*Colossians 3:9-15: There is not Greek and Jew, circumcision and uncircumcision, barbarian, Scythian, slave and free; but Christ is **all** and in **all**. Colossians 3:11*

An old nursery rhyme says:

I do not like thee, Dr. Fell, / The reason why I cannot tell;
But this one thing I know full well: / I do not like thee, Dr. Fell.

There are some people we just don't like; but simply put, that's prejudice. And it's forbidden in this passage. The original Greek here is very strong: In Christ there is *no such thing as* artificial distinctions among God's people. We're brothers and sisters in Christ regardless of nationality, religious background, cultural distinctions, or economic status.

We're to live as prescribed here in Colossians 3, putting off our old attitudes of pride and prejudice (v. 10), putting on new attitudes of love and acceptance (v. 11), and treating others with compassion, kindness, gentleness, and patience (v. 12). We accept and forgive each other (v. 13), displaying a love that promotes unity (v. 14). We should have such peaceful personalities that our homes and churches are harmonious places (v. 15). So, we can say:

I've learned to like thee, Dr. Fell, / The reason why I'm glad to tell:
The Christ who saved my soul from hell / Now helps me love thee, Dr. Fell.

1. If you have a Realm account, sign into realm. If not, skip this step ... or better yet, email Betsy Winters (betsywinters@gmail.com) to get you signed up!
2. Go to **www.stjohnsbroadcreek.org/give** -- you can also get there via the St. John's Homepage by clicking "Donate Online" at the top right menu.
3. Fill out the form to submit your one-time or regular donation! Some options on the form:
 - A) Recurring donations: You can set it to give once per week, once every two weeks, once per month, or once per quarter!
 - B) Funds: Right now we have everything going to General Funds with this new system, but feel free to write details on the MEMO line if you'd like to designate monies for other funds or just to write details.
4. Click "Continue" and complete the steps to process your payment! You will have a couple more options:
 - A) ACH or Credit Card: ACH Bank Transfer is now available -- the exact same thing as writing a check, and less fees.
 - B) You will also have the option to offset the fees for the online banking service, which St. John's would greatly appreciate!

June 1 - registration opens for: Infant and Toddler, PreK Special Education and Prekindergarten (PreK) Applications (Four by September 1, 2020); Kindergarten Registration (Five by September 1, 2020); Early Entrance to PreK (turning Four between Sept. 2nd - Oct. 15th); Early Entrance to Kindergarten (turning Five between Sept. 2nd -Oct. 15th)

June 4 - registration opens for all Specialty Programs (including High School Specialty Programs) and Charter School students

June 8 - registration opens for all transitional students. (i.e. rising middle school 6th or 7th grade and/or 9th grade)

ANNUAL SUMMER FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM

Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) will end the current two-day meal distribution program Wednesday, June 17. Following a one-week break to complete year-end activities, PGCPS will operate the annual Summer Food Service Program from Monday, June 29 through Thursday, August 13.

"Grab and go" breakfast and lunch meals will be available Monday through Thursday from 10 a.m. to noon at 87 school sites and 12 apartment complexes. To view a list of sites, [click here](#).

To bridge the gap in meal service, PGCPS families can access seven community sites from Monday, June 22 through Friday, June 26. The sites will offer lunch and a snack from 12-2 p.m.

APPROVED BUDGET PROPOSAL

The Board unanimously approved its budget proposal based upon a recommendation from Dr. Monica E. Goldson, Chief Executive Officer, that reflected her vision for the diverse academic programs and fiscal and staffing allocations that are required to advance our school system (*Building Pride: Students First*). Dr. Goldson identified the following 5 strategic goals in her FY2021 budget proposal: academic excellence, a high performing workforce; a safe and supportive environment; family and community engagement; and organizational effectiveness. Responding to Dr. Goldson's recommendation and your input offered during three public hearings, the Board adopted a FY2021 spending plan focused on its five priorities: increase employee compensation; address food insecurity for our students; enhance building maintenance services; expand language immersion programs; and support and advocate for additional funding and services as recommended by the Kirwan Commission on Innovation and Excellence in Education.

The Board of Education and Dr. Goldson share the community's concern about the need to assign high priority to social-emotional learning support systems, teacher and staff compensation enhancement, and the expansion of programs to improve college and career readiness. We heard you and thank you for the time you took to develop and present your FY2021 budget priorities to us. The FY2021 school system budget development process evolved at multiple levels. We appreciate the efforts that the Governor, General Assembly, County Executive and County Council made to provide adequate funding to support the Board's FY2020 budget request. We appreciate their continued support of the work of the Board of Education and commitment to the success of Prince George's County Public Schools amid competing state and local budget priorities in the context of finite financial resources.

At this point, the Board of Education must reconcile its FY2021 budget request with the funding that has been made available. We are faced with a \$34.6 million budget deficit. We will use increased state funding made available by the *Blueprint for Maryland's Future* statute (Commission on Innovation and Excellence – Kirwan) to address part of the funding gap and address key school system priorities, especially the community funding priorities that the Board incorporated into its original FY2021 budget request to County Executive Angela Alsobrooks.

