachowski and I present a check to the Christian Service Center to help renovate their dining area and kitchen.

18 – I attend my first Standing Committee meeting of the year.

Vestry moves its meetings from the 3rd Sunday to the 3rd Thursday of the month to accommodate a member whose work schedule changed and has him working on Sunday afternoons.

20 & 22 – I join Junior Warden Chris Brown and his team of volunteers on a lift to paint the steeple cupola and bell tower, rewire the parking lot lights, treat the big cross to paint it later, and trim some trees. Thank God for people not afraid of heights!

23 – I attend the first Commission on Ministry (COM) meeting of the year. The COM helps the Bishop screen, encourage, and develop people who want to be ordained deacons or priests. I've served on this team since 2001.

25 – I attend the Advisory Committee for the Hope Center, a new ministry coming to Winter Garden to help low-income people with food, clothing, and finding work.

MARCH:

4 – I attend the West Orange Ministerial Lunch.

6-I celebrate the life of Billy Burch, a former parishioner. We do several funerals like this a year for folks who used to be in the Messiah family or who don't have a church family of their own as an act of kindness and compassion and as part of our ministry in our community.

17 – We baptize Sterling Wilkinson, Philip and Anna Clare Wilkinson's son at the Wednesday morning service, because that's when all the grandparents were able to travel here for the glorious occasion. 18 – I attend the Standing Committee in the afternoon and chair the Vestry meeting that evening.

20 – I celebrate Communion at the conclusion of our Women's Retreat.

21 -- I celebrate and preach for the Sunday services at Christ Episcopal Church in Cedar Key, Florida while their Rector (and my good friend) Father Jon Davis is away leading a church leadership conference. Our capable Clergy and Music Teams cover all the bases here while I'm away.

23-24 – I attend BACAM (the Bishop's Advisory Committee on Aspirants to Ministry) as part of my duties on the Commission on Ministry. BACAM is 2 days of interviews with people who feel called to ordination as deacons or priests. At the end, the COM makes recommendations to the Bishop whether each aspirant should continue in that process... or not.

26 – As part of our Lenten journey We walk the Way of the Cross, which are the 14 pictures on the walls of the Church between the stained-glass windows that depict Jesus' steps on that first Good Friday from his trial before Roman Governor Pontius Pilate through his death on the cross and burial in the tomb. Deacon Julie officiates at noon, and I lead it that evening.

27 – Lay Weeder Workday as a dozen of us rake leaves, pull weeds, trim bushes, and spread mulch to spruce up the place for Holy Week and Easter.

28 – Palm Sunday as we gather under the big cross to bless our palm fronds and parade into the Church to remember Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem on that first Holy Week.

31 – We walk the Way of the Cross again on Wednesday in Holy Week.

APRIL:

1 – I attend the West Orange Ministerial Lunch.

We eat a Last Supper together on Maundy Thursday, and take Communion with our grandchildren from All Souls' Church, as their Vicar Father Matt Ainsley celebrates, and I preach

3 – Our Altar Guild folks clean, polish, shine, and get our sanctuary ready to celebrate the Resurrection.

Children's Minister Angela Lopez hosts an Easter Party for our elementary aged children, and I lead messy games to end the event.

4 – Alleluia! Christ is Risen! The Lord is Risen indeed! Alleluia!

8 – Debbie and I attend a Deanery Clergy Social with many of the other clergy couples from Orange County.

10 – I teach "The Early Church: A Missionary Model" for the Institute of Christian Studies, our diocesan Deacon School.

15 – I attend the Standing Committee in the afternoon and chair the Vestry meeting that evening.

18 – We celebrate the life of longtime faithful member Lynne Passilla.

27 – I attend the Commission on Ministry.

May:

6 – Vestry members Wendy King and Wally Stewart and I attend a Giving Conference at All Saints Church in Winter Park. They tell us to do what we're already doing!

Senior Warden Joyce Taylor and a team set up the Compassion Journey in the Narthex hallway and library in preparation for Compassion Sunday.

7 – I take Communion to a couple who are staying home because the wife is going through chemotherapy. If you cannot make it to church due to your health, please call the office, and one of our Clergy Team will come visit, pray with you, and bring you Communion.

9 – Mothers' Day and Compassion Sunday. We celebrate our mothers and 30+ families here volunteer to sponsor children in poverty through Compassion International.

