FROM THE PASTOR

"We love because he first loved us." 1 John 4:19 (NRSV)

Whenever I have some critical reflection to do, I head for the mountains. A few years ago I spent a week in the Blue Ridge Mountains just



down the road from the Presbyterian conference center at Montreat, NC, working on what turned out to be a rather ambitious project to develop a model of best practices for fundraising for use by transitional and interim pastors.

One of the main tasks of the congregation during the time of transition is the mission self-study, out of which comes a clear statement of the church's vision and mission. If we want to invite others to participate in our church's mission and to call a pastoral leader to lead the church into the future, then we need to be clear about what it is we believe God is calling us as a community of faith to be and do, which is why the vision and mission study are so important and why we spend so much time on them. Everything that the church does and for which it strives flows from the vision and mission statements. The church's vision and mission even ought to be reflected in its operating budget.

Presbyterians believe that whatever we do is a response to the grace that we have first received from God. The great spiritual writer Henri Nouwen, said that when we know of God's love, we experience an extraordinary desire to love God back, to say thank you, to express how much the gift of God's love matters. We love God back by being fruitful with our lives, which is to take all that has been given to us, and to place it at the service of others, of creation, of life itself. It is to demonstrate our love for God by loving all that God loves and attending to whom and what God loves by giving our whole selves in service.

Pope Francis said, "These two criteria are like the pillars of true love: deed, and gift of self. And Mother Teresa spoke about the divine tenacity of love, "I have found the paradox, that if you love until it hurts, there can be no more hurt, only more love." Please think about that.

The starting point is gratitude. Nouwen put it this way, "The central truth of your life - of all of our lives - is to know truly and completely, that God loves you just for being you." The moment we understand that God loves us for who we are, that we don't have to earn God's love, then that is a powerful, transformative moment of grace. And if you have experienced what Henri is speaking about, you know a profound gratitude that permeates your whole being. When you realize just how much God loves you, you want to love God back. And the desire to express that gratitude knows no end. Our giving and our service are expressions of our gratitude for God's amazing love for us. The writer of 1 John sums it up: We love because God first loved us.
