Call to Order

Carrie Keppy called meeting to order.

Adoption of Agenda

Carrie Keppy asked for a review of the agenda and any changes; there were none. Carrie Keppy called for a motion to approve the agenda. Tom Bauer motioned to approve the agenda, Kelly Penning seconded the motion, and it was carried.

Minutes of the Previous Meeting, January 27, 2019

Carrie Keppy asked for a review of the previous Annual Congregational Meeting and any corrections; there were none. Carrie Keppy asked for motion to accept minutes of the previous Annual Congregational Meeting. H.O. Nelson motioned to accept the minutes of the previous Annual Congregational Meeting, Melody Sawvell seconded the motion, and the motion was passed.

Greetings from Lutheran Lakeside

Paige McGrath, Lutheran Lakeside Program Director visited our church on this day to share information about Lutheran Lakeside. She shared the Lutheran Lakeside Mission and some of the many things the camp offers. She underscored that it is a place where you belong. She and the children who were present shared a camp song while she played the ukulele. Pastor Carrie presented a check to Paige for \$1,066 for Lutheran Lakeside from the Thanksgiving and Christmas Special Offerings. Pastor Carrie also shared that Sunday School offerings were provided to Lutheran Lakeside for specific items needed at camp.

Presentation of Reports

Pastor's Report

Pastor Carrie shared her view on all of the amazing things that have occurred over the past year. She reflected back on her Call Letter and how she learned that we wanted to be more of a community church. She said it is just awesome how we have grown in our ministry and how we are known in the community for many things that have to do with the ministry of Jesus, e.g. Feed Our Children lunch program, the Homecoming Tailgate party, participation in Confirmation, VBS, and Youth programs.

She shared thanks and said she was humbled by the many notes and gifts of the congregation during Pastor Appreciation month. Pastor Carrie also thanked the congregation for the time, energy, and financial giving over the past year which made our ministries possible.

Pastor Carrie highlighted to the congregation that in the Gospel reading, Jesus says, follow me and I will make you fishers of people. He does the same to us, He calls us for who we are so that we can be the light of Christ. Thank God that Jesus continues to call us in the place at this time.

Financial Report

Scott Wiley expressed thanks to everyone for their financial giving. Because of the generosity of the congregation, we have no debt.

In 2019, We realized 96.8% (\$344,600) Of the planned \$356,065 operating revenue for 2019. (Please note, the planned operating revenue was not included in the annual report.) Our expenses were 88.5% (\$350,712) of the \$396,184 budgeted expenses. Our balance sheet shows our total of all accounts is at \$231,928.

The 2020 operating budget is \$404,274 with increases in Mission, Staffing, Worship and Music, Education/Youth/Family (due to stronger participation), Stewardship, and Administration. There is a decrease in Property due to lower than budgeted energy costs in 2019. For several years prior to 2019, the Mid American meter tracked incorrectly resulting costs that were lower than our actual use. Also, Programmable thermostats were implemented in 2019 which also contributed to lower energy costs.

Carrie Keppy pointed out the new Financial Giving chart in the Annual Report. The Church Council wanted to share the Financial Giving chart for informational purposes and for individual reflection. Carrie Keppy thanked everyone for their time and talents that were contributed as well in 2019, which is immeasurable.

President report

Carrie expressed her appreciation for the opportunity to serve the congregation over the past six years on Council, and especially for the amazing ministries that are occurring in this church.

Carrie Keppy commended the remaining reports to the congregation to read.

Carrie Keppy asked for a motion to approve the reports. Carol Marten moved to approve the reports, Melody Sawvell seconded the motion, the motion carried.

Old Business

Ratification of the revised Constitution and Bylaws.

Carrie Keppy stated that two weeks ago, at a Special Congregational Meeting, the revised Congregational Constitution and Bylaws were approved and that we are now looking for ratification.

Carrie Keppy called for any discussion or questions; there were none.

