### Release by Lisle Gwynn Garrity | A Sanctified Art |inspired by Deuteronomy 15:1-11 (The Year of Cancelled Debts)


#### **Artist Statement:**

The Israelites wandered the desert for forty years. Forty years was just long enough for them to let go of what they used to know, to doubt their purpose, to question God's presence, to cultivate resilience. But it was not long enough for the sting of slavery to recede from their bones. It was not long enough for them to forget the way greed can corrupt the hearts of the powerful, the way economic disparity can bleed into overt racism, the way empire can be built on the backs of forced laborers. And so, near the end of their wilderness chapter, God guides Moses to help them release the harmful systems of their past to reimagine a new way of doing life together.

These instructions in Deuteronomy become a guide for their new economy. The scheduled practice of releasing debts every seven years was designed to be both preventive and restorative. It prevented the wealth gap from growing beyond repair. It prevented systemic poverty from becoming strategic enslavement. It softened hearts turned cold and loosened fists clenched too tight. This practice of release reminds us that net worth is not synonymous with selfworth. It cuts into greed and bondage wherever it has taken root.

How might we adopt practices of financial release in our current economy? When it comes to money, we are hard-wired to fixate on *deserving*. What did you do to *cause* this debt? What qualifies you to *deserve* a forgiveness loan? How did you *earn* this income?

And yet, in God's story, money—like grace—is released wherever it is needed instead of where it is deserved.

### Hearing and Proclaiming the Word

#### **Prayer for Illumination**

#### Scripture: Deuteronomy 15:1-11 The Year of Canceled Debts

15 Every seventh year you shall grant a remission of debts. <sup>2</sup> And this is the manner of the remission: every creditor shall remit the claim that is held against a neighbor, not exacting it of a neighbor who is a member of the community, because the Lord's remission has been proclaimed. <sup>3</sup> Of a foreigner you may exact it, but you must remit your claim on whatever any member of your community owes you. <sup>4</sup> There will, however, be no one in need among you, because the Lord is sure to bless you in the land that the Lord your God is giving you as a possession to occupy, <sup>5</sup> if only you will obey the Lord your God by diligently observing this entire commandment that I command you today. <sup>6</sup> When the Lord your God has blessed you, as he promised you, you will lend to many nations, but you will not borrow; you will rule over many nations, but they will not rule over you.

<sup>7</sup> If there is among you anyone in need, a member of your community in any of your towns within the land that the Lord your God is giving you, do not be hard-hearted or tight-fisted toward your needy neighbor. <sup>8</sup> You should rather open your hand, willingly lending enough to meet the need, whatever it may be. <sup>9</sup> Be careful that you do not entertain a mean thought, thinking, "The seventh year, the year of remission, is near," and therefore view your needy neighbor with hostility and give nothing; your neighbor might cry to the Lord against you, and you would incur guilt. <sup>10</sup> Give liberally and be ungrudging when you do so, for on this account the Lord your God will bless you in all your work and in all that you undertake. <sup>11</sup> Since there will never cease to be some in need on the earth, I therefore command you, "Open your hand to the poor and needy neighbor in your land."

#### Scripture: Matthew 19:16-22 A Wealthy Man Seeks Eternal Life

<sup>16</sup> Then someone came to him and said, "Teacher, what good deed must I do to have eternal life?" <sup>17</sup> And he said to him, "Why do you ask me about what is good? There is only one who is good. If you wish to enter into life, keep the commandments." <sup>18</sup> He said to him, "Which ones?" And Jesus said, "You shall not murder; You shall not commit adultery; You shall not steal; You shall not bear false witness; <sup>19</sup> Honor your father and mother; also, You shall love your neighbor as yourself." <sup>20</sup> The young man said to him, "I have kept all these; what do I still lack?" <sup>21</sup> Jesus said to him, "If you wish to be perfect, go, sell your possessions, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." <sup>22</sup> When the young man heard this word, he went away grieving, for he had many possessions.

### Finding Release by Lauren Wright Pittman | A Sanctified Art | inspired by Matthew 19:16-22

(A wealthy man seeks eternal life)



#### **Artist Statement:**

As I write this in the midst of a global pandemic, we are collectively grieving countless losses and desperately seeking answers to quell our fears of what's to come. The economy is nosediving and many face grave illness or even death. Some can't see past the fog of new living restrictions and are calling to reopen the economy because they believe it will save us. Others are choosing to stay home, risking economic fallout, to protect lives of the vulnerable.