11 – I attend a ZOOM Standing Committee meeting to begin our work toward electing our next Bishop when Greg Brewer retires in mid-2023. An episcopal election takes THAT long to arrange, gather candidates, do the election, get the approval of a majority of the bishops and other Standing Committees of the other dioceses in the Episcopal Church, and then pull off an ordination... with several thousand participants and worshipers.

20 – I attend the Standing Committee in the afternoon and chair the Vestry meeting that evening.

23 – Pentecost! We celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit and enjoy a Pentecost Picnic with our family from all 5 Sunday services.

26 – Children of the Messiah Preschool Graduates their latest crop of students. I'm there to hug each child, give them a Bible story book, and pray for their families.

JUNE:

1 – Our Preschool Day Camp gives kids and parents a break from each other.

3 – I attend the West Orange Ministerial Lunch.

5 – I officiate as Lionel and Karen Williams renew their wedding vows for their 40th anniversary. If you'd like to renew your vows, talk to me. I'd love to help!

8 – A dozen of us long-time Messiah folk attend former rector Art Dasher's funeral at the Roman Catholic Cathedral in Orlando. After his retirement, Art converted to Catholicism... which in no way diminished our love and appreciation for him and his time as our rector from 1970-1977.

That evening Debbie and I attend another Deanery Clergy Social.

9 – I attend Susan Shannon's funeral at the Cathedral Church of St Luke in Orlando. Susan was a faithful mover and shaker in our diocese who served on the Commission on Ministry with me for 20 years, and bounced back and forth several times serving on the Diocesan Board (the Vestry of the Diocese) and the Standing Committee.

17 – I attend the Standing Committee in the afternoon and chair the Vestry meeting that evening.

19 – I join our ACTIVATE Youth Group for a Saturday Play Day to say "thank you" and "good-bye" to Volunteer Youth Minister Murph Borno and to welcome Garine Adams to that position.

20 – We pray for and bless our dads for Fathers' Day.

21-25 – Vacation Bible School attracts a parish hall full of excited children and faithful volunteers. I get to lead games!

26 - We celebrate the life of Tyrone Ramotar.

28 – We offer Drive-Thru for the last time. No one comes, which showed it was time to end.

JULY:

1 – We host the West Orange Ministerial Lunch.

4 – Happy Birthday, America!

6 – We have the first Men's Supper in 18 months, as the Bishop lifts his ban on food events! Wally Stewart and Ted Malans fry fish!

10 – We celebrate the life of longtime parishioner Dawson Peacock and lay him to rest in the Memorial Garden. 12-14 – My family meets in New Smyrna Beach for our annual vacation together with all my grown children and their kids.

15 – I attend the Standing Committee in the afternoon and chair the Vestry meeting that evening.

18 – Now that we can have food again, Wendy King throws an ice cream social! And we relaunch Sunday Suppers.

21-22 – Diocesan Soul in the City Mission Project in Lakeland and Mount Dora. Our teens pick up litter, pressure wash, move furniture, and organize a clothes pantry for a social services ministry the first day, and play the second day.

26-30 – Our teens join the youth from First United Methodist Church of Winter Garden for Mission Week at a farm in Winter Garden, a social services outreach in Clermont, and at the United Methodist Camp in Leesburg. We host the closing supper and ceremony.

31 – The Rummage Sale gives all our families the opportunity to clean out their closets and garages, pick up some of other people's stuff, and earns \$4,000 for the Church at the same time! Thank you, Ron Bouton, and your excellent Team!

AUGUST:

1 – We celebrate the life of longtime parishioner Pete Glynn.

2 – Father Jonathan French meets with our Vestry and Staff to check us out, as we apply for a \$150,000 grant from the Diocese to pay half the salary for an Apprentice Rector. Jonathan is the gatekeeper for that grant. We pass!

3 – I cook for Men's Supper, because a good Rector'll do that!

5 – I attend the West Orange Ministerial Lunch.

6 – The Preschool Staff greets all our new students and their families at Meet Your Teacher.

7 – I officiate as Clive McCalla and Camille Phillips renew their wedding vows.

12 – I bless Timothy Henry's apartment. If you would like your home, business, or car blessed, please call one of our priests, and we'll be there. It's what we Clergy do: dress funny and bless things!

14 – I travel to Lake Placid, Florida, to help ordain Robin Reed to the priesthood as part of my ministry on the Commission on Ministry, and because I'm a team player in the Diocese. It's good for us old longtime clergy to be there to encourage the newbies! 15 – Seminarian Laura Cook preaches a fine sermon 4 times before she returns to Toronto, Canada for her last year in seminary.

