

Fifteen leaders from across the diocese, along with members of diocesan staff, returned Wednesday evening from a two-day strategic planning retreat facilitated by Tony Morgan of the Unstuck Group. It was one of the most uplifting experiences of my ministry.

We began on Tuesday with prayer and a comprehensive review of all that we learned from the 12 discovery sessions held throughout the diocese this spring. The spiritual wisdom and insightful observations of all those who participated in the discovery process--over five hundred people!--informed our conversations throughout the retreat. We felt the magnitude of the task before us, but we also felt the presence of the Holy Spirit, which gave us courage and joy.

Tony led us through a process that included reflection and clarification of our core mission as a diocese, a vision for the next five years, and three initiatives that surfaced as our priorities for the first year. We did not leave the retreat

with a finished product, but working drafts that we are eager to share with regional and diocesan leaders. We'll spend the summer soliciting feedback as we continue to refine and clarify our understanding of core mission, aspirational vision, and strategic priorities for the next season of diocesan life.

The retreat participants need a bit more time to finalize our first draft. We'll then begin contacting regional leaders and those who attended the discovery sessions, and meeting with diocesan governance bodies. Diocesan Council meets on Tuesday, July 9th, and the strategic planning work will be our first agenda item.

At the beginning of our second day, Tony reflected with us on this passage from 1 Corinthians:

I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you—so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. . . Now I appeal to you brothers and sisters by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that you all be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose. (1 Cor.1:4-7; 10)

There were, of course, many divisions in the community in Corinth at the time of Paul's writings.

Paul was not suggesting that they attempt to minimize or eliminate their differences, but rather find the deeper unity available to them in Christ. That was Tony's invitation to us: that in the midst of all our differences that we seek a deeper unity in Christ. "God is the source of our strength in Christ Jesus," Paul writes. "Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord." (1 Cor.1:30-31)

We still have much work to do to discern, articulate, and affirm a strategic vision in the process. Please join me in thanking all who have given of themselves so generously throughout this process and who are eager for us, as a diocese, to take the next faithful steps toward that deeper unity of purpose and ministry, in faithfulness to Christ.

FAMILIES HOPE SHARING STORIES OF ADDICTION SHATTERS STIGMA

To hear Jiri Parma Fletcher's family talk about him, there was absolutely nothing he couldn't do.

The young Indian Head man was bright, empathetic, vibrant and talented, his family all said, a dreamer with a natural talent for brightening any room he walked into. He was interested in everything from the sciences and the natural world to the arts, music and conspiracy theories. He worked as a lifeguard, and valued the opportunity to save lives the role afforded him. He was "love, brilliance and energy," his mother, Dasha, said. "He wanted to do everything."

Although his family loved him fiercely, his short life wasn't without struggles. He was "brilliant," his father, Carl, said, but he was bored in school. He was sometimes bullied for his name. To round it out, he also was born with a maxillofacial birth defect, a deformity in his cheekbone that he'd long been insecure about.

Jiri was 16 when he underwent surgery for his cheekbone. At the time, Carl said, Jiri was predisposed to opiate addiction, but "we didn't know that, and we didn't think anything of it when they prescribed those for him, because we were doing what the doctor said. And the doctor probably didn't think anything of it, because they were doing what they had to do when prescribing pain medication." From there, Jiri was hooked on opiates. He went to rehab three times during what Dasha called a "five-year ordeal." He maintained sobriety for two years before accidentally overdosing last year.

Carl pointed to the recent addition of fentanyl, an extremely potent synthetic opioid, that has become a common additive in drugs like heroin and cocaine. "That's what's killing kids," Carl said, and ultimately, a mixture of fentanyl and heroin is what ended Jiri's life on Aug. 6, 2018.

Jiri was aware of the danger of fentanyl-laced drugs before it took his own life. Carl remembered Jiri telling him about a spate of overdose deaths in Camden, N.J., he'd heard about while in treatment at a facility in the state. The drug was called "Batman," Carl recalled hearing from his son, and it was a mixture of heroin and fentanyl he'd heard killed 75 people.

Carl questioned why anyone would try something like that and was surprised by the answer. "He said you won't believe it, because when people hear about it it's like flies coming to a lightbulb. The addicts would gravitate toward the fentanyl," Carl said. The high was more intense, Jiri explained at the time, so that appealed to the drug's habitual users.

Jiri was somewhat fortunate, Dasha said, in that the family had health insurance which helped pay for some of his treatment. It by no means covered everything, however. "The insurance only goes so far," Carl said. "... It came time for him to move on, and the place where we were told got the results, well that wasn't in our insurance plan." He'd been clean for two years before he took the fatal overdose.

The family feels it's important to share Jiri's story in the hopes that it helps to end the stigma that is so prevalent against addicts, and that it keeps their son's death from being just a statistic. Dasha and Carl are not recovering addicts themselves, they said, but watching Jiri's struggles showed them firsthand exactly how prevalent the disease is.

"This discussion has to be had now," Carl said. "They assigned shame to addiction. It was kept in the shadows this long that an epidemic was created. We're really ada-



mant now that this discussion take place. You don't push your addict away, don't give up on them. Addiction needs to be in the same discussion with ALS or any other disease, because it's a disease destroying family like ours."

A local means of support has helped the Fletchers, along with other families who have loved ones living with drug and alcohol addictions. PABA, short for Parents Affected by Addiction, holds meetings that are open to families throughout the region: In Charles County, they commonly meet at the Charles County Sheriff's Office.

Hughesville resident Marnie Grove, a volunteer with the group, said her own experience with her son's addiction — though he's currently alive and two and a half years sober — has been "hell." Grove said she came to the group through founder Amy Jo Young. Both of them have sons who are addicts, Grove said, and the two women have grown to work together closely.

Unlike Jiri, Grove's son didn't start using after being given pain medication. Her son's use was always recreational, she said. He started using when he was 14, and with time he chose progressively harder drugs before entering treatment for the first time at 20 years old.

Grove's son stayed in rehab for 28 days the first time before leaving, she said. Grove attributed his initial failure to his lack of a desire to enter treatment. "I forced him to go, and that doesn't work," she said. He was then homeless for six months before entering a second rehab facility in New York. Grove said her son stayed sober for five years and was holding down "a great job" when she started to suspect something might be amiss. "I wasn't positive," Grove said. "You start seeing little things but I thought, "No way, he's five years clean," but you get around the wrong people at the wrong time and it gets you again."

Grove's son is now in Florida: He left Feb. 14, 2017, for treatment in the state "and he's been there ever since," she said. Fortunately, he has been clean for two and a half years.

Groves has now turned her attention to helping families of those struggling with addiction: She knows the "long nights of worrying and waiting" well, she said, and wants to do her part to help those experiencing the same. That's included everything from working with local emergency services officials to develop overdose kits they leave at homes where they've responded to a drug call to helping assemble the Heroin Overdose Prevention Effort (HOPE) trailer, which provides a look at what a drug user's room and surroundings can look like.

"Personally, it's helped me because I'm helping other people now," Grove said. "It gives you strength and hope. ... Secrets kill. There's no sense in hiding it. There's nothing to be ashamed of. It's like taking a Band-Aid off and letting a little air get to the wound."