Carrie Keppy called for a vote to ratify the revised Constitution and Bylaws. H.O. Nelson motioned to ratify the revised Constitution and Bylaws, Joni Schneider seconded the motion, and the motion was passed.

New Business

Election of council members

Carrie Keppy presented the following Council nominees: Beth Ann Anderson, Matt Peck, Mike Garner, Linda Golinghorst, Melody Sawvell, Austin Lee, Erin Peck, and Grace Kirst, and Scott Wiley.

Carrie Keppy called for other nominations, there were none.

Carrie Keppy called for a motion to close nominations for Council. Scott Wiley motioned to close the nominations for Council. Tom Bauer seconded the motion, the motion was carried.

Scott Rochau asked if we could take a single vote for the slate of nominees, instead of using written ballots listing each nominee. Carrie agreed it would be simpler, but informed the congregation that our Constitution requires a written ballot.

Carrie Keppy called for votes by written ballots from voting members of the congregation who were present. Ballots were collected and counted. The nominees were elected by a majority vote.

On behalf of everyone, Pastor Carrie thanked Carrie Keppy for her years of service on Council, and especially for her service as President in the past year. She lead many things, including the revision of the Constitution and Bylaws. The Congregation gave a round of applause to show appreciation for Carrie Keppy's service on Council.

Election of Endowment Committee Member

Carrie Keppy presented Scott Rochau as nominee for the Endowment Committee.

Carrie Keppy called for other nominations; there were none.

Carrie Keppy called for a motion to close nominations for the Endowment Committee. Brea Harms motioned to close the nominations for the Endowment Committee, Jared Penning seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

Carrie Keppy called for a vote to elect Scott Rochau to the Endowment Committee. Scott was elected by majority vote.

Election of Nominating Committee Members

Carrie Keppy present the following list as nominees for the Nominating Committee: Donna Gruenhagen, Tom Carlson, Tim Broberg, and Amy Powell.

Carrie stated per the revised Constitution and Bylaws, there is still one open position to fill. Carrie Keppy called for any other nominations; Tom Bauer was nominated.

Carrie Keppy called for a motion to close nominations. H.0. Nelson motioned to close the nominations, Joni King seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

Carried Keppy called for a vote to elect Donna Gruenhagen, Tom Carlson, Tim Broberg, Amy Powell, and Tom Bauer to the Nominating Committee. Donna Gruenhagen, Tom Carlson, Tim Broberg, Amy Powell, and Tom Bauer were elected by majority vote.

Election of Synod Assembly Voting Officers

Carrie Keppy presented Diane Krebs and Austin Lee as nominees for the 2020 SEIA Synod Assembly. She noted that Kelly Penning was listed in the Annual Report as nominee, but Kelly had to withdraw due to personal commitments.

Carrie Keppy called for any other nominations, there were none.

Carrie Keppy called for a motion to close nominations. Scott Wiley motioned to close the nominations, Joni Schneider seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

Carrie Keppy called for a vote to elect Diane Krebs and Austin Lee to the Synod Assembly. Diane Krebs and Austin Lee were elected by majority vote.

Other

No other topics were discussed.

Adoption of the 2020 Budget

Carrie Keppy called for any questions or adjustments; there were none.

Carrie Keppy called for a motion to approve the 2020 Budget. Joni Schneider motioned to approve the 2020 budget, Carol Judge second the motion, and the motion was passed.

Adjournment

Carrie Keppy called for a motion to adjourn the meeting. Scott La Plante motioned to adjourn the meeting, Tom Bauer seconded the motion, and the motion was passed.

Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church Special Congregational Meeting Approval of the Revised Constitution and Bylaws Sunday, January 12, 2020 10:30 a.m. Meeting Minutes

Carrie Keppy presided and called the meeting to order.

Carrie explained that our Congregational Constitution and Bylaws are being revised to a) include updates from the ELCA Synod Model Constitution since our last revision in 2007 and b) combine three separate documents (Congregational Constitution, Bylaws, and Endowment Committee Bylaws) into a single Congregational Constitution and Bylaws document to follow the Synod Model guidelines.