16-18 – Debbie and I fly to Nashville to celebrate my dad's 91st birthday.

19 – I attend the Standing Committee in the afternoon and chair the Vestry meeting that evening.

20 – We celebrate the life of Tina Sydnor's mother Catherine Sizemore.

21 – We baptize Killen Cook on Saturday, because that's the only day all his out-of-town family can be here.

22 – We baptize Paris, Bella, and Dylan McCulloch, grandchildren of former members Duncan and Ruth McCulloch.

That afternoon, we celebrate my 25th anniversary as your rector. NOT LONG ENOUGH!

24 - I attend the Commission on Ministry.

25 – I join a ZOOM Standing Committee meeting with the Bishop.

28 – We host the diocesan Conference on Ministry which introduces the ordination process to those considering a call to be ordained a deacon or priest. Our own Facilities Minister Jeremy Adams and Children's Minister Angela Lopez attend to begin exploring a call to be deacons.

SEPTEMBER:

1 – With COVID numbers climbing, the Bishop puts a ban on food events again, thus throwing our Sunday Suppers back to picnic style.

2 – I attend the Deanery Clericus, a lunch with the Bishop and other clergy from our Deanery.

5 – We begin the online Messiah's Way: challenging us all to pray and ask the Messiah what he'd like each of us to do with and for him in 2022.

Facilities Minister Jeremy Adams, Office Minister Julie Altenbach, and I attend All Soul's last Sunday with us, so they can express their gratitude for all we've done to host them for 18 months of the pandemic, when Orange County Public Schools wouldn't rent space to them for their fledgling congregation.

9 – I attend a launch meeting for the Parish Profile Project Team, which will send a couple of folks to each congregation in the diocese to produce a short written and video glimpse of that church to help the candidates in our Bishop election get to know our diocese. 11 – Several faithful Lay Weeders spend a Saturday spreading out the oak mulch from removing 4 dead trees and grinding the stumps. Thank you, Wally Stewart and John Peacock for assembling the Team, and thank you Harry Hull and your friend Lenny for bringing your tractors to move the grindings.

16 – I attend the Standing Committee in the afternoon and chair the Vestry meeting that evening.

19 – We celebrate 71 years of service in our community at our Parish Birthday Party.

23-25 – I attend the RADVO (Radical Vocations) Conference in Dallas, Texas to promote our Diocese and fish for our Apprentice Rector. RAD-VO's goal is to attract young people to consider the priesthood as a career.

26 – Diving Deeper kicks off its 10th year, with a year-long look at the New Testament. It meets each Sunday afternoon from 5-6pm in the Library and is posted online. About a dozen folks attend in person and another 150-300 watch it online.

27 – We celebrate the life of Michael Samuels, who was not part of the Messiah family, but whose family needed a place for his funeral.

28 – I attend another ZOOM Standing Committee meeting about our upcoming Bishop's election.

30 – As condition of our receiving the Diocesan grant for our Apprentice Rector, I join the first of a monthly Residency Coordinator ZOOM call I now have with other pastors who have interns, residents, and apprentice pastors.

OCTOBER:

3 – St Francis of Assisi shows up and blesses a pack of dogs for our annual Pet Blessing for St Francis' Day.

7 – We host the West Orange Ministerial Lunch.

11 – I attend a Parish Profile Project Team meeting.

13 – I join the monthly Residency Coordinators' ZOOM call.

14 – Office Minister Julie Altenbach and I host a lunch for our volunteer Office Angels to thank them for their ministry to our parish family and to orient the new ones to their duties.

16 – We celebrate the life of Chadd Smith, Bill and Patti Smith's youngest son.

17 – We host a video viewing of Fred Ridley's funeral. Fred was a neighbor of parishioners Ansel, Ina, and Marvin Haughton. He was an assistant pastor of a church in Chicago. His funeral was there, and we showed the video of that service for his friends and family who live here and couldn't make it to the service in Chicago.

18-20 – I attend the annual Diocesan Clergy Conference at Canterbury Retreat and Conference Center in Oviedo.

21 – I attend the Standing Committee in the afternoon and chair the Vestry meeting that evening.

26 – I attend a Commission on Ministry Meeting.

We celebrate the life of Janet Robinson.

