### Scripture: Leviticus 19:9-10; 25:8-12 The Year of Jubilee

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>9</sup> When you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap to the very edges of your field, or gather the gleanings of your harvest. <sup>10</sup> You shall not strip your vineyard bare, or gather the fallen grapes of your vineyard; you shall leave them for the poor and the alien: I am the Lord your God.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>8</sup> You shall count off seven weeks of years, seven times seven years, so that the period of seven weeks of years gives forty-nine years. <sup>9</sup> Then you shall have the trumpet sounded loud; on the tenth day of the seventh month—on the day of atonement—you shall have the trumpet sounded throughout all your land. <sup>10</sup> And you shall hallow the fiftieth year and you shall proclaim liberty throughout the land to all its inhabitants. It shall be a jubilee for you: you shall return, every one of you, to your property and every one of you to your family. <sup>11</sup> That fiftieth year shall be a jubilee for you: you shall not sow, or reap the aftergrowth, or harvest the unpruned vines. <sup>12</sup> For it is a jubilee; it shall be holy to you: you shall eat only what the field itself produces.

<sup>38</sup> As he taught, he said, "Beware of the scribes, who like to walk around in long robes, and to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces, <sup>39</sup> and to have the best seats in the synagogues and places of honor at banquets! <sup>40</sup> They devour widows' houses and for the sake of appearance say long prayers. They will receive the greater condemnation."

<sup>41</sup> He sat down opposite the treasury, and watched the crowd putting money into the treasury. ### **IUBILEE** by Lauren Wright Pittman

A Sanctified Art | inspired by Leviticus 19:9-10; 25:8-12

Artist Statement: In the Year of Jubilee, God offers rest—a break for farmers, relief for those experiencing economic injustice, and Sabbath for the land. This radical rest is counter to the rhythm of our lives; it resists valued ideologies like efficiency and productivity and has broad economic implications. Jubilee has remained a theoretical, hopeful concept tucked away in scripture. This kind of radical slowing down is difficult to imagine, however...so is a global, economy-halting pandemic.

Rest feels unnatural in a pandemic, but it's available to us if we are willing to receive it. Rest slows our vision and illuminates gifts that normally whirl by us. While sheltering in place, I've searched for positivity, and during such great loss, I've found more—more time, space, and color. I found a patch of mint in my yard, and the scent became my soul's balm. Rest offers recovery. The earth is thriving with a break from humanity. Scientists are seeing significant decreases in air pollution and animals are returning to previously uninhabitable waterways.

Rest offers perspective. God does not want us worn ragged, reaping the maximum extent of our harvest. God wants new eyes for us to recognize broken systems so we can enact change that sustains everyone: "You shall leave them for the poor and the alien: I am the Lord your God" (v.10). God is found in the connective tissue of our relationships to our neighbor—particularly those most vulnerable.

Rest reminds us of our interconnectedness. Despite physical distancing, people are rediscovering one another while longing for and celebrating ways to support one another. Rest uncovers the *enoughness* in our lives, and as my dear mentor used to say, "Enough is abundance." What will we glean from this time of rest?




## Announcements for the Week of November 15-22, 2020



**Today we continue our 4-week stewardship series entitled,** *Our Money Story*. So much of our beliefs and behaviors are rooted in stories—narratives that are personal, familial, societal, cultural, and religious. We all have a money story, whether we recognize it or not. Perhaps we are living from a story of fear or shame or guilt. Or a story that our actions won't have an impact. Or a story that we don't have enough. Throughout these 4 weeks, we are invited to tease apart these overlapping narratives, to claim and recreate our stories in light of the stories we find in scripture. Where might God be speaking a new narrative into the limited ones we have told ourselves?

This week's theme is REIMAGINE. Scripture calls us to reimagine our world as God created it to be—not one of scarcity, poverty, and disconnectedness, but a good world of abundance and enough to provide for all. In Mark 12:38-44, we sit down with Jesus and his disciples as he teaches about giving as they watch a poor widow contribute two small copper coins to the temple treasury while many rich people put in much larger sums. What does Jesus say to them and to us about how and why we give, about the value we place on a gift or a giver? In Leviticus 19:9-10; 25:8-12, Moses receives from God instructions for how the Israelites are to live after generations of enslavement by Pharaoh—instructions for leaving some of the crop for the poor and hungry. They also are given instructions for the practice of Jubilee, when, in a fifty-year cycle, debts are forgiven, imbalances are restored, and Sabbath is celebrated. With these instructions, God reimagines a different world for his children. What might he be challenging us to reimagine?

As we explore these themes, we will be aided by poetry, prayers, and artwork created by *A Sanctified Art*. One visual tool we will use during worship is a mandala. Meaning "circle" in Sanskrit, a mandala is a geometric, circular designed used in several



religious traditions for mediation and prayer. The imagery within the four rings of this mandala corresponds to the scriptures in our series.

For week three, we add the **third ring** with images from today's scriptures. The wheat laid along the corners of the square represent the corners of the crops left for the poor and the immigrant to glean. The seeds and wheat chaff represent the bounty that is to be shred during Jubilee, creating a community where the hungry are fed, The seeds/circles may also represent the coins

the widow offers to the treasury. In this ring we are reminded of Jubilee practices to avoid creating systems that impoverish and leave the vulnerable without the resources and support they need to thrive.

<u>The Finance Committee</u> has been carefully monitoring the church's financial status and providing monthly updates as we enter the last quarter of the 2020 budget year and plan for 2021. We give thanks to Chair, Tom Fish, for their work and to the faithful stewards who give even in the midst of uncertain times!

<u>The Session has called a Congregational Meeting for Sunday, November 22, 2020</u>, immediately following worship, for the purpose of presenting a comprehensive financial update, the Proposed 2021, and any recommended changes to the terms of call to the Pastor.

<u>General Fund Financial Update through September</u>. Here is a summary of the Church's financial status through September (the last month for which information is currently available).

Overall, the Church's general fund receipts and expenses to date are tracking appropriately with the budget. However, a decline in offerings in recent months could be of concern should it become a trend. Fortunately, expenses continue to trend under budget.

Through September, the Church's general fund receipts were roughly \$5,200 less than budgeted. An analysis of general fund offerings in September shows \$11,835 received, including one prorated annual pledge. That amount is \$2,540.98 more than the amount of monthly offerings anticipated in the budget.

Expenses for the year through September have been roughly \$11,952 less than budgeted. In addition, while August general fund expenses totaled \$12,323.72, general fund receipts for the month totaled \$12,138.65.27. Thus, monthly receipts were \$389.02 less than expenses. The September payment for the State Farm property was posted early in August; otherwise September receipts would have exceeded expenses by \$3,389.02.

Altogether actual year-to-date receipts continue to exceed year-to-date expenses, currently by \$6,241.75.
