

Grace-Gifted, Faith-Lifted Called to Share, Seek, and Serve Christ Dear Friends in Christ,

We have entered a new church year and a new season in the church year. We have returned to the season of Advent with its deep blue tones, the color of hope and promise in anticipation of everything new that is to come. We have the sanctuary decorated with the deep blue paraments and the advent wreath that helps us to count down the four weeks until Christmas.



Each week throughout the season there will be more decoration added to the worship space to help us to see that our celebration of the birth of our Savior in a manger in Bethlehem is coming closer. It is a time in the church year that brings memories of years gone by and hope and promise of all that is yet to come.

But Advent is not only a time to prepare for the coming of Jesus as a baby in Bethlehem, but also a reminder to all of us who follow Jesus to be prepared for that day when Jesus will come again. Just as we ended last year with many of these visions of the signs that Christ will come again, we began this Advent season in much the same way.

In the twenty-first chapter of Luke's Gospel, which was the Gospel reading for the first Sunday in Advent, Jesus, just days before his crucifixion, warns his disciples about the signs that will come in the sun and the moon and the stars and the waves as heaven and earth will shake just before the coming of the Son of Man. Jesus tells the disciples that there will be many who will "faint with fear and foreboding." However, Jesus tells his disciples that they need not fear. Instead, Jesus tells them that when these things happen they should, "stand up and raise [their] heads, for [their] redemption is drawing near." Jesus promises the disciples then and now that "[h]eaven and earth will pass away, but [Jesus'] words will never pass away." Jesus is telling the disciples that all that he has taught and promised throughout his life is trustworthy and true. All of what they know about who Jesus is and the salvation that Jesus brings can be relied upon in all circumstances. They do not need to fear when the world as they know it shakes and crumbles because Jesus will always be there for them.

We, as Jesus' disciples today, also live in this promise and hope that, even when the world around us seems to be shaking, we can stand in God's promises, in these words of Jesus, to find hope and promise with which we can face the world. In this Advent season, I want to invite you into a spiritual practice to help you stand up and raise your head in the promises of Jesus, the Word made flesh. This practice is known as the

Examen, and I invite you to do it each evening as you end the day. It can be done individually or together as a family as a way to stop, give thanks for God's promises and look forward to the future.

To start the Examen, find a quiet place in your house where you can focus on God and the review of your day. You may light a candle as a representation of the light of Christ being present with you. If you have an Advent wreath, you could light the number of candles for the week each night. Once the candle is lit, and you are comfortable, follow these five steps:

- 1. Become aware of God's presence. Take a moment to focus on the candle or close your eyes to help you center. Take a deep breath in to breathe in the Holy Spirit, and then exhale all of the burdens that you are carrying. Do this a few times, and you will be amazed at how the always present God can be experienced in the moment.
- 2. Review the day with gratitude. Go back through your day. What went well in your day? Where were opportunities that were missed? Who did you meet through the day? Then, take a moment to give thanks for all that happened, even for the hard things and fears you faced.
- 3. Pay attention to your emotions. How do you feel about the day? Where were the places you felt joy, fear, sadness, hope, promise? Where are your emotions leading you?
- 4. Choose at least one thing that happened in the day and pray **about it.** Give thanks for the good. Ask for help with the things that were tough. Commend to God those in need of God's care. Pray to stand tall in the midst of fears.
- 5. Look toward tomorrow. Having connected with God as you have reviewed the day, how does that inform how you will walk into the world tomorrow? What are the things you look forward to? What are the acts of love and compassion that can guide your next day?

When you have finished these five steps, I encourage you to blow out the candle(s), and to go to bed, resting securely in Jesus' care and promises for you, prepared to face the next day with hope and promise.

My prayer for all of us this Advent season is that we can take some time in God's presence, connecting to the promises of Jesus, God's Word made flesh. I pray that we might be filled with hope for the new ways God is calling us into this new year, even as we stand in confidence against any challenges we might face. Come, Lord Jesus, come.

We are grateful.

We are thankful for the financial stewardship of our congregation, and for a generous donation to our Endowment Fund from an anonymous donor.

We are grateful for our Nominating Committee who are working to find members who feel called to serve in leadership roles within our congregation, which is particularly difficult this year. We are also grateful for the people who will grow in their discipleship by accepting nominations or team member roles next year.

We are blessed to have our *People of Praise* Senior Choir sharing their time and talents again at worship. We also would like to recognize two new members to the choir: Mary Moore and Lucas Golinghorst.

Council Business.

Communications/Sharing: Pastor Heather shared in her Faith Story how we don't always know where God is taking us, and it may be different than what we plan for. We continue to receive thanks for the work of the congregation and shared a thank you note to council for their hard work and for their care of congregation at this time.

Updates: We reviewed the status of the Nominating Committee work. We still need to fill two council positions (Service in the World, Youth) and two Synod Assembly Voting Delegate positions. We are working with our Pastors to address stress and overload by working on a sabbatical plan and by reviewing a brief time study to help prioritize/ offload work. Jim Schneider & Ida Weibel are working to define a study plan for next year's Adult Education program.

Actions: We reviewed the current proposed budget, and made some changes to reduce the operating budget where it made sense, or to use memorial funds instead for one time items. We developed our agenda for the Annual Congregational Meeting on Jan 30. We began to collect ideas to appoint a new Audit Committee member for next year.

Approvals: We approved additional use of our basement and parking lot to the North Scott Food Pantry for their Food Basket and Angel Tree Gifts program. The COVID-19 Subcommittee shared that the community spread has decreased since September, but it is still in the substantial/ high category of risk according to the CDC. The subcommittee moved to test a change to the Saturday 5pm worship by lifting the face covering requirement, but still asking everyone to take personal responsibility for




Jesus birth. Children will be practicing Christmas carols during Sunday School December 5. We hope you come make a joyful noise with us.

This past month, Confirmation Conversations have been studying the Apostles' Creed. This was broken into three separate weeks in order to study the Father, Son and Holy Spirit in depth. Martin Luther devoted much of his Small Catechism to

the Apostles' Creed because he felt it was so important to study these old testaments of faith.

The first week, we studied about God the Father and Creator. God makes everything, and continues to make everything in our lives. He has an intimate and loving relationship with all He has created.

The following week, we studied God's Son, Jesus. Oddly, the Apostles' Creed is a summary of Jesus' birth, death, resurrection and ascension. It does not go into detail of what went on in His life. It does, however tell us what we need to know, why Jesus matters to us, that He died to save us from Sin and brings us the grace of God.

The third week, we learned that the Holy Spirit works through us and in us to bring us to Christ. God sent the Holy Spirit to walk with us throughout life. The Holy Spirit moves us to do good works, in service to God and others.

On October 27, the Confirmation Youth traveled to St. Paul Lutheran Church in Davenport. There we joined other Confirmation Youth from churches in the Quad Cities to participate in the annual IGNITE event. Held outdoors on a gorgeous evening, there was a lot of singing, games, fellowship with other churches, and communion at the end of the evening. The kids had a great time!

The High School Youth continue to meet at 7:00. Numbers vary, but we are still seeing 9-14 kids each evening. 
With this change, we hope that more of our members will gather for worship, while still showing care and love for those who are vulnerable.