28 – I attend the West Orange Chamber of Commerce Business After Hours.

31 – We host Trunk or Treat in our Main Street parking lot for parish and neighborhood children and give away 120 hot dogs and a ton of candy.

NOVEMBER:

1 - I celebrate Eucharist for our Daughters of the King as they celebrate All Saints' Day and the anniversary of their chapter's formation in our parish.

I attend a Parish Profile Project Team ZOOM.

4 – I attend the West Orange Ministerial Lunch.

That evening the Ladies' Night of Beauty packs the Parish Hall with women pampering themselves with sweet-smelling stuff. The event raises several thousand dollars for the Operating Fund. I'd tell you more about it, but I don't know more, because I don't pass the physical to attend!

8-13 – Debbie and I go to Nashville to care for my dad while my sister goes on vacation.

10 – I attend a Standing Committee ZOOM about the upcoming bishop's election.

17 – Office Minister Julie Altenbach throws a Thanksgiving Lunch for the Staff.

18 – I attend the Standing Committee in the afternoon and chair the Vestry meeting that evening.

20 – Children's Minister and Acolyte Wrangler Angela Lopez and I train a new crop of acolytes and enjoy a lunch together.

25 - Thank you, Lord, for everything!

27 – I give Last Rites to Norma Hirbi, former parishioner Lori Jowett's mother.

28 – Bishop Brewer allows us to offer Communion with wafers and intinction (dipping them in the wine). It's not yet ideal, but it's a start back to "normal!"

DECEMBER:

3 – We host the West Orange Ministerial Association lunch.

3– Light Up Winter Garden packs downtown with 3,000 people. I coordinate the event with the City, and our Worship Band provides the music.

4 – The Parish Profile Project kicks off with the Messiah family being the first parish they visit and record a video tour.

Our Outreach Team and ACTIVATE Youth throw a Christmas Party for the Edgewood Children's Ranch, providing a pizza supper, an art project, and presents for all the children.

7 – I attend a Standing Committee ZOOM meeting about the upcoming Bishop's election..

8 – I join the month Residency Coordinator ZOOM.

10 – I attend the Messiah School for the Arts winter concert to applaud our parishioners taking music lessons.

16 – I attend the Standing Committee in the afternoon and chair the Vestry meeting that evening.

17 – I attend a Chamber of Commerce Ambassador photo-op at the new Tractor Supply store in Winter Garden.

I attend the SHINE Kids' Club Christmas Party.

18 – I help our Altar Guild vacuum, dust, polish, and preen our space to get it ready to celebrate the Messiah's birthday.

23-25 – We start our Christmas celebrations on Christmas Eve EVE with Contemporary Communion in the Parish Hall with the Worship Band and continue on Christmas Eve with Children's, Traditional, and French services, and on Christmas morning with Quiet Communion on guitar. 541 folks worship with us in person and another 695 watch us online!

26 – We baptize Mateo Jean at the French service, the last of our 9 baptisms this year.

Even with COVID raging around us, 2021 was a GREAT year!

- Though a couple dozen Messiah folk caught COVID, and we had 2 parishioners who died WITH it, no one died OF it.
- We have given away 1,000 servings of Communion every month for the 21 months of the pandemic, while many dioceses and parishes have not had "real" communion for that whole time.
- Though we offer Mail-Out Communion for folks watching us online, the numbers of people asking for that has plummeted, which is because folks are coming back in person!

Whatever life sends us in this new year, I can't wait to see what the Messiah has for us in 2022.

First, it is good always to have a heart of gratitude and thanksgiving towards God. We should be thankful to HIM with all that is within us, with all our heart, spirit, soul, and body, for his protection and healing from this pandemic and other diseases that could destroy our lives.

Through this short report, I want to remember all the blessings God has bestowed upon the Messiah Family throughout the year 2021. He gave us strength, patience, compassion, kindness, and love to realize works for his glory, especially for the confirmation of ten members of the Haitian Congregation by Bishop Brewer on February 14, 2021.

While some thought that things would be better, 2021 proved to be another year of dealing with challenges and restrictions from a pastoral perspective. However, with our Tech Minister, Church of the Messiah quickly adopted to digital transformation to increase attendance. As a result, many people regularly watch our services online, expressing their satisfaction.

