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Grace-Gifted, Faith-Lifted Called to Share, Seek, and Serve Christ



Dear Friends in Christ,

As I was looking at the readings for the first weekend in August, I was struck by the very beginning of the Gospel reading appointed for



that weekend. The Gospel story is a story many of us know quite well. It is the story of the feeding of the 5,000 men, plus women and children. And while this story is one of the more familiar ones, I have to admit that I had forgotten how Matthew's telling of the story begins. Matthew tells us, "Now when Jesus heard [about the beheading of John the Baptist], he withdrew from there in a boat to a deserted place by himself" (Matthew 14:13a).

What struck me about this reading as I read it again is that even Jesus needed time to get away. Having gotten word that John the Baptist had been beheaded, Jesus, in his grief, in his sadness, decided he needed time to be alone. He needed time to get away from the crowds (of course we will find that the crowd ends up following him - but that is a discussion for another time), and perhaps he needed time to simply be - maybe to simply be with God. Jesus needed time to be with is own emotions, to center himself, to prepare and restore himself for the ministry that was yet to come.

Now, I know that it seems strange that I would bring up this need for Jesus to go to a deserted place as a revelation to me in these days when we are so often separated from one another. Many of us have had this feeling that we are off in a deserted place far more than we would like to be in these days. However, for some of us, especially those of us who live with other people in our households, we are finding that we still need time to get away by ourselves. In the midst of the anxiety, fear, grief, unknown, questions and so much more, being around people, even people that we deeply love, all of the time can be too much. Sometimes we need time to get away from others to process our feelings, to just be to be alone, to be by ourselves, maybe to pray or simply be still and know that God is God. I have found that my time to be alone is generally late at night, when the rest of the family is in bed. It is my time to just be with myself, to decompress and let go of everything that they day held, to be alone, to pray, to listen, to seek God's peace. It is a time to get refreshed and renewed for whatever will lie ahead the following day.

As I have talked with others in these days, for some of us getting away means getting away from the news that bombards us and finding a time away from it all. The never-ending news cycle can overwhelm us and cause more anxiety, and so getting away from the noise by turning off the TV, putting down the newspaper, even closing down the social media for a while can help us to clear our heads and find renewal. We may even find that getting away from the media gives us strength to move ahead and continue to be what God calls us to be in this world.

If you are like me, finding time to get away can be tough. Especially for those of us who are caring for others, whether it is our spouse, our children, our parents, or our friends, it can be hard to give ourselves permission to get away, to 2

take time to be by ourselves in a deserted place, to give ourselves permission to be still in the face of all that is going on. We feel like we must always be responsible and taking time away might appear to be neglecting our responsibilities. Yet, even Jesus needed that time away, and if the Savior of the world took that time to be by himself, to be with God, his Father, to prepare himself for the ministry to come in healing the sick and feeding the crowds, perhaps it is a good model for us to follow in our lives.

May we all find time in these crazy days to take the time to get away, to be with God, so that we can find some "normal" in the midst of the abnormal and be refreshed and renewed to do all that it is that God is calling us to do to be God's presence in this world, trusting that God will provide what we need on the way.

The COVID-19 sub-committee is meeting weekly on Sunday at 11am to monitor COVID-19 data and to make sure we are prepared for eventual in-person

gatherings. In looking at the trends on Iowa's coronavirus website (https://coronavirus.iowa.gov/), we see that the hospitals have adequate ICU beds and ventilators, so this criteria is met. However as of 7/18, both Scott and Clinton counties had a steeply increasing trend of new cases for 14 days so we could not move to Phase 1. Outdoor In-Person Gatherings with Restrictions. Here were the statistics as of 7/18:

For Scott county:

- the 14 day average of new cases was 32.9, vs. 24.1 on 7/4
- the total number of positive open cases was at 482, vs. 325 on 7/4
- there was 1 death in July for a total of 11

For Clinton county:

- the 14 day average of new cases was 4.4 vs. 1.6 on 7/4
- the total number of positive open cases was at 50, vs. 36 on 7/4
- there was 1 death in July for a total of 2

Once we see a two week period of new cases for Scott County and Clinton County stabilizing (flat or decreasing), then we meet our criteria for Phase 1. Outdoor In-Person Gatherings with Restrictions. If this happens, we are prepared to start outdoor worship the following weekend, provided we obtain council approval. Once we set a date for outdoor worship, communication will go out via US mail, our website, our Facebook page, and email.

We are hoping to identify volunteers for eventual outdoor worship that are not in the high risk population as defined by the CDC and who have been practicing precautions outlined by the CDC. If you are interested and able to volunteer, please let us know by calling or emailing the church office.

Confirmation Is Coming!





Council Update

The council met using Zoom web conferencing for our July meeting.

Scott Wiley led our monthly discussion of the book *Growing Young, 6 Essential Strategies to Help Young People Discover and Love Your Church* with *Chapter 5: Fuel a Warm Community*. Warm is the New Cool. See the separate article in this Ambassador where we share take aways from this chapter.

