adventure as Lewis and Clark did when they found themselves unprepared for their future, we can thrive.

Bolsinger argues that two forces have rendered the religious landscape unnavigable using old models for ministry. I) After centuries of relative stability with slow, incremental change, in less that one generation our world has become VUCA: volatile, uncertain, complex, and ambiguous. 2) We live in a post-Christian/Religion world. Extracurricular activities from music lessons to sports participation are considered by most parents to be more effective at forming good character in our children (and getting them accepted to good colleges!)

than the church. Spirituality has become wildly popular but so deeply individualistic that the fastest growing "religious affiliations" among those under thirty are "none" and "spiritual-not-religious".

The Rockies were "the most terrible mountains (Lewis and Clark) had ever seen." They were highly experienced river explorers; they had no experience scaling mountains. Lewis and Clark could have turned around and gone home, but instead they embraced the adventure and adapted their skills to tackle this new and unexpected terrain.

Bolsinger uses the story of Lewis and Clark's expedition to explore the Louisiana Purchase as a driving analogy for his book. Meriwether Lewis and William Clark set off believing they would be able to canoe their way

across the country. They believed, like everyone before them, that the unexplored west was exactly the same geography as the familiar east. The Rockies were a HUGE surprise! Bolsinger claims that churches are facing uncharted territory, if we can adapt and

St. John's made a similar decision when you decided to call a full-time rector. The sensible and prudent, financial decision might have been to hire part-time clergy...to turn around, go home...and wait to die. But no! Encouraged by +Bishop Mariann, you made the decision to embrace adventure. You called me to be your 34th rector and I am grateful everyday.

After only six months, you have already shown me your willingness to adapt. Our "experiments" with liturgy this summer were a small step in the right direction. **We are doing off-road ministry!** While we are not facing the Rockies like Lewis and Clark, we do have a significant adaptive obstacle looming over us. Scaling this obstacle will require new tools, new techniques, and new thinking.

For the past three decades, St. John's has been in a state of decline (along with many/most other churches and synagogues). For the last decade or so, St. John's has operated with a deficit budget – meaning we do not receive enough offering income to cover our expenses. We have gotten very good at surviving. Surviving is not going to get us out of the ruts in which we are stuck. **St. John's has too much to offer to just survive!** To be a community that is rooted and reaching – striving to share God's love and mercy by serving those most in need – offering joy and radical hospitality – we need to thrive! In order to thrive, we must tackle the adaptive obstacle of financial sustainability. Our budget is so lean; it is like trying to do ministry with our hands tied behind our backs.

What makes St. John's a community worth investing in? What is your story? In the next days, you will receive a letter introducing our annual giving campaign – **To You All Hearts Are Open**. (You will recognize this line as coming from a prayer we hear almost every Sunday in worship!) What can you offer towards

becoming a thriving church? Are you willing to offer a sustaining gift?

We are doing ministry off-road! I am so grateful we are on this adventure together!



RECYCLE FOR ST. JOHN'S





¹INCLEMENT WEATHER MAKE-UP DAYS

- One large eraser (no pencil cap erasers)
- Six new, unsharpened pencils with erasers removed from package
- One box of 24 crayons
- One 12" x 14" to 14" x 17" finished cotton or lightweight canvas bag with handles (solid color and kid-friendly fabric; no logos, reusable shopping bags, or backpacks)