In addition to my regular duty of preaching, celebrating, teaching, attending staff and clergy meetings, leading Bible study on Wednesdays and Sundays over the past year; I have led a ZOOM activity each Thursday for two years with people from Canada, Brazil, Chile, Haiti, Guadeloupe, and the United States. Each week, we do a different activity. The first and second Thursday we do Bible Study, third Thursday we discuss a social topic, fourth Thursday, we pray.

I am doing a D.Min (Doctorate in Ministry on Congregation Development) at Bexley Seabury Seminary, Chicago. I am thankful to God, who gives me the intelligence and audacity to do it. I am also very grateful to each of you, particularly to Fr. Tom, for your flexibility and encouragement. I am halfway finished, and the final step is to write the thesis. I still need your prayers of support.

I keep receiving requests from Xodus to return to the prison ministry at Lake Correctional. Unfortunately, my R-1 Visa was expired in April 2021, and my driver's license as well and the Immigration Service has had my application to extend my Visa for 10 months and not approved it yet, nor have they given me an answer why. Father Tom is actively pursing clearing this up. Therefore, I cannot do pastoral visits outside of Campus.



Facilities Ministry submitted by Jeremy Adams

I'm pleased to report that we saw a significant increase in our rentals in 2021. We had a total of 21 contracts signed by 11 different clients generating a gross total of \$20,921.88 in rental income with an additional \$6,177.50 contracted for 2022. The total amount of the contracts signed in 2021 was \$27,099.38, that's a growth of approximately 94% since 2020.

In addition to the parish hall and sanctuary, we also rented out the library, youth hall, parish hall kitchen, and Tilden Street parking lot this year. Some highlights of the year include continuing our relationship with Horizon West Theater Company, working with location scouts in the Orlando film industry, and signing contracts with a new theater company that will be performing their premier show in January 2022.

Other facilities highlights for 2021 include: installing a new ceiling in the east side of the Youth Hall, cleaning the bell in our bell tower, our sanctuary being featured in an Advent Health commercial, hosting services and meetings for our granddaughter church All Souls, and providing space for Bethlehem Missionary Baptist Church to host a repast for a member of their congregation. Thank you to our Junior Warden, Chris Brown, for the excellent work he did throughout the year coordinating the big projects, and the rest of the building repair and maintenance team for all of the help and making themselves available.

The roof in our parish hall leaked sporadically throughout the year. It was inspected and patched after each leak. I am told by the roofing company that the leaks are being caused by rusty roof nails that have lost their tops. Other than some cosmetic damage to old soundproofing panels, these leaks haven't caused any notable damage. It is my understanding that we should expect these periodic leaks to occur until the roof is replaced.

As always, please continue to let me know if you see anything around the campus that needs to be fixed.

Thank you everyone for the love and support this year. It's such a pleasure to work here at the Church of the Messiah and my family is eternally grateful for our Messiah Family.

Finance Minister

It might look to many as if the COTM staff consists of less than a baker's dozen. It might surprise you to know that between church, preschool and school of the arts, Church of the Messiah has over 40 W2 employees. Due to the recording requirements of the IRS, health insurance vendors, Episcopal Pension System and Workers Compensation insurance, the days of handling the payroll with a check register and a single Excel sheet are gone. In the first quarter of 2021 we began to change to accounting software that includes what we need to comply with the IRS regulations for submitting payroll reports electronically and keep track of employee hours for pension requirements, healthcare eligibility, tax reporting, etc. As we began to ramp up in late January, I came down with COVID and we could not fully implement the system until April.

In the second quarter of 2021 we moved to direct deposit of all Church, Preschool and MSFTA employees. At this time, we began working with the pension provider to bring all the eligible employees at the preschool into the pension system.

The third quarter was a continuation of working back and forth with the various vendors to have more payments automated where possible and where they can be verified prior to payment.

In the fourth quarter the pension vendor finally started giving us the figures to bring the teacher pension payments current. They have not completed their final figures yet.

I have been enjoying writing back and forth with some parishioners who have included messages and prayers with their tithes in the mail. I continue to enjoy discovering how COTM has grown over almost ³/₄ of a century and continues to thrive during a time when other parishes have struggled and even close. Church of the Messiah is a special place and surely reaps favor and blessing from our Lord.

Highlights for 2021

This year the Vestry increased the proportion of our Plate & Pledge income that we give for local missions from 2% to 5%. With those extra funds, we were able to assist the following ministries with either volunteers, financial donations or merchandise they needed during 2021.