The Board of Education has asked its Operations, Budget and Fiscal Affairs (OBFA) Committee to review the CEO's budget reconciliation proposal and offer a recommendation to the Board. The Board of Education and its OBFA Committee would appreciate hearing from you regarding the approach we should take to close the FY2021 \$34.6 million budget deficit. REMINDER! JUNE 24 CHROMEBOOK DISTRIBUTION FOR MIDDLE SCHOOL AND HS STUDENTS

On Wednesday, June 24, PGCPS will distribute Chromebooks for middle and high school students to use for summer learning programs. The devices are only being provided for middle and high school students and families who did not receive a Chromebook at a previous PGCPS distribution. The devices will be distributed at your child's school from 9 a.m. to noon.

Please note that all PGCPS-owned Chromebooks distributed to students are considered to be on loan from the school system. The Chromebooks only work on the PGCPS network and they must be returned to PGCPS in good condition.

Devices will be distributed to elementary school students at a later date. Additional details will be available mid-July along with information about retrieving personal items from schools and returning PGCPS property, such as textbooks, instruments and uniforms. For more information, please contact your child's principal.

Internet access

PGCPS will cover the monthly cost of Internet Essentials from Comcast for families eligible for public assistance, such as the free and reduced-price meals program, Medicaid and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. To apply, please visit www.internetessentials.com or call 1-855-846-8376. Hours of operation are from 8 a.m. to midnight, seven days a week.

APPLY NOW FOR PGCPS VIRTUAL SUMMER LEARNING PROGRAMS *(For more information, visit the summer program webpage.)*

Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) Virtual Summer Learning Programs offer students opportunities to help transition to high school, take part in academic enrichment, earn original credits towards graduation requirements and recover credits for required courses.

Elementary Programs

Students in prekindergarten through fifth grade can continue distance learning via PGCPS-TV on channels 38 (Verizon) and 96 (Comcast). No registration required and the program is free.

Middle School Programs

Middle school students can access the Edgenuity MYPath summer learning program to build skills in reading and math. No registration required and the program is free. Students can take the self-paced classes from July 1 through July 31. Login at learn.edgenuity.com using the following credentials:

USERNAME: pgmsYOUR STUDENT ID

PASSWORD: YOUR STUDENT ID

Students who did not pass two quarters of reading or math are eligible to participate in a special skills-building program. Classes are free and online enrollment has been extended to June 26.

High School Programs

High school students can earn an original credit and/or recover failed credits towards fulfilling graduation requirements. Students will receive instructional support from a certified content area teacher. Classes are free and offered from July 1 through July 31.

Special Education Program

The summer Extended School Year (ESY) Program is an extension of services beyond the regular school year. Eligible students were identified for the program through an annual review process.

Other Programs

Many schools are offering summer programs for targeted groups of students, including a P-TECH Virtual Summer Bridge program, First Steps to Success Program, College Readiness Bootcamp, IB Summer Bridge, 3D Scholars, Aerospace Engineering and Aviation Technology, and CTE Summer Explorers Camp.

PGCMLS is "Fine Free" Beginning July 1

Largo, Maryland – The Prince George's County Memorial Library System (PGCMLS) is proud to announce that the Library will be "fine free" beginning on July 1, 2020. The Library will waive all existing overdue fines from customer accounts when the policy takes effect. The new "fine free" policy ensures that all Prince Georgians have equitable access to the Library's resources and services, while eliminating the financial barrier of overdue fines. Customers who previously had outstanding account balances will be able to resume borrowing physical and digital materials and access online library resources.

"Having access to a thriving public library is one of the great benefits to life in Prince George's County," said CEO Roberta Phillips. "The elimination of overdue fines is an opportunity for the Library to embrace its commitment to equity by ensuring that all customers can easily borrow and return materials with greater flexibility."

By adopting a "fine free" policy, PGCMLS will join the ranks of over 200 libraries across North America that have eliminated late fines since 2016, including San Francisco Public Library, Los Angeles Public Library, and Chicago Public Library. This collective effort reflects the 2019 American Library Association "Resolution on Monetary Library Fines as a Form of Social Inequity," which highlights libraries' responsibility to eliminate all barriers to access.

"By adopting this new policy, the Board of Library Trustees strongly endorses the idea that incidental fines should not become insurmountable obstacles for people who rely on the library's valuable services," said Brett Crawford, President, PGCMLS Board of Library Trustees. "The amount of fine-related revenue the Library system will lose is insignificant compared to the benefits we anticipate from ensuring no one is excluded from the Library, particularly those who need the Library the most."

Library systems that have previously transitioned to the "fine free" model have witnessed increases in circulation, an uptick in new library card sign-up, and improved engagement with the community. Chicago Public Library reported a 240% increase in the return of borrowed materials within the first weeks of going "fine free." An increase in returns will ensure that books and movies return to circulation and are readily available for other customers.