A summary of the changes, the revised Constitution and Bylaws, and a marked up version of the prior Constitution with revisions were provided to the Congregation previously and at this meeting. An informational meeting regarding the revisions had taken place previously as well.

Carrie briefly overviewed some of the changes, e.g. the quorum needed for a congregational meeting changed from 35 to 40, and the council will include at least 1 young adult and 1 youth member, and asked for further discussion or questions. There was no further discussion or questions.

Carrie stated that the Church Council approval of the revised Congregational Constitution and Bylaws, which had already taken place, serves as the first motion to approve.

Carrie called for a second motion to approve the revised Congregational Constitution and Bylaws from the voting members present at the Special Congregational Meeting.

Kevin Lee seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

Carrie called for a motion to adjourn the Special Congregational Meeting.

H.O. Nelson motioned to adjourn the meeting, Mike Tomlinson seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

The Special Congregational Meeting was Adjourned.

The 2020 Annual Report of the Senior Pastor Pastor Carrie L. Lewis La Plante

What has come into being in [Christ] was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. (John 1:3b-5)

Dear Friends in Christ,

These words from the first chapter of the Gospel of John have really spoken to me in recent days. I think that we can all probably agree that 2020 was not what we expected it to be. When I look back at the reports that were written a year ago, they carried so much hope for what 2020 would bring. We celebrated the vision that we had already cast for the year, and we were looking forward to all of the things we could not yet quite imagine.





We never would have imagined what would actually come in 2020...a global pandemic, protests and uprisings surrounding the killing of several black brothers and sisters around the country, a divisive election season and its aftermath, sickness, death, separation, worshiping apart, loss of all kinds. For many, most, maybe all of us, this past year has carried with it a heavy darkness that has weighed on us. We have sought light and hope, promise and peace to get us through the days that seem to be too much. Which is why these verses have been so pivotal for me in these last days as I, along with all of you have tried

to make sense of it all. Where is the light shining these days?

What John reminds us is that Jesus brought life, new life, into this sometimes very dark world, and that life is light that shines through us into this world. Even when things are feeling heavy, when the darkest days come, there is still that light of Jesus, that light given to each one of us in our baptisms, that continues to shine. There is no darkness that can overcome that light of Christ that shines around us, in us, and through us, though some days it seems very dim and other days it shines bright as the sun.



At the beginning of 2020, the Congregation Council chose as the theme for this year, "Let your light shine for Jesus," because we believed that promise in our baptism that we have the light of Christ to shine, and we take seriously the invitation that comes in baptism, "Let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give Glory to your Father in heaven: (Matthew 5:16). My friends, in this past year, we have held to that theme and shown that light into the world, albeit in ways very different than how we had planned, but in ways that were significant indeed. Many of these activities you can see in the pictures in this report.

Throughout this past year, we have learned about flexibility and have sought to continue to create community and support for our congregation and the community around us. We started the year quite normally with our Sunday School and

Congregational breakfasts, the high school youth prepared sub sandwiches and snack mix to help us celebrate the Super Bowl. We did Souper Bowl of Caring and Cheeseburger in Paradise. We held our Confirmation Conversations, Youth Group gatherings and Adult Bible

Study. We were shining out light in ways that we knew, in the ways that we ex-

pected.

But when things quickly changed at the beginning of March, we had to quickly learn new ways of being together, find new ways of connecting, figure out how to shine our light into a world we still did not fully comprehend, and we did that as we worked together.

We met the darkness of not being able to be in worship in the building together by shining our light with an online format, first using phones and later moving to our new camera system, and by creating and mailing athome worship materials for those who could not join us online.

When we were able to worship together again, we had a





worship, and has continued to worship with us online. For Christmas, we had the joy of 14 families helping us to share the Christmas story, found ways to incorporate special music, and even worshiped outdoor to share the story of Christ's birth together and with the neighborhood. A light shines in the darkness.