BUDGET Explanations for 2021

"OPERATING INCOME" includes "Plate and Pledge" (our tithes and offerings given in weekly worship) and all "Other Income" received with no strings or conditions. It funds the ongoing ministries of the parish and keeps the doors open and lights on.

2021 was a tough year. Giving in 2020, when the pandemic began, stayed the same as in 2019 as people continued giving, even though they weren't attending worship in person.

Giving in 2021, however, was \$57,000 less than 2020, as it appears many folks who quit attending in-person also quit giving. Add to that decrease in giving an increase in expenses of \$113,000 (SEE Payroll BELOW). That combination put us deep into the red for the year.

Graciously, in 2020, God provided \$122,900 in Payroll Protection Program money we didn't need in 2020, so we tucked it away in "Designated Giving" until we were sure it was a grant and not a loan. The loan was forgiven in early 2021, and we converted that money into "Other Income," which made it so our year-end deficit was \$23,031.17.

That looks and sounds bad, but it's a bit less than the Surplus with which we ended 2020, so **we "broke even" through the 2 years of the pandemic.** That's MUCH better than many other churches and businesses fared. **THANK YOU, JESUS!**

- **•** "OTHER INCOME" in 2020 added up to \$177,772, and it came from the following sources:
- **The Payroll Protection Program** from 2020.
- ★ Walt Disney Corporation matches charitable giving by its Castmembers! A number of Messiah folks work for the Mouse and take advantage of that program. If you are a Castmember and aren't enrolled in that benefit, please contact the Parish Office, and we'll tell you how to DOUBLE your gift to the Messiah family without costing you a penny more!

Our Fund-Raising events: Rummage Sale, Ladies' Night of Beauty, etc.

"OPERATING EXPENSES/OUTFLOWS" are the funds spent doing ministry. In our budget, they are divided into four categories:

- <u>Inreach</u> is Loving One Another and taking care of our own needs in the parish.
- <u>Logistics</u> are those things necessary to do ministry: property maintenance, insurance, office supplies, utilities, publicity, and staff ministry expenses.
- <u>Outreach</u> is Loving our Neighbors who are outside the parish family and Loving God. "Worship" goes here because it is primarily directed outside ourselves toward God and for our visitors, most of whom get their first impression of us on Sundays. Outreach also includes the 12% of our Plate & Pledge Income we send to the Diocese of Central Florida and the 5% we set aside for local outreach and grocery gift cards for people in need.
- <u>Payroll</u> includes taxes, medical insurance, pensions, and salaries for our staff. **THIS was why expenses** grew so much over 2020 as we paid several years' worth of back pension benefits on several employees that we were unaware were eligible for those benefits. That expensive mistake has been corrected, and expenses this year will be significantly less.

"DESIGNATED GIVING" is money given for specific purposes such as altar flowers or the Building Fund. It also includes things that "pay for themselves" or are not part of the Operating Budget such as most youth events, coffee, and Fun & Fellowship events. It "runs through" the operating account without affecting the Operating Budget.

The largest chunk of Designated Giving goes to the **Building Fund**, which also includes **Capital Expenses**, which are major facility repairs or improvements like a roof or an air conditioner.

We've prayed frequently, fervently, and faithfully for the Lord to provide, and HE DID!

Please continue praying for God to provide. If in those prayers, you hear God say, "Give!" please obey.

How the Vestry arrives at an annual Budget (see the next page):

UNLIKE most churches, we don't look at last year's budget and just tweak it for next year.

Our Vestry plans in faith: praying and listening to God and our parishioners to discern what we believe the Messiah wants to do in his family in this next year. We research what that will cost, and THAT becomes the budget. We then pray for God to provide and trust he will.

Even as we trust God, we are frugal with his money: cutting unnecessary expenses in order to compensate for rising expenses we can't control, like insurance, utilities, and maintenance. And if we're in a deficit, and an expense is not absolutely necessary, we don't do that project.

Significant aspects in the Budget for 2022:

Staff got no raises.

- ♦ We set aside \$50,000 to fund half the compensation for an Apprentice Rector, to educate and equip a newly ordained person for 2-3 years and send them out to be a Rector. The other half of their compensation
- comes from a Diocesan grant we received. Tom Rutherford is actively seeking the person God wants us to prepare.

We still owe about \$1 million on the Parish Hall, nursery, library, kitchen, restrooms, and offices and still pay a \$11,996.01 a month mortgage. **Please keep giving to the Building Fund.**
