# February 28, 2021 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday in Lent

In Lent, we're reminded that, again and again, suffering and brokenness find us. We doubt again, we lament again, we mess up again. Again and again, the story of Jesus on the cross repeats—every time lives are taken unjustly, every time the powerful choose corruption and violence, every time individuals forget how to love. With exacerbation we exclaim, "Again?! How long, O God?" And yet, in the midst of the motion blur chaos of our lives, God offers a sacred refrain: "I choose you, I love you, I will lead you to repair." Again and again, God breaks the cycle and offers us a new way forward.

This theme provides a clear invitation in a time when much is unclear. Even if worshiping apart, we come to God again and again with our prayers, our dreams, our hopes, and our doubts. Even if from a distance, we will continue to be community to one another—especially when it's hard—by choosing each other over and over again. We will continue to love God with the same persistence God chooses and claims us through Jesus Christ. The sub-theme, A" Lenten Refrain," speaks to the ways God can make music of our lives. "Refrain" also reminds us that Lent is a season of abstaining from certain practices in order to take on new rhythms and habits.

In this season, we need rituals—both old and new—to remember and be transformed. Embodied practice builds muscle memory. We need the days of Lent because this season shapes us into more faithful disciples. This Lent, again and again, we bring all of who we are to God and trust that God will meet us, time and again along the way until "an Easter of unending joy we may attain at last!" (hymn: Lord, Who Throughout These Forty Days)

#### Scripture Mark 8:31-9:8

<sup>31</sup> Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. <sup>32</sup> He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. <sup>33</sup> But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

<sup>34</sup> He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. <sup>35</sup> For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. <sup>36</sup> For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? <sup>37</sup> Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? <sup>38</sup> Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels." **9** <sup>1</sup> And he said to them, "Truly I tell you, there are some standing here who will not taste death until they see that the kingdom of God has come with power."

<sup>2</sup> Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, <sup>3</sup> and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. <sup>4</sup> And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. <sup>5</sup> Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." <sup>6</sup> He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. <sup>7</sup> Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" <sup>8</sup> Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus.

#### Prayers of the People & The Lord's Prayer

About the Prayer Display: This Lent, you are invited to come to God in prayer again and again, adding your prayers to those of our larger community, using an ampersand. Used here, the ampersand represents God's holy "and." When we feel helpless and hopeless, God's holy "and" encourages us to lift up our weary eyes to search for more. In a culture overrun by extremes, either/or thinking, and polarizing ideas, this holy & reminds us that we are always more—that there is always more. We are broken & beautiful. Joy & grief can co-exist. Oppression persists & God is guiding us closer to liberation and wholeness. This Lent, let us practice the power of "and"—especially when "again?!" feels like our never-ending cry of lament. Within the ampersand, our prayers are held together and transformed into beauty.

Add Your Prayers: You are invited to add your prayers to the display. Below are several types of prayer. Consider the type of prayer you need at the moment—or offer a prayer of each kind. You are invited to offer as many prayers as you need throughout this Lenten season. On an ampersand symbol, use the marker to write a word or phrase to represent your prayer to God. All of our prayers will be gathered and added.

Again and again, God hears our prayers. God hears our cries. God knows us and sees us—fully. Thanks be to God!

PRAYERS OF SUPPLICATION are earnest petitions to God for healing, peace, wholeness, or hope.
PRAYERS OF THANKSGIVING express gratitude and joy.
PRAYERS OF LAMENT offer our grief, weariness, and despair to God—openly & honestly.
PRAYERS OF CONFESSION name our part in brokenness and sin.
PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION express our prayers for the needs of others.
PRAYERS OF ADORATION display our deep reverence for all that is holy.



### Transfiguration

I'm not a good listener. In the midst of our national reckoning around structural racism and white supremacy in the U.S., I've found that I've done a terrible job listening to my Black and Brown siblings. I constantly have to resist the urge to explain myself, to be seen as good and antiracist. I try saying all the right things, I do performative acts of allyship, and quite honestly, I need to be quiet and listen. I need to be ready to accept criticism, and instead of trying to prove anything, I need to gain awareness of my internalized biases and learned racist tendencies and do the difficult work of unlearning them in every moment. "Get behind me, Satan" (Mark 8:33).

Here we find Peter stepping in and saying all the right things, rejecting the notion that Christ must suffer and die; but in the end, he's not listening to Jesus. It seems Peter's rejection of this

narrative reflects his fear of the suffering he also might face in following Christ. "Let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me" (Mark 8:34).

Six days later, the disciples are called to listen once again. In this image, I zoomed out to focus on the moment of Transfiguration. Jesus shines like a beacon atop the high mountain while former prophets appear. The

disciples are terrified, but also want to live this moment forever, making the glory-filled rock face their home. At once a cloud descends, obscuring things further, and God's voice echoes down, "This is my Son, the Beloved, listen to him!" (Mark 9:7). It's almost as though Jesus had exhausted all efforts to get the disciples to listen, and God had to spectacularly reiterate the importance of listening. I think it's important to note that following God's words, all the disciples could see was Jesus.

- Recall a time you received a hard truth that challenged your notions of what is real. How did you react? What led you to transformation or change? Did the hard truth become less threatening at some point? If so, what changed in you so that you were more open and willing to receive it?
- Consider a time when you have been rebuked—perhaps for speaking up about a difficult issue or naming a hard truth. How did you handle the criticism? Did you respond to the one who criticized your message? In that situation, did you need to be rebuked, or were you delivering a message that needed to be heard?
- In her artist statement for "Transfiguration," Rev. Lauren Wright Pittman writes, "I think it's important to note that following God's words, all the disciples could see was Jesus."5 Peter and the disciples hear Jesus, but it's not until their reality is transfigured that they truly listen to the voice of God. What practices allow us to cultivate and sustain a posture of listening?
- Where are you being guided to repent—to change direction and follow a new path?