We met the darkness of not being able to meet for Sunday School and Confirmation and High School Youth Group by shining our light in new ways. Pastor Heather and I started creating goofy Sunday School introduction videos and we transitioned this fall to Sunday School in a Box to bring God's love into the home. For Confirmation, we finished the spring semester on Zoom, we celebrated the Affirmation of Baptism with our Confirmands over three services, and we did some hybrid Confirmation this fall with those who could not gather in person, either outside or indoors, joining us on Zoom. For High


School Youth Group, we have found ways to meet on Zoom, gather outdoors, even in 25 degree weather, and when possible, gather indoors. A light shines in the darkness.


We met the darkness of the economic impact of pandemic and natural disaster came by shining light for our neighbors to help them through this time. We wrote and won a Daily Bread Grant from ELCA World Hunger to provide \$1000 to North Scott Cares to help provide food and necessity items to those who needed them through their Porch Pals project. After the derecho in August, we collected a van full of food to take to our siblings in Christ at Hope Lutheran Church in Cedar Rapids to provide for their lunch program for their neighbors who were without electricity and food. We were also able, through your generous giving, to provide for all of the mission outreach that we had scheduled in our budget for 2020 to continue to serve our neighbors through the North Scott Clergy Fund, to support Lutheran Lakeside Camp, to support our chaplain at University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics, to support the Behnke family and our Compassion International children, to support seminary students at Wartburg Theological Seminary and the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, and to support the Southeastern Iowa Synod. A light shines in the darkness.



We met the darkness of racial unrest and the isolation that we have all felt by shining our light through gathering and reaching out in new and different ways. A small group gathered on Zoom in the fall to discuss Dialogues on Race where we found a safe space to learn and discuss our own discomfort with the racial tension in this country. We have had Faith Connects gathering on Monday evenings as a place to touch base with others and to share a devotion and prayer. Beer Bible Study has met


on Zoom and in person to continue to build relationships and study God's word together. Our Faith Family heads have made calls to their families to check in and pass on concerns to the pastors for us to follow up on. 2020 Christian Education Annual Report Michelle Rasmussen

As it was a year of extreme challenges and transitions, I am extremely thankful to Pastors Carrie and Heather to help continue to drive Christian education at Faith Lutheran. In a similar fashion to many schools and places of employment, difficult decisions were made with the onset of the pandemic. However, the love of God and Jesus prevailed, which allowed Sunday School to pivot to a home-led model.

Some of the highlights from this past year include:

- Welcomed Paige McGrath, Program Director of Lutheran Lakeside to lead Sunday School in January.
- In February, decorated brown paper bags for use for Feed Our Children.
- In March, quickly pivoted with lead support from Pastors to distribute electronic resources, such as Faith Formations and Sparkhouse. Offers were made to print materials at church for distribution to families upon request. Pentecost flames and other craft opportunities were provided for families to complete and send back to church for participation. Artwork was displayed facing LeClaire road for passersby to view.
- In April, Pastor Heather and Carrie began creating and distributing Sunday school lessons via video posted on YouTube.
- This summer, due to the ongoing pandemic, VBS was cancelled. Thank you to Amy Powell for her support and planning for 2020. VBS curriculum was distributed and virtual campfires were held via Zoom to allow families and children a time to connect.
- In September, Sunday School kicked off again virtually with supplemental materials happening through "Sunday School In A Box". Families could sign up to receive a box and have it delivered to their home. The boxes were beautifully crafted, with all necessary supplies, equipment, and instruction to simulate an at-home Christian education experience.

Thank you to all the families who joined us in the journey of Christian education in a way that no one has experienced before. Thank you to the families for upholding the spirit of Christian education even when we could not gather in person. Thank you to the families who now can call themselves "Sunday School teachers"—we appreciate your willingness to teach and share the love of Jesus within your home with our youngest generations.

Thank you to the support of the Faith Lutheran church, parents, and leadership during my time on council. It has been an honor to serve and support this mission. I wish my successor the best of luck in all that comes in the near future.