When afraid, we turn inward. I see fear and loneliness in the rich man. He's focused on an individual path, leading to his personal salvation, while missing the full picture. The man's wealth may cause him comfort, but it does not exist in a vacuum. His wealth affects the lives of others—particularly those at the margins of society.

Jesus offers the rich man spiritual grounding that completely threatens his financial stability, but it's good news just the same. Jesus reveals to the rich man the truth that we are all connected. Jesus chooses to name commandments concerning interpersonal relationships and community (v. 18-19). Jesus offers the rich man freedom from his entanglement with wealth, and gifts him belonging and a way forward

(v. 21). The rich man feels the weight of this truth. To "enter this life" he must recognize his responsibility for his neighbor, because our lives are interwoven.

Instead of grasping to Jesus' lifeline, the rich man turns away because he cannot fathom losing everything. His grief feels palpable in this time of upheaval. I meditated on his grief, layering dusty purples, muted greens, and chalky blacks. I imagine the rich man isn't turning away from Jesus altogether. Perhaps he's taking space to feel his grief, processing all he will lose so he can truly find release.



### Announcements for the Week of November 8-15, 2020




Last Sunday we begin a 4-week stewardship series entitled, *Our Money Story*. So much of our beliefs and behaviors are rooted in stories—narratives that are personal, familial, societal, cultural, and religious. We all have a money story, whether we recognize it or not. Perhaps we are living from a story of fear or shame or guilt. Or a story that our actions won't have an impact. Or a story that we don't have enough. Throughout these 4 weeks, we are invited to tease apart these overlapping narratives, to claim and recreate our stories in light of the stories we find in scripture. Where might God be speaking a new narrative into the limited ones we have told ourselves?

**This week's theme is RELEASE.** As we hear today's scriptures, we will practice releasing shame, anxiety, guilt, greed or anything that keeps us from freedom and wholeness. We release the elements of our money story that prevent us from fulling

living into God's story. In Matthew 19:16-22, we see a man grieved to let go of his wealth. In Deuteronomy 15:1-11, we find the radical social mandate of cancelled debts, a communal release that is practiced for the good of all. Releasing is a spiritual practice that frees us from ourselves and liberates others.

As we explore these themes, we will be aided by poetry, prayers, and artwork created by *A Sanctified Art*. One visual tool we will use during worship is a mandala. Meaning "circle" in Sanskrit, a mandala is a geometric, circular designed used in several religious traditions for mediation and prayer. The imagery within the four rings of this mandala corresponds to the scriptures in our series.

For week two, we add the second ring. The open hands represent the posture Jesus invited the rich man to take by letting go of his possessions and wealth. The hands also symbolize the releasing of debts—a mandate given to the Israelites through Moses in order to build a community in which all could prosper.

<u>The Finance Committee</u> has been carefully monitoring the church's financial status and providing monthly updates as we enter the last quarter of the 2020 budget year and plan for 2021. We give thanks to Chair, Tom Fish, for their work and to the faithful stewards who give even in the midst of uncertain times!

<u>The Session has called a Congregational Meeting for Sunday, November 22, 2020</u>, immediately following worship, for the purpose of presenting a comprehensive financial update, the Proposed 2021, and any recommended changes to the terms of call to the Pastor.

General Fund Financial Update through September. Here is a summary of the Church's financial status through September (the last month for which information is currently available).

Overall, the Church's general fund receipts and expenses to date are tracking appropriately with the budget. However, a decline in offerings in recent months could be of concern should it become a trend. Fortunately, expenses continue to trend under budget.

Through September, the Church's general fund receipts were roughly \$5,200 less than budgeted. An analysis of general fund offerings in September shows \$11,835 received, including one prorated annual pledge. That amount is \$2,540.98 more than the amount of monthly offerings anticipated in the budget.

Expenses for the year through September have been roughly \$11,952 less than budgeted. In addition, while August general fund expenses totaled \$12,323.72, general fund receipts for the month totaled \$12,138.65.27. Thus, monthly receipts were \$389.02 less than expenses. The September payment for the State Farm property was posted early in August; otherwise September receipts would have exceeded expenses by \$3,389.02.

Altogether actual year-to-date receipts continue to exceed year-to-date expenses, currently by \$6,241.75.