The COVID-19 subcommittee provided an update on the increasing trend for coronavirus in our area which prevents us from gatherings, and we reviewed great progress made to prepare for eventual in-person gatherings. That said, I am happy to note that since our council meeting on 7/16 the trend for new cases is now decreasing in Scott County. If the trend for new cases continues to decrease or at least stabilize, we may be able to move into Phase 1: Outdoor Worship and Gatherings (with restrictions). Look for updates in the US mail and through our electronic communications (website, facebook, email, outdoor sign).

On a final note regarding coronavirus, we agreed that we don't want to wait indefinitely to perform sacramental activities that require in-person gatherings,

e.g. confirmation and baptism. The Covid-19 subcommittee will explore new ideas for how to safely perform sacramental activities.

We always love to see our church utilized by our congregation and the community. We discussed a request from a local homeschool group to use our space once a week during the school year, once the building opened again for large in-person gatherings, we agreed to this use of the building.

On July 23, we had a really meaningful review of the past 12 months with Pastor Carrie. We are so thankful for Pastor Carrie and this annual review allows us to support her in her continued call with our congregation. It is a two way dialogue, and also allows council to reflect on the past 12 months and discuss accomplishments and opportunities for the following year. As you can imagine, in the past year there has been a lot of learning, hard work and lament due to Covid-19. Also, there have been many new ideas implemented that will persist into the future, e.g. community events on our lawn and online worship. As a result of our discussion, we agreed that our goals for the next 12 months need to include: safely returning to in-person gatherings, new support teams for pastors and staff, more effective mentoring and development of young people and new leaders, and enthusiasm for our ministries in the name of Jesus.

Pastor Carrie initiated a new series of online conversation using the Spark House program 'Dialogues On: Race'. The group watched a video and discussed the first chapter of the book, *What Does It Mean to Be White? History and the Social Construct of Race*.

Faith Connects now meets on Mondays and Wednesdays at 7pm. All are welcome to join this online conversation and devotional opportunity that is good for the mind and the soul!

Pastor Heather and Pastor Carrie held a Virtual Campfire to engage children in singing camp songs and sharing the spirit of camp and friendship.

Council Book Study: Growing Young, 6 Essential Strategies to Help Young People Discover and Love Your Church

Council Book Study: Growing Young, 6 Essential Strategies to Help Young People Discover and Love Your Church

In June, Scott Wiley did a great job leading the book discussion for Chapter 5. Fuel a Warm Community, Warm Is the new Cool, which is the fourth of six core commitments needed for a church to grow young.

This chapter focused on how when young people talk about their churches, they talk about people and warmth. They want authenticity (being real) and connection and a feeling of 'family' more than flashy worship.

We learned that structure is necessary for growing young, but it's not enough. Churches that grow young sometimes program less to free up more space for relational connections.


Bringing different generations together grows everyone young. We talked about how intergenerational relationships are passed around, not passed down, and that the different generations rely on each other in different ways to support each other, like a family.

Scott shared his church experiences when he was younger. He described how real life is messy, and how we need to related to other people's messiness and help each other through the messiness. This prompted interesting thoughts from others in the group in sharing their own experiences which helped us to relate to the chapter and what young people need now.

It is important to consider how we fuel warmth in our church. How might we better provide the support of a family across generations in our congregation? How might our gathering spaces or sanctuary be updated to be more like a family room?

Shine your light for Jesus!

Serendipity: noun. The occurrence and development of events by chance in a happy or beneficial way. The food pantry ramp was a fortunate stroke of serendipity.

One day pastor Heather was chatting with a person from our community. The visitor was commenting how it would be nice for the Food Pantry be more accessible for those who are physically challenged. Carolyn walked into church about that time and they passed along the idea and called Myron, who is retired civil engineer to see if it might be feasible.

We both volunteer at the pantry and thought it was a great idea, for the Food Pantry clients, delivery of food and to have handicap accessibility to the lower level of the church. Myron drew up a sketch and sent out for bids. It was designed to meet or exceed Americans with Disabilities Act requirements and made wide enough for deliveries to back up to the door.

Ihrig Works, LLC from Long Grove came in with a bid of \$25,200. The biggest challenge was how to fund it. With Covid, many of the normal funding opportunities were not available.. We applied for a grant from the Scott County Regional Authority and were awarded \$10,000 toward the project.

This community we live in is extremely generous. We sent requests asking for donations to a variety of organizations, businesses and people to help us reach our goal. In addition to the SCRA grant, donations were received from First Central State Bank, North Scott Rotary, Eldridge Lions, North Scott Optimist, Aqua-Tech Car Wash, Faith Lutheran Memorial Fund, the Schwein's, the Cota's, the Lenker's, Lu Wiese, the Looney's and the Scheibe's. Sod will be used to help with erosion control and Puls Co has offered to hydro seed the remainder of the area.

This was a perfect project for a retired engineer who had the skills of design and to oversee the construction. Many thanks to the Property Committee for their help and to Ihrig Works for doing a very professional job in a timely manner. The Scheibe's are so thankful to be able to help with this serendipity moment.








North Scott Food Pantry