The challenges of 2020 brought unexpected opportunities to shine our light for Jesus for the Evangelism Committee, with new and exciting changes that will be lasting for years to come within the church.

The beginning of 2020 began normally for committee members, reaching out to members and the community via letters, cards, and other correspondence for the community. On April 9th, members of Evangelism and Property committees could be seen out in the front of the church watching the new electronic sign being installed in front of the church. During the rest of the year, council members and staff familiar with the workings of the sign displayed messages of hope throughout the rest of 2020.

The biggest unexpected opportunity for the evangelism committee and the church in general was the expansion of the church's electronic footprint. As the church looked for new ways to worship, social media and streaming services became more important for connection to God's Word. Initially, church services were recorded via phone and posted online. This ended up being a great short-term solution as the church obtained a different setup. The new and current streaming process uses a video teleconferencing camera with audio through the church's indoor and outdoor audio setups. This has been used for the last half of the year in recording and live-streaming church services to our members. These services can be found on the Faith Lutheran Facebook account and YouTube accounts. The committee appreciates any feedback on the quality of the churches live streaming services and has continued to improve the quality based upon this feedback.

Although we as individuals and collectively as a church have made a lot of temporary changes in the past year, we hope to build on the opportunities presented to our committee in the upcoming year.

North Scott Community Feed Our Children Ministry 2020

Feed Our Children Ministry was organized by Faith Lutheran Church in June 2017 to provide a free lunch opportunity to our children in the North Scott community during the summer break. During a typical summer, almost 25% of children in our neighborhoods are underserved through the loss of the weekday free and reduced lunch program. Over the last 3 summers, we have served more than 8,750 lunches in our community through our twice a week ministry.

Due to the current pandemic, months-long shut down and strict food handling guidelines, Feed Our Children was not able to safely distribute sack lunches during the summer of 2020. However, the North Scott Community School District has been serving over 1,100 children 12 meals a week each (6 breakfasts and 6 lunches) since the school shut down. The expense of these meals was reimbursed by the Federal Government under emergency Covid-19 funding, and continued until the beginning of the school year.

As we prepare for our 2021 season, please pray for this ministry – for those in need, as well as those who prepare and serve. Please share the good news of this ministry in and around your neighborhood. Please keep your eyes and ears open for opportunities to reach children. If you hear of children in a neighborhood that could benefit from this ministry let us know!

Property Team

However, the property team would like to assure you that we were working all year to maintain the building we all love, and to make it as safe and accessible as possible when we did return indoors briefly in the fall, and for when we return again in 2021.

First I would like to celebrate the exciting changes that have been made around the building. First was the beautiful changes to the outdoor chapel. Generous donations from our member's time, treasure, and talent provided a new deck, beautiful stone work, and landscaping around the chapel make it such a nice place to worship. Artwork was added to the front and top of the alter. I encourage you to walk over and look at it this spring once the alter is out of storage to protect its new look.

The second big change was the addition of an access ramp to the food pantry door on the north side of our building. This ramp ends the days of hauling all of the food up and down a set of steps and makes the food pantry, and our lower level, accessible to all for the first time. Thanks to all who donated their time, talents, and treasure to this project.

The large oak tree at the north end of the sidewalk was found to have a large rotten area about 15 feet up the trunk, and was taken down to prevent damage to persons or property. This loss was easier to take as I was approached by Barb Elmegreen's family about planting a tree in her honor on the church grounds. The symbol of renewal resonated with me, and I hope with others as well.

The main focus for much of the year has been on ways to reduce the COVID 19 risk to our congregation, employees, and volunteers as the work of the Church is carried out in or around our building. Words like: social distancing, disinfecting, and contact tracing all became part of our world last year. The property team worked to apply these realities to our worship, education, and community efforts. Marking six foot distances inside and out, purchasing the same kind of disinfectant sprayers as the airline industry uses, and facilitating the needs created by video recording/live-streaming worship services were some of the new challenges that were addressed. The property team also worked with the North Scott Food Pantry so they could use some of our unused space for their continuing programs.

