

First Lesson

 Shout out, do not hold back! Lift up your voice like a trumpet! Announce to my people their rebellion, to the house of Jacob their sins.
 Yet day after day they seek me and delight to know my ways, Isaiah 58:1-12

as if they were a nation that practiced righteousness and did not forsake the ordinance of their God; they ask of me righteous judgements, they delight to draw near to God. 'Why do we fast, but you do not see? Why humble ourselves, but you do not notice?' Look, you serve your own interest on your fast-day, and oppress all your workers. Look, you fast only to quarrel and to fight and to strike with a wicked fist. Such fasting as you do today will not make your voice heard on high. Is such the fast that I choose, a day to humble oneself? Is it to bow down the head like a bulrush, and to lie in sackcloth and ashes? Will you call this a fast, a day acceptable to the Lord? Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice,

to undo the thongs of the yoke,

Is it not to share your bread with the hungry,

and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them,

and not to hide yourself from your own kin? Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly;

the glory of the Lord shall be your rearguard. Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am.


The Rev. Angela Shannon



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About the Rev. Angela Shannon



There are those who think that some people are born "old souls," a reference to someone who manifests wisdom beyond their years early in life. The Rev. Angela Shannon embodied that old soul moniker as a child, and developed it further in her chosen professions, first as a social worker, and later as minister, a true ambassador for

Christ. Preaching was not her first vocation but being the grandchild of a grandmother who brooked no nonsense from anyone, even one who called themselves Pastor, she felt her calling to the ministry early in life.

Pastor Shannon, who considers herself an evangelist above all titles in ministry, graduated from the Lutheran School of Theology in 1996. Her first call was as pastor to Augustana Lutheran Church in Houston, Texas, where in her first year the congregation grew steadily generationally, creating a pascal of activists and ministers who now serve the world. In the twentythree years of serving in the Lutheran Church, Pastor Shannon has served in capacities of mission, outreach, and evangelism, as well as in roles of interim pastor, where she has mastered helping congregations and organization move through conflicts with tools in her arsenal of reconciliation and healing.

Seminary gave her the educational fortitude of being a theologian, however, her devotion to pastoral care came from the work she has done throughout her life. As a social worker, she honed her abilities of discernment in crisis situations, and through her travels, she has witnessed that God is not an American. She often tells people, "Traveling changes our understanding of what it means to be Christian in a multi-religious context. It also teaches us compassion and how to articulate the Hope that leis within us with conviction and authenticity."

More than just taking on the mantel of pastor, Pastor Shannon is a person who mentors those whose calling might seem faint for lack of a trusted sounding board that speaks to them. She is that and more, always surrounding herself with the generations behind her. As she was mentored and nurtured by her elders, she continues to give back to the community by working with its young people. Along with her ministerial duties, she unwaveringly supports women's issues, especially for Black women in the ministry. She understands that ministry for Black women is fraught with landmines that demoralize and disenfranchise some and she navigates through the system to bring clear guidance and direction on how to solve these problems in these conflicting times. She determines that only by addressing the issues clearly and forthrightly, systems cannot and will not be dismantled. Passionate about her work, Pastor Shannon doesn't wear her heart on her sleeve. Instead she presents a stalwart presence that says to others that her ultimate trust is in God, not systems.

She learned to swim just four years ago. To her astonishment, it has become her passion. Ask her about swimming and her eyes sparkle. In the water, she learned new ways to pray and speak with God. "Swimming requires a deeper level of trust than walking on terra firma!" Her latest challenge is learning to swim in open water. She hopes to teach swimming to the water averse in the next few years.

One of her most enduring legacies will be that she gave of time and efforts to strengthen and encourage young Black girls and women to believe in themselves by taking care of themselves. Several years ago, she was introduced to GirlTrek, a national health movement that activates thousands of Black women to be change makers in their lives and community – through walking. Pastor Angie takes walking seriously and credits it for building her capacity to endure and survive the roadblocks and obstacles thrown in her path because it is not just the physical, but the emotional, and spiritual depletion that thwarts our ability to handle the day-to-day conflicts that comes our way.

Pastor Shannon is an oblate of the Order of St. Benedict which has been foundational in helping her to call congregations in deeper community.
