About the Organ:

A great big THANK YOU to all who have contributed to the Organ Rebuilding Fund thus far! As of January 16, a total of \$89,296 has been received. Of course we would welcome more contributions! The more that is contributed, the more resources will be left in the Gillespie Fund for other, future projects. If you want to know more about the organ restoration, please refer to the letter you received and to the sheet of frequently asked questions. We hope you have been able to attend our Music Director, Noby Ishida's adult education classes on the workings of the pipe organ. They were fascinating! If you haven't already contributed, we hope you will give serious and prayerful consideration to doing so.

There are at least four ways to contribute to the project:

- 1. Write a check payable to Setauket Presbyterian Church and write "Organ Rebuilding Fund" in the memo space.
- 2. Make a donation online at setauketpresbyterian.org
- 3. Contribute part of the Required Minimum Distribution from your IRA if you are 70.5 or older. Funds from the RMD can be sent directly to the church and will not result in the increase in your income (and income tax) that it otherwise would.
- 4. Donate appreciated stock (stock that has gone up in value). Give the stock itself directly to the church, and the church will sell it. You will not have to pay capital gains tax on the increased value, and you will get a charitable deduction for the full value as of the date of your gift.

Many congregations struggle to grow or at least reverse their decline. Worship attendance might be flat and the Sunday school is not brimming. Some congregations are in buildings which are outdated, underutilized or in disrepair. Finances could be strained.

It's easy to get wrapped up in our own concerns. In our common struggles, we can sometimes forget that there are many neighbors in our neighborhood and city who know nothing of our shortcomings but are in need of our care and witness. In fact, it is possible that our renewal is dependent on re-embracing our mission to serve others. We must remember that our "parish" is not comprised of just the people in our building but those who are in our neighborhood, city and region.