Summary of this year's events and activities:

- Souper Bowl Event- 126 cans of soup were collected and donated to the North Scott Food Pantry. Thanks to the sports fans for their enthusiastic response to the challenge!
- Churches United Meals- We served a meal in January, but after that meals were discontinued during 2020 due to the pandemic. We had been scheduled to serve meals for January, July and November and hope to continue as soon as they begin serving again.

ENDOWMENT COMMITTEE

The Endowment fund ended 2020 with a December fund balance of \$53,351.87 This fund was started in 1999 and accumulated funds, without distribution, until it reached \$50,000. Since the account has now reached the \$50,000 threshold, income can be expended in accordance with the following:

Minimum of 20 percent for outreach into the community and synod, including, but not limited to grants to, ELCA seminaries, colleges or students attending such schools, social service agencies, institutions and agencies to which this congregation relates, and to special programs designed for those persons in our parish area who are in spiritual and/or economic need.

Minimum of 20 percent for missions of Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in this continent and worldwide, including, but not limited to, grants to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America for new congregational development in North America, professional leadership, educational ministries, global mission, ecumenism, evangelism, social ministries and capital financing.

Minimum of 20 percent for capital improvements, debt reduction or a building program of Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church.

Up to 40 percent for any or all of the above designated areas in any proportion as determined by the committee are consistent with the fund purpose of enhancing the mission outreach of Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church.

The amount of funds that were distributed at the beginning of 2020 was \$1,070 with funds going to the following:

- \$355 for preparation of plans for the sanctuary update.
- \$355 to ELCA Disaster Response.
- \$120 to the North Scott High School Food Pantry.
- \$120 to Lutheran Lakeside.
- \$120 to the University of Iowa Chaplaincy Outreach.

The interest amount from 2020 available for 2021 distribution is about \$1,118. As the principal of this fund grows, obviously more income would be available for the above uses. If you have any questions on this fund, please contact Pastor Carrie or Myron Scheibe

North Scott Food Pantry

The North Scott Food Pantry, located in the basement of Faith Lutheran Church, is open to assist families in need on Tuesday evenings, 5:30 - 7:00 PM and Friday mornings 9:30 - 11:00 AM.

Highlights for 2020 include:

- Carolyn and Myron Scheibe pursued replacing the steep outside stairs with a handicap accessible ramp. They were able to find funding, even being awarded a grant, and worked directly with the contractor to get the project done. We are thankful for all the work Carolyn and Myron did and grateful to Faith Lutheran for allowing us to put in the ramp. Now the carts of food can go right out the door to the parking lot without navigating any stairs. Also it's great to be able to back right up to the door to unload large orders.
- The Pantry added a voicemail box (563-285-8444). It gives people a way to leave us a message and for the pantry to give information such as hours we are open, how to donate food and/or send a monetary donation.
- Due to the pandemic, client choice distribution was discontinued in April. Since then, the clients have received a prepack allotment of food. Also, the pantry was not required to register clients so some of the normal statistics such as how many families served are not available. A total of 717 visits were logged in 2020 compared to 800 in 2019. The pantry received over 41,000 pounds of food down from 63,000 pounds in 2019.
- River Bend Food Bank distributed the USDA's Farm to Family boxes. This government program offered fresh produce and dairy items at no cost to the pantry. Over 50 of these boxes were given out at our pantry.
- As North Scott Schools closed for the 2019-2020 school year, the pantry provided extra food for families with school age children. Even with the school providing lunches, the extra items were much appreciated.
- The North Scott community continues its strong support of our mission. Most of the annual food drives were cancelled but the community continued to donate food and money. At times it was very difficult to purchase certain food items but the clients always received a generous supply of food. North Scott Foods' customers purchased 68 bags of food costing \$25 each. St. Ann's Knights of Columbus were able to hold their annual golf open raising \$13,000. The Harkin Trust gave \$10,000.
- Clients received additional food the month prior to Thanksgiving. 73 families received a bag of shelf stable food, 2 turkey roasts and coupons for eggs, milk and \$5 produce.
- Christmas food boxes and angel tree gifts were given out December 18 & 19th. The process was adjusted with a small group of volunteers packing the food boxes in early December and then the perishable food was added when distributed. 100 food boxes were given out. Christmas presents provided by St. Ann's and the Scott County Library's angel trees were distributed to about 150 children. Kay Picolet along with her husband, Ron, and daughter, Shannon, administered the gift distribution.

