3rd Sunday in Lent

In Lent, we're reminded that, again and again, suffering and brokenness find us. We doubt again, we lament again, we mess up again. Again and again, the story of Jesus on the cross repeats—every time lives are taken unjustly, every time the powerful choose corruption and violence, every time individuals forget how to love. With exacerbation we exclaim, "Again?! How long, O God?" And yet, in the midst of the motion blur chaos of our lives, God offers a sacred refrain: "I choose you, I love you, I will lead you to repair." Again and again, God breaks the cycle and offers us a new way forward.

This theme provides a clear invitation in a time when much is unclear. Even if worshiping apart, we come to God again and again with our prayers, our dreams, our hopes, and our doubts. Even if from a distance, we will continue to be community to one another—especially when it's hard—by choosing each other over and over again. We will continue to love God with the same persistence God chooses and claims us through Jesus Christ. The sub-theme, A" Lenten Refrain," speaks to the ways God can make music of our lives. "Refrain" also reminds us that Lent is a season of abstaining from certain practices in order to take on new rhythms and habits.

In this season, we need rituals—both old and new—to remember and be transformed. Embodied practice builds muscle memory. We need the days of Lent because this season shapes us into more faithful disciples. This Lent, again and again, we bring all of who we are to God and trust that God will meet us, time and again along the way until "an Easter of unending joy we may attain at last!" (hymn: Lord, Who Throughout These Forty Days)

Preparing for Worship

This week's them is *Again & Again, We are Shown the Way*. According to John, Jesus begins his ministry by showing more than telling. In the temple, Jesus disrupts and overturns the systems of corruption and profiteering taking place, but ultimately points us to the promise of restoration. Paul reminds the Corinthians (and us) that God's wisdom is more expansive than we can imagine. We are shown the way, even if God's way feels foolish, counter-cultural, disruptive or uncomfortable. As we prepare to worship, let us pray:

Again and again—we are invited in.
Again and again—God meets us.
We are here. God is here.
This space is holy ground.

Scripture John 2:13-33

¹³ The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. ¹⁴ In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. ¹⁵ Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. ¹⁶ He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" ¹⁷ His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." ¹⁸ The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" ¹⁹ Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." ²⁰ The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" ²¹ But he was speaking of the temple of his body. ²² After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

Scripture 1 Corinthians 1:19-25

¹⁸ For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. ¹⁹ For it is written,

"I will destroy the wisdom of the wise,

and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

²⁰ Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? ²¹ For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. ²² For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, ²³ but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, ²⁴ but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. ²⁵ For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

Eastern Kentucky Flood Information from the Presbytery of Transylvania:



As many of you are aware, parts of Eastern Kentucky suffered from historic flooding this past week. To give you a sense of the devastation, this picture is of the Presbyterian Church in Booneville.

As the waters recede, damage assessments are starting to take place and the great struggle for life to get back to normal begins. That will take a while. Our Presbytery secured an Initial Grant from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance of \$7500 to begin to support those local recovery efforts. We will be working with local churches to

assess the damage and finds ways to support them as they meet the needs of their communities. We have a work group going to assist the Beattyville Church tomorrow and many of our church folks are filling buckets with cleaning supplies and food to distribute in their own communities. There will be lots to do. As soon as we have some sense of how best we can respond, we will be communicating with you further.


Emergency Food: Thank you to all who have contributed to the Emergency Food.

For Reflection:

The Old Testament reading appointed for the third Sunday of Lent focuses on the gift of God's Law, often called The Ten Commandments, in Exodus 20:1-17 John Calvin (1509-1564) described three uses of the Ten Commandments: First, they show us how to live before God and neighbor, and expose our sins in failing to live as God intends. Second, they instruct our civic or common life, showing us how to live responsibly in the freedom God gives. Third, rather than show us what we must do in order to *receive* God's grace and love, the commandments show us how we should live *because* we are a people who have already received God's grace and love in Jesus Christ.

In 1 Corinthians 1:18-25, Paul describes the way of the cross as "foolish." How would you define this foolishness? God upends many of our value systems and norms, coming to us in unexpected ways, In what ways do we, the like the Corinthians, and perhaps like the disciples in John 2, desire wisdom and proof? Where do we allow the foolishness of the Spirit to show us the way?

In John 2:13-22, Jesus appears angry. Seeing anger in Jesus, others, and even ourselves often makes us very uneasy,. What angers you deep in your bones? Where is God in that anger?

Prayer:

God of justice, you flipped tables in the temple, and then immediately spoke to people who were eager to listen. We seem to only be able to do one or the other—we can be prophetic or pastoral. We can be angry or gentle. We can speak or listen. Help us to hold both at the same time, Teach us your ways, so that may reflect the fullness of your justice and grace and act as your disciples. Amen.

About the Prayer Display:

This Lent, you are invited to come to God in prayer again and again, adding your prayers to those of our larger community, using an ampersand. Used here, the ampersand represents God's holy "and." When we feel helpless and hopeless, God's holy "and" encourages us to lift up our weary eyes to search for more. In a culture overrun by extremes, either/or thinking, and polarizing ideas, this holy & reminds us that we are always more—that there is always more. We are broken & beautiful. Joy & grief can co-exist. Oppression persists & God is guiding us closer to liberation and wholeness. This Lent, let us practice the power of "and"—especially when "again?!" feels like our never-ending cry of lament. Within the ampersand, our prayers are held together and transformed into beauty.

Add Your Prayers: You are invited to add your prayers to the display. Below are several types of prayer. Consider the type of prayer you need at the moment—or offer a prayer of each kind. You are invited to offer as many prayers as you need throughout this Lenten season. On an ampersand symbol, use the marker to write a word or phrase to represent your prayer to God. If you are worshiping with us by Zoom, you may type a prayer into the chat box and it will be added, or you may call the church office or send it to churchoffice@corbinpres.org. All of our prayers will be gathered and added.

PRAYERS OF SUPPLICATION are earnest petitions to God for healing, peace, wholeness, or hope.

PRAYERS OF THANKSGIVING express gratitude and joy.

PRAYERS OF LAMENT offer our grief, weariness, and despair to God—openly & honestly.

PRAYERS OF CONFESSION name our part in brokenness and sin.

PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION express our prayers for the needs of others.

PRAYERS OF ADORATION display our deep reverence for all that is holy.

Again and again, God hears our prayers. God hears our cries. God knows us and sees us—fully. Thanks be to God!