We have wonderful volunteers that staff the pantry, assemble holiday food baskets, pick up and deliver items, stock shelves and put in many hours working on projects. Many volunteers use their gifts to make sure the food pantry functions efficiently. Friday hours are staffed by local churches in a 7 week rotation. Faith is scheduled for January 29 and March 19. If you would like to help, please contact Deanna Nielsen (285-6194). If you are interested in helping on the Tuesday evenings, contact Jody Boland at 285-6804. Contact Deanna about other volunteer opportunities.

In the early verses of Ephesians 4, the apostle Paul writes to the Christians in Ephesus, a city on the Aegean Sea at the mouth of a river and at the intersection of three trading routes. The letter was written about ten years after the church had started. During the early years of this congregation, Jews and Gentiles from several ethnicities and nationalities had come together to form "one body." Paul was aware that they had done well and commended them for their faith and love.

The word "one" appears more than seven times in the first four verses. This reflects the importance Paul gave to being called into the "unity of Christ." He wanted to note that, although many of the church members came from far off, there is "one Lord, one faith, one baptism." This oneness reflects God's gift of reconciliation in Christ.

A second emphasis from Paul was that, as believers, they were to "bear with one another in love." This would require humility, gentleness and patience as each of them practiced their faith. It would require tolerance to "maintain unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."

A third emphasis was that each person had been given gifts by God and that these gifts were given to increase the whole. Because the Ephesian church was a young congregation and its members were just beginning in their faith journey, their understandings were often tossed to and fro. But as they grew in faith, each person contributed to building up the body of Christ.

The fourth and final emphasis was that by "speaking the truth in love," each person must grow into Christ. This means taking time to learn about one another and their gifts. Knowing these gifts, we can do God's work both within and beyond the faith community. When there are decisions to make or relationships to reconcile, we know to begin with prayer and reflection, always desiring to speak the truth in love — not for our own benefit but for God's glory, that we might become more complete.

As our members and friends gather today, whether face-to-face or online, we are reminded of our calling into "unity in Christ." We come from many places and work in many contexts, and yet we recognize "one Lord, one faith, one baptism."

Whether new to a worshiping community or further along the journey, we realize that humility, gentleness and patience are required both in the good times and especially in times of uncertainty and struggle. God wants us to be more complete through our work. Christ provides the way. The Holy Spirit is with us for guidance and courage. Each of us has been given the gifts to be complete, and through our faithfulness we will grow stronger and work together as one body.

LET US PRAY: LORD, LET THE WORDS OF THE APOSTLE PAUL DWELL IN US DEEPLY. MAY WE EMBRACE THE RECONCILING POWER OF ONENESS WITH CHRIST. MAY THIS ONENESS GUIDE OUR CONGREGATION AS WE LIVE INTO THE NEW REALITIES OF THESE TIMES. AS WE MEET NEW PARTNERS IN MINISTRY, MAY WE TAKE TIME TO GET TO KNOW THEM WITH PATIENCE, HUMILITY AND LOVE. HELP US TO SEE HOW SHARING OUR GIFTS WILL MAKE YOUR WORK EASIER AND MORE FULFILLING WHILE BRINGING ALL OF US CLOSER TO CHRIST. MAY THE BLESSINGS YOU GIVE EACH DAY STRENGTHEN US TO A LIVING, DARING CONFIDENCE IN YOUR GRACE. AMEN.
